#### PRELIMINARY DRAFT GENERAL BUDGET OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR 1991

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#### **FOREWORD**

The overall volume of commitment appropriations in the preliminary draft budget for 1991 has increased by around 13 % from the 1990 figure of ECU 49 047 million to ECU 55 472 million, corresponding to around 1,1 % of Community gross national product.

For the first time, the proportion accounted for by structural operations exceeds 25 % of the total budget. At 54,7 %, the proportion accounted for by agricultural expenditure remains virtually stable. At more than ECU 2 000 million, research and development is another major item of expenditure in the budget.

The new priorities in the preliminary draft budget reflect the revision of the financial perspective on 6 June 1990:

- ECU 838 million is proposed for cooperation with countries of Central and Eastern Europe, including ECU
   18 million as a contribution to the capital of the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development,
- ECU 777 million is entered in the preliminary draft budget to promote the economic development of the countries of Asia and Latin America and to step up cooperation with the Mediterranean countries,
- ECU 418 million will boost the flanking policies for action to fully implement the Single Act (environment, audiovisual, transport, energy, vocational training).

Overall, the preliminary draft budget for 1991 thus takes account of the new requirements raised by the Community's external policy and the objectives adopted in early 1988 completing the internal market, enhancing economic and social cohesion and drawing up the framework research programme.

#### I. GENERAL FRAMEWORK

The budgetary procedure for 1991 will be governed by the revision and the adjustment of the financial perspective for 1990 to 1992, which provides the reference framework for the budget discussions. The decisions on the revision made it quite clear that the Community institutions are capable of adjusting policy priorities to the internal and external changes affecting the Community while at the same time respecting the principles of budgetary discipline and the Interinstitutional Agreement.

On the basis of the Commission's proposals of 22 February 1990 designed to:

- provide active support for political and economic change in Central and Eastern Europe,
- strengthen cooperation with Mediterranean countries, Asia and Latin America,
- promote the internal market process by bolstering certain policy areas,

the Council and Parliament have jointly decided to revise and adjust the financial perspective.

The changes concern the following items:

— other policies — non-compulsory expenditure — (Item 4), for which the ceiling for 1991 has been raised by ECU 1 175 million (from ECU 2 180 million to ECU 3 355 million, an increase of over 50 %). The increase in the maximum amount of non-compulsory expenditure for Item 4 between 1990 (including the ECU 200 million for Central and Eastern Europe) and 1991 is thus 33 %.

In addition to the ECU 820 million (in non-compulsory expenditure) expressly earmarked in the revision decision of the financial perspective for Central and Eastern Europe, the extra scope provided by this increase will make it possible to give a significant boost to the Commission's priority policies (Mediterranean countries, Asia and Latin America and support policies for the completion of the single internal market). It will also allow a fairly substantial increase in the appropriations for policies other than those concerned by the revision,

— structural operations (Item 2), for which the ceiling was raised by ECU 90 million, in addition to a transfer of ECU 157 million proposed by the Commission under points 10 and 11 of the Interinstitutional Agreement. This increase concerns the difference between the forecast and the actual rate of inflation.

The ceiling for Item 2 thus rises from ECU 11 555 million in 1990 to ECU 14 054 million in 1991, an increase of 22 %,

— repayments and administration (Item 5), where the ceiling for 1991 was lowered by ECU 40 million, with the result that the margin of manœuvre for administrative expenditure is reduced by the same amount.

#### II. PRELIMINARY DRAFT BUDGET FOR 1991 IN FIGURES

Compared with the ECU 49 047 million in the 1990 general budget (¹), the overall volume of the preliminary draft budget for 1991 is ECU 55 472 million in appropriations for commitments, an increase of 13,1 %, appropriations for payments total ECU 52 970 million in 1991, as against ECU 46 767 million in 1990, representing around 1,06 % of the Community's gross national product.

To finance the preliminary draft budget, the uniform call-in rate for VAT own resources is 1,2179 %, slightly below the 1990 rate of 1,2465 %.

The uniform call-in rate for the gross national product-based resource (including cover for the monetary reserve) is 0,1574 %.

The table on page 8 gives an overall summary of the figures for the 1991 preliminary draft budget, comparing them with the 1990 budget.

The layout follows the new budget nomenclature under the revised Financial Regulation. This is designed to make the budget more transparent and readable and to make it easier to compare budget headings with items in the financial perspective.





#### Item 1: Guarantee Section of the European Agricultural Guidance and Guarantee Fund

The Guarantee Section of the European Agricultural Guidance and Guarantee Fund expenditure is estimated at ECU 30 356 million.

Two years of favourable economic conditions, connected firstly with the general situation throughout the world (notably world prices and the rate of the dollar against the ecu) and, secondly with factors such as the major reduction in public stocks, the effect of stabilizers and the production levels for certain products, have meant that in 1989 and 1990 agricultural expenditure has levelled off or even declined. In 1991 agricultural spending will still be well below the guideline figure, which is ECU 32 511 million (leaving a margin of ECU 2 100 million in relation to the forecast in the 1991 preliminary draft budget), but the increase over 1990 is nevertheless an appreciable 14,5 %.


Three factors contribute to this increase:


- the decline of the dollar against the ecu, the rate for 1991 being 0,83 as against 0,89 in 1990, this alone accounts for a fairly substantial part (around ECU 700 million) of the increase in requirements for 1991,
- the price decisions taken recently by the Agriculture Ministers will add around ECU 1 100 million to agricultural expenditure in 1991, some of these decisions will, in fact, only bring out their effect in 1991,
- developments on agricultural markets and the changes to certain points of the current rules will generate
  additional costs that will be particularly pronounced in the tobacco, sheepmeat, milk products and oils and
  fats sectors.

#### Item 2: Structural operations

The planned expenditure on structural operations reflects the high political priority that the Community attaches to this area.

The appropriations for the Structural Funds, Pedip, the Community support frameworks, set-aside and income aid total ECU 13 900 million in all. For the first time, they will thus account for over a quarter of the Community budget (in appropriations for commitments).



The aim is to continue the cohesion effort which has guided the implementation of the reform of the Structural Funds and to remain on course for doubling the size of the Funds by 1992 to 1993 (see chart on page 21).




The Community support frameworks (CSFs) are a key factor for these structural policies. Worked out in partnership with the national and regional authorities concerned, they define the development and conversion priorities, the types of assistance envisaged and the financing plans.

The schedules for the Community support frameworks were the basis for distributing appropriations between the Funds. The distribution of appropriations between objectives is shown in the chart on page 20.

An amount of ECU 119,8 million, up by 10 % in 1990, is devoted to the continuation of the specific industrial development programme for Portugal (Pedip).

The total of ECU 13 900 million is still ECU 156 million below the ceiling for the item, one reason for this is that the application of the set-aside measures and income aids for farmers is behind schedule.

- Transitional measures and innovatory operations (ECU 243 million)

#### Item 3: Policies with multiannual allocations

#### (Integrated Mediterranean Programmes and Research)

The fundamental importance that the Community attaches to research and technological development is clearly highlighted by the substantial appropriations allocated to this area: expenditure will rise by 17,2 %, from ECU 1 700 million in 1990 to over ECU 2 000 million in 1991, broken down as follows:

- the estimates in the 1991 preliminary draft budget for the 1990 to 1994 framework programme of research and technological development are based on a figure of ECU 2 500 million for 1991 and 1992, assuming that the 15 specific programmes and the centralized operation for dissemination and utilization are adopted in time, it should be possible to use 48 % of this (ECU 1 195 million) in 1991,
- in addition, there will still be ECU 707 million for the 1987 to 1991 framework programme,
- finally, ECU 123 million is earmarked for support measures (outside the framework programme).

The appropriations required for the integrated Mediterranean programmes amount to ECU 330 million. This represents a reasonable estimate of spending capacity and leaves ECU 350 million to be allocated in 1992 in order to reach the planned figure of ECU 1 600 million for the period from 1985 to 1992.

Total appropriations under Item 3 are ECU 157 million below the ceiling in the financial perspective.

Should the budgetary authority wish, within this margin, to increase funding for specific programmes, the allocation for the framework programme in 1990 to 1994 could exceed the ECU 2 500 million currently earmarked for the period covered by the Interinstitutional Agreement. The Commission has said that it would support such a move.

#### Item 4: Other policies

The raised ceiling for Item 4 offers scope for a marked increase in funds for the policies to which the Commission attaches particular importance.

Planned expenditure on the policies covered by Item 4 totals ECU 4 110 million in 1991 compared with ECU 3 205 million in 1990, an increase of 28,2 %.

Non-compulsory expenditure makes up ECU 3 255 million, against ECU 2 523 million in 1990 (including the additional ECU 200 million for Central and Eastern Europe), an increase of 29 %, whereas the maximum rate of increase for non-compulsory expenditure as calculated in accordance with Article 203 of the EEC Treaty is 7,2 %.

The following comments can be made on the distribution of appropriations within the item:

- Cooperation with Central and Eastern Europe is allocated a total of ECU 838 million (in commitment appropriations), including an ECU 18 million contribution to the capital of the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development. The Community will thus be able to make a major contribution to supporting the democratic process and to overcoming the economic difficulties in the countries concerned. The German Democratic Republic will also be entitled to receive allocations from these appropriations in 1991.
- Cooperation with the Mediterranean countries and with countries in Asia and Latin America will be stepped up to meet new needs which have arisen out of the diversification of economic structures and the growing complexity of the challenges to be met. At the same time, conventional development aid for the poorest sections of the population will continue. For these two groups of countries the 1991 preliminary draft budget allocates ECU 777 million (17,7 % up on the ECU 660 million in 1990), of which ECU 307 million is compulsory expenditure under the financial protocols with the Mediterranean countries.

— For the five flanking policies for implementing the Single Act (environment, audiovisual, transport, energy and vocational training), appreciable increases are planned.

As regards the environment, the enhancement of Community operations amounts to more than just the large increase (41 %) shown in the table below. Environment policy is covered by a whole series of measures which extend well beyond the environment budget headings, funds will be devoted to the environment under structural operations, research and technological development, agricultural operations, and cooperation with non-Member countries (Central and Eastern Europe) totalling some ECU 750 million, an increase of 50 % over 1990.

Appropriations for culture and information rise from ECU 45,2 million in 1990 to ECU 68,2 million in 1991 (an increase of 51 %). Most of this increase is devoted to the audiovisual action programme (Media), for which the appropriations rise from ECU 12 million to ECU 34 million. The growth in expenditure on information operations is less marked.

With these increases the Community will give a further boost to the process of implementing the Single Act and will make further progress towards economic integration.

— There is also a marked increase for the policies other than those affected by the proposal for the revision of the financial perspective, with an overall rate of increase of 10,5 %. The most appreciable increases are for the internal market, in particular standardization (26,6 %), industry (21,9 %) and statistical information (17,8 %).

Total non-compulsory expenditure proposed by the Commission in the preliminary draft budget (ECU 3 255 million) is still ECU 100 million below the revised ceiling for non-compulsory expenditure under this item (ECU 3 355 million). In the circumstances resulting from the revision of the financial perspective, it is fairly certain that this margin will be taken up during the budgetary procedure. The Commission's concern has been to enable the budgetary authority to express its own priorities as regards the policies falling under Item 4.

#### Item 5: Repayments and administration

The accession agreements for Spain and Portugal provide for the refund of a declining proportion of their contributions to the Community budget, refunds for 1991 are estimated at ECU 338 million, an amount which might increase slightly depending on the overall size of the final budget.

For the repayments of expenditure to Member States connected with the depreciation of stocks of agricultural products and the specific programme for the disposal of butter from public stocks, the 1991 preliminary draft budget covers only the commitments relating to butter, as the stock depreciation exercise was terminated at the beginning of 1990. The estimated cost is therefore reduced from ECU 1 470 million in 1990 to ECU 810 million in 1991.

However, under the rules on budgetary discipline (1) the difference in relation to the maximum amount for stock disposals (ECU 1 598 million) cannot be used for any other purpose.

The amount still available for administrative expenditure (reduced, as mentioned above, by ECU 40 million) will allow an increase in relation to 1990 of 10 %. Although this may appear substantial when compared with past years, it is nevertheless a serious constraint for the operation of all the Community institutions.

To begin with, this increase must be put into perspective: for the Commission, at least, the requirements for 1990 were underestimated in the voted budget.

Secondly, account must be taken of the cumulative effects of the depreciation of the ecu against the Belgian and Luxembourg francs, the currencies in which salaries are mainly paid, and of the appropriations needed to finance, for a full year, the posts newly created in 1990.

The Commission assumes that in aggregate terms the other institutions will contain their administrative expenditure within the same limits.

#### IV. REVENUE

The 1991 budget will be financed entirely by the system of own resources agreed by the European Council in February 1988 and given substance by the Decision of 24 June 1988.

#### Categories of revenue

The main sources of revenue are:

- (a) agricultural levies (variable duties charged on imports of some agricultural products: ECU 1 218 million) and the levies paid by sugar and isoglucose producers (ECU 1 213 million),
- (b) common customs tariff duties and customs duties on coal and steel products covered by the ECSC Treaty (ECU 13 192 million),
- (c) resources from VAT calculated by applying a fixed 1,4 % rate to a VAT base determined in a uniform manner but limited, for each Member State, to 55 % of its gross national product at market prices (ECU 29 782 million).
- (d) an additional resource, also known as the 'fourth resource', obtained by applying a rate set each year during the budgetary procedure, to a base representing the sum of Member States' gross national products at market prices. This resource is the variable resource calculated to cover the part of expenditure not covered by the other sources of revenue (ECU 8 020 million).

To these can be added:

miscellaneous revenue (tax and other deductions from staff salaries, interest on bank deposits, etc.) which represent less than 1 % of total revenue (ECU 327 million), and the remainder of the balance from 1989 (ECU 780 million).

Before paying over agricultural levies, sugar levies and customs duties, Member States will first deduct 10% to cover collection expenses (ECU 1 562 million).

The resources required to finance the appropriation of ECU 1 000 million entered in Title B1-5 of the statement of expenditure (monetary reserve for the Guarantee Section of the European Agricultural Guidance and Guarantee Fund) will be called in only if and when the monetary reserve in drawn upon.

#### Revenue ceilings

The own resources decision fixes overall ceilings for own resources which can be called in. It is 1,19 % of Community gross national product in 1991 for appropriations for payments.

The preliminary draft budget 1991 is well within this limit.

#### The correction for the United Kingdom

Under the Council Decision of 24 June 1988 on the system of the Communities' own resources, the United Kingdom is entitled to an adjustment of its payments to correct the imbalance in its budgetary situation. This correction is mainly based on the United Kingdom's share of expenditure, on its share of payments of VAT and additional resources and on the volume of the budget.

The amount to be granted in 1991 can be estimated at ECU 3 211 million.


#### The results in figures

The payment appropriations to be covered in 1991 total ECU 52 970 million. The proportion of budget financing accounted for by each of the main categories of resource is shown in the charts on pages 29 and 30.

In 1991 the Community will be calling in ECU 7 015 million from the additional resource, not including the European Agricultural Guidance and Guarantee Fund monetary reserve.

B: Sugar levies



(4) Chapter F on budget estimates of the European Council indicates a figure of ECU 2 400 million (1988 prices) for policies with multiannual allocations in 1992. The policies in question are research and technological development and integrated Mediterranean programmes. Only expenditure for which a legal basis exists may be financed under this item. The present framework programme provides a legal basis for research expenditure of ECU 863 million (current prices) for 1992.

The regulation on integrated Mediterranean programmes provides a legal basis for an estimated amount of ECU 300 million in 1992 (current prices).

The two arms of the budgetary authority undertake to respect the principle that further budget appropriations within this ceiling for 1990, 1991 and 1992 will require a revision of the existing framework programme, or, before the end of 1991, a decision on a new framework programme based on a proposal from the Commission in accordance with the legislative provisions in Article 130 q of the European Economic Community Treaty.

This means that the amounts of these transfers will not count towards the totals of appropriations to be taken into consideration for the purpose of ensuring compliance with the ceilings in the financial perspective. The criteria for the examination of these transfers are those agreed by the Council, Parliament and the Commission in their statement of 12 February 1990.
