#### EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM

#### INTRODUCTION

In this Communication the Commission proposes that the Council extend for 1981, 1982 and 1983 the aid given by the Community to the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (UNRWA) under the multi-annual Convention concluded with that body on 12 June 1980 and covering the period 1 January 1979 to 31 December 1980.

To this end it is proposed that for 1981, 1982 and 1983 a Convention be concluded between the EEC and UNRWA to take over from the preceding Convention; with some amendments, for the three-year period in question. The Convention would cover an initial period (1981) and would be renewed annually for 1982 and 1983.

This Communication also proposes the adoption of a regulation concerning the supply of 6 086 tonnes of white sugar as food aid to UNRWA in each of the years covered by the new Convention.

## :I. STRUCTURE OF FOOD AID SUPPLIED TO UNRWA AND DISTRIBUTED BY THE AGENCY

UNRWA, whose mandate has been extended by the United Nations General Assembly until June 1984, implements two different programmes under the Leading of food aid (1) (which forms part of relief services that also embrace help with housing and assistance for people suffering particular Lardship):

the Basic Rations Programme; the Supplementary Feeding Programme.

These programmes are implemented in five different territories (Lebanon, Syria, Jordan, West Bank and the Gaza Strip).

#### 1. Basic Rations Programme

Under this programme there are around 824 000 recipients. The number of recipients is at present governed by a ceiling (2) and the list of refugees is constantly updated, as the inclusion of each new recipient (e.g. a refugee child in need who is entitled to rations but is not receiving any because of the ceiling) depends on the removal of a former recipient on account of death, absence, employment, and so on.

- i. an education programme (elementary, general and higher education), vocational training and university scholarships, involving around 314 000 pupils, 3 460 vocational training places and 360 study grants respectively. The number of instructors is 9 500;
- ii. a health service (preventive and curative medicine, immunization programme, PMI, school medical service). The Supplementary Feeding Programme is linked with this health service as part of the arrangements for monitoring, protecting and improving the standard of nutrition.

(2) It should be compared with the total number of refugees registered with UNRWA, namely 1 844 318 persons.

The programme provides a monthly ration of flour (5 kg), oils and fats (0.375 kg) and sugar (0.6 kg) for each recipient. For the refugees in greatest need the flour ration is increased (to 10 kg).

The rations distributed come from contributions in kind from various donors (1), as UNRWA has halted purchases foodstuffs, on account of its budget deficit.

## 2. Supplementary Feeding Programme

This programme is designed for the most vulnerable among the refugees. As such it is closely linked with the health programme run by UNRWA. There are three aspects to the Supplementary Feeding Programme:

(a) Distribution of hot meals and vitamins A and D in a hundred or so feeding centres on six days each week to children under eight and - subject to medical prescription - to older people (around 35 000 persons in all).

These products are delivered cif and a flat-rate contribution of US \$35 per tonne is made to cover internal transport and distribution costs. The total estimated value of these contributions was around 22.87 million ECU.

- (b) Distribution of whole or skimmed milk in milk distribution centres and PMI centres to children under three (this programme covers 50 000 children).
- (c) Distribution of extra rations (mainly flour and butteroil) to pregnant women, nursing mothers and people who are sick.

It should be emphasized that this programme for the most vulnerable among the refugees is almost wholly Community-financed. The Community supplies foodstuffs (1) plus a cash contribution of around US \$3.5 million to help implement the programme (purchase of additional foodstuffs such as corned beef, pulses, local products and vitamins; upkeep of distribution centres; remuneration of staff responsible for implementing the programme).

The implementation of these programmes in 1979 and 1980 by means of the allocations made under the current Convention (1979-80) is dealt with in Annex IV.

plus a total cash contribution of US \$6 866 000. The total value of the programme can be estimated at 6.92 million ECU.

## II. UNRWA'S REQUEST AND PROPOSED COMMUNITY RESPONSE

## A. UNRWA's request for 1981, 1982 and 1983

In order to continue the programmes described above, UNRWA has requested the following quantities for 1981:

- 29 743 tonnes of wheat flour,
  - 152 tonnes of milled rice,
  - 1 632 tonnes of skommed milk powder,
  - 3 900 tonnes of butteroil,
  - 6 086 tonnes of sugar.

These quantities, which cover part of the Basic Rations Programme and also the Supplementary Feeding Programme (1), are similar to those requested in 1979 and 1980 and to those allocated under the 1979-1980 Convention. The reason for the increase in the request for skimmed milk powder (an additional 82 tonnes for the Basic Rations Programme) is that the number of recipients will be around 61 000 instead of 38 000 as in 1980.

The flat-rate contribution of US \$35 per tonne of product received under the Basic Rations Programme (around 38 060 tonnes) is unchanged.

27 593 tonnes of wheat flour,

732 tonnes of skimmed milk powder,

3 735 tonnes of butteroil,

6 000 tonnes of sugar

#### Supplementary Feeding Programme:

2 150 tonnes of wheat flour,

152 tonnes of milled rice.

900 tonnes of skimmed milk powder,

165 tonnes of butteroil,

86 tonnes of white sugar.

The quantities for the subsequent years (1982 and 1983) should be of a similar order of magnitude.

Basic Rations Programme:

The cash contribution for implementing the Supplementary Feeding Programme (US \$3 916 917) is 8.8% up over the 1980 contribution (US \$3 600 000). This limited increase is the result of a reduction which will be maintained in 1981 (1) - in the scope of the programme implemented in 1980.

Analysis of the various items of expenditure financed by this contribution also shows that:

- i. the item for the purchase of foodstuffs (corned beef, tomato paste, pulses, burghol) is sharply higher: US \$367 000 in 1980 (2), US \$704 997 in 1981. It should be pointed out that the corned beef and tomato paste are of Community origin.
- ii. The item for the purchase of local products (fruit and vegetables) and vitamins is stable: US \$753 000 in 1980 and US \$776 000 in 1981.
- iii. The total for items directly benefiting the people being assisted will be US \$1 480 000 in 1981, equivalent to 37.81% of the total cost of the programme (3).

US \$4 667 000 in 1983.

However, UNRWA is considering requesting the restoration of the programme to its original level.

iv. A fall in staff remuneration costs may also be noted:

US \$2 317 000 (1980) compared with US \$2 270 000 in 1981. These costs are accounted for mainly by the implementation of the programme of hot meals distributed on six days each week to children under six, using the products referred to above.

### B. Proposed response to UNRWA's request

#### 1. Products

The allocations of products for 1981 could be as follows (1):

- 40 000 tonnes of unprocessed cereals (corresponding to 29 743 tonnes of wheat flour and 152 tonnes of milled rice),
- 1 632 tonnes of skimmed milk powder,
- 3 900 tonnes of butteroil,
- 6 086 tonnes of white sugar.

These quantities meet the request in full and represent, taking into account their delivery to the cif stage and the cash contribution of US \$35 for transport and distribution of products under the Basic Rations Programme, an estimated value at world prices of 18.64 million ECU and 32.35 million ECU at internal prices.

#### 2. Financial aid

Given the trend of expenditure relating to the Supplementary Feeding Programme (limited growth, redistribution of different items), the annual cash contribution for 1981 could be set at US \$3 920 000 (2).

Total aid from the European Economic Community to UNRWA would amount to:

22 000 000 ECU at world prices, and

36 477 000 ECU at internal prices

over the initial period of the new Convention (1 January - 31 December 1981).

#### 3. Special nature of the proposed new Convention

The new Convention should cover a three-year period (1981, 1982 and 1983). In so far as the quantities of products, flat-rate contribution and cash contribution are concerned, it covers an initial period of one year (1 January - 31 December 1981). It would be extended on an annual basis with or without amendments - notably as regards allocations - until December 1983.

#### PROPOSED ACTION

The Commission considers that Community support for UNRWA should be continued and that the request that a new Convention be concluded for a three-year period (1981, 1982 and 1983) should be accepted. The Convention, covering an initial period from 1 January to 31 December 1981, would be extended on an annual basis until 31 December 1983 by agreement between the two parties. The Commission therefore proposes that the Council adopt the following decision, the text of which is attached:

Council Decision (EEC) concluding the Convention between the European Economic Community and the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine refugees (UNRWA) on aid to refugees in the Near East.

The Council should also adopt:

a Regulation on the supply of white sugar as food aid to the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine refugees (UNRWA).

Whereas the Community wishes to continue its programme of aid to Palestine refugees in the Middle East;

Whereas the Convention (1) on aid for such refugees approved on 21 April 1980 and concluded with the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (UNRWA) expired on 31 December 1980;

Whereas a new Convention providing for contributions in kind and in cash over a period of three years should be concluded with UNRWA so that the Community's aid can continue to be provided as part of a comprehensive operation offering a measure of continuity;

Whereas the necessary powers were not provided for by Article 43,

HAS DECIDED AS FOLLOWS:

The Convention between the European Economic Community and the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (UNRWA) on aid to refugees in the Middle East is hereby approved on behalf of the Community.

The text of the Convention is annexed to this Decision.

#### Article 2

Questions relating to the application of the Convention shall be treated by the Commission together with UNWRA.

#### Article 3

The President of the Council is hereby authorized to designate the persons empowered to sign the Convention in order to bind the Community.

#### CONVENTION

BETWEEN THE EUROPEAN ECONOMIC COMMUNITY AND THE UNITED NATIONS RELIEF AND WORKS AGENCY FOR PALESTINE REFUGEES ON AID TO REFUGEES IN THE MIDDLE EAST

Anxious to continue its programme of aid to Palestine refugees, the European Economic Community (hereinafter referred to as "the Community") hereby concludes this Convention with the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (hereinafter referred to as "UNRWA") providing for contributions to UNRWA in kind and in cash for a three-year period, for une under the Basic Rations Programme and the Supplementary Feeding Programme.

#### Article 2

#### Basic Rations Programme

- 1. The Community shall supply to UNRWA for each year of this Convention specific quantities of wheat flour, skimmed milk powder, butteroil and sugar for use under the Basic Rations Programme. The quantities to be supplied for the initial period of the Convention are given in paragraph 1 of the Annex which forms an integral part of this Convention.
- 2. The Community shall be responsible for transport of the products to ports of unloading. Detailed arrangements shall be agreed between the two parties.
- 3. The Community shall pay to UNRWA the sum of US \$35 per tonne of each product delivered, as a contribution to the costs of internal transport and distribution in the period covered by this Convention. The amount to be paid for this purpose in the initial period of the Convention is given in paragraph 2 of the Annex which forms an integral part of this Convention.
- 4. UNRWA shall distribute the products as rations to Palestine refugees eligible for the Basic Programme, free of charge and for their own consumption.

5. UNRWA shall send to the Community before 1 March of each year a report on the Basic Rations programme, notably on the use of the contributions made in kind and in cash under this Convention.

#### Article 3

#### Supplementary Feeding Programme

. A.

- 1. The Community shall supply to UNRWA for each year of this Convention specific quantities of wheat flour, milled rice, skimmed milk powder, butteroil and sugar for use under the Supplementary Feeding Programme. The quantities to be supplied for the initial period of the Convention are given in paragraph 1 of the Annex which forms an integral part of this Convention.
- 2. The Community shall be responsible for transport of the products to ports of unloading. Detailed arrangements shall be agreed between the two parties.
- 3. a) The Community shall pay to UNRWA for each year of this Convention a cash sum as a contribution to the costs of operating the Supplementary Feeding Programme. The cash sum to be paid for the initial period of the Convention is given in paragraph 2 of the Annex which forms an integral part of this Convention.
  - b) Part of this sum shall be spent on the purchase on the Community market of products to be used under the Supplementary Feeding Programme, notably the purchase of specific quantities of corned beef and tomato paste in each year of the Convention. The quantities of corned beef and tomato paste to be purchased in the initial period of the Convention are given in paragraph 3 of the Annex which forms an integral part of this Convention.

- 4. UNRWA shall distribute the products free of charge as prepared foods or drinks to Palestine refugees eligible for the Supplementary Feeding

  Programme. The skimmed milk powder may also be distributed in the form of powder in health centres.
- 5. Any products supplied in excess of requirements shall be used exclusively in other UNRWA programmes. Any cash paid in excess of requirements shall be transferred to UNRWA's general budget, provided agreement has been given by the Commission of the European Communities. In these circumstances the Community may reduce its contributions in kind or cash for the following year.
- 6. UNRWA shall send to the Community twice each year, before 1 March and 1 September, a report on the Supplementary Feeding Programme. This report shall cover:
  - operation of the programme, including the number, category and location of recipients and the services provided;
  - cost of the programme, including costs of staff and the purchase of foodstuffs and other materials;
  - use of Community contributions in kind and in cash.

#### Care of products

UNRWA shall be responsible for transport and distribution of the products after delivery has been made. It shall exercise every care over the products and shall insure them against loss or damage to the extent that this is feasible. In case of loss or damage, whether or not covered by insurance, UNRWA shall replace the products so as to restore the Community's contribution, except in case of riots, civil commotions or armed conflicts, or of risks against which insurance could not have been effected on reasonable terms.

#### Information

UNRWA shall take all reasonable steps to inform the Palestine refugees and the authorities of the host countries of the aid received from the Community and from its Member States.

## Article 6

UNRWA shall give every facility to any person nominated by the Community for the purpose of observing the Agency's receipt, storage and distribution of the Community's aid. UNRWA shall also provide such supplemental information as may reasonably be requested by the person so nominated.

## Article 7

Any questions arising out of this Convention shall be settled between the two parties by consultation, at the request of either party.

#### Article 8

## Duration of the Convention

This Convention shall cover a period of three calendar years (1981, 1982 and 1983). There shall however be an initial period under the Convention, beginning on 1 January 1981 and ending on 31 December 1981. The Convention may be prolonged by agreement between the two parties, with or without amendment, until 31 December 1983. If no decision to this effect has been taken by 31 December of the preceding year, application of the Convention shall be suspended until a decision is taken.

# PROPOSAL FOR COUNCIL REGULATION (FEC) ON THE SUPPLY OF SUGAR TO UNRWA AS FOOD AID

THE COUNCIL OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES,

Having regard to the Treaty establishing the European Economic Community, and in particular Articles 43 and 235 thereof,

Having regard to the proposal from the Commission,

Having regard to the opinion of the European Parliament,

Whereas the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees (UNRWA) has asked the Community to provide food aid in the form of white sugar;

Whereas the white sugar required should be obtained on the Community market;

Whereas, in view of the need to ensure regular supplies, it must, however, be possible to purchase white sugar on the world market if need be;

Whereas to enable this aid to be used effectively the Community should bear the cost not only of the sugar but also of transport to the port of unloading and on to the final destination, plus distribution costs;

Whereas supplies should be obtained at the best price; whereas a tendering procedure should be arranged for that purpose; whereas it may nevertheless prove necessary in exceptional cases to use other procedures in order to save time;

Whereas detailed rules for the implementation of this Regulation should be adopted in accordance with the procedure laid down in Article 36 of Council

Regulation (EEC)No 330/74 (1), as last amended by Regulation (EEC) No 1396/78 (2),

## HAS ADOPTED THIS REGULATION:

#### Article 1

- 1. The following quantity of white sugar produced and in free circulation in the Community shall be made available to UNRWA as food aid:
  - 6 086 tonnes under the 1980/81 sugar marketing year.
- Should the said white sugar not be available on the Community market on normal terms, it may be purchased on the world market.
- 3. The sugar shall be delivered to the port of unloading following a tendering procedure. In exceptional circumstances other procedures may be used.
- 4. The tendering conditions and other arrangements for the implementation of this Article shall be adopted in accordance with the procedure laid down in Article 36 of Regulation (EEC) No 3330/74.

## Article 2

For the purposes of Article 1, the Community shall bear:

- the cost of the sugar delivered to the port of unloading;
- the cost of transport to destination and the distribution costs.

This Regulation shall enter into force on the third day following its publication in the Official Journal of the European Communities.

This Regulation shall be binding in its entirety and directly applicable in all Member States.

#### ANNEX IV

## Implementation of the 1979-80 Convention

Given the length of time taken to conclude the Convention for 1979 and 1980, products were supplied wherever possible on the basis of annual food aid programmes. However, this was not possible in the case of sugar and the products supplied for the Supplementary Feeding Programme, for which a regulation and the Convention were necessary.

Furthermore, the size of the cash contribution to the financing of the Supplementary Feeding Programme (US \$3 600 000 compared with initial expenditure of US \$4 006 000) caused UNRWA to take steps to reduce expenditure under this programme.

Nevertheless the implementation of aid can be regarded as having been at a normal level over the 1979-80 period taken as a whole, most of the quantities having been delivered by 31 December 1980.

## 1. Implementation of the Basic Rations Programme in 1979 and 1980

#### A. 1979

Shipments of flour in 1979 amounted to 27 313.787 t (see Annex IV A: Shipments). Given a total allocation of 27 593 t, delivery losses therefore represented around 1%.

Of this quantity, 20 282,759 t was used to feed 823 079 people (1) over a period ending 29 February 1980. The balance (7 031,028 t) was distributed to 325 556 people (2) in the period April-July 1980.

A total of 1 527.181 t was distributed to 823 327 people (1) over a period ending 29 February 1980. The balance (1 669.566 t) was distributed to 824 500 recipients between April and July 1980 (2).

The stocks carried over (3% of the flour allocation and 52% of the butteroil) bridged the gap until the shipments for 1980 arrived in the summer (3).

The distribution of sugar amounted to 2.4 kg per recipient on account of the delay in delivery.

For the implementation of this programme (internal transport and distribution of products) UNRWA received a cash contribution of US \$1 069 868.69 which was calculated on the basis of the quantities of flour and butteroil delivered. A contribution of US \$209 012.09 was made for the same purpose in respect of sugar.

#### B, 1980

The Basic Rations Programme has been implemented for a similar number of recipients as and when supplies arrive (see Annex TV A: Shipments). So far an amount of US & 1 315 937,94 has been paid for the implementation of the programme as a flat rate contribution for each tonne of product received.

# 2. Implementation of the Supplementary Feeding Programme in 1979 and 1980

As no delivereis were made before 1980, the Agency kept the Supplementary Feeding Programme going by drawing on its stocks, which will be restored as and when deliveries are made.

#### A. 1979

Details of the implementation of this programme are given in Annex IV B: Balance sheet of the Supplementary Feeding Programme implemented by UNRWA in 1979. In this connection it may be noted that the distribution of butteroil under this programme (for which no provision was made prior to 1980) was carried out using quantities allocated under the Basic Rations Programme.

For the operation of this programme in 1979 (purchase of local products, corned beef (340 tonnes)(1), tomato paste (24 tonnes)(2), administrative costs), the Community made a cash contribution of US \$3 266 000, Expenditure actually incurred by UNRWA amounted to US \$3 358 846 (see Annex V A). A compensatory payment was made as part of the payments for 1979.

#### B. 1980

Shipments of products are under way (3) and will be completed in April 1981. The products will be used under conditions similar to those for the 1979 programme.

Maintaining th previous level of services provided would have required a cash contribution of US \$4 100 000 towards the purchase of additional products and operating expenses, but because the request was made at a late stage the planned contribution (US \$3 600 000) could not be increased. In order to make up the shortfall UNRWA reduced its purchases of corned beef (115 t) and cut staff costs. In addition, the age of the recipients was lowered from eight to six years. The programme should be back to normal as regards rations in 1981 and UNRWA envisages restoring it to its 1979 level in 1982 (age of recipients raised once more to eight years).
