1. BACKGROUND

2. OBJECTIVE OF THE COMMISSION PROPOSAL

Registration documents for motor vehicles and their trailers are drawn up by the Member States and differ widely from each other.

At international level, the only provisions relating to these documents are contained in the Vienna Convention on road traffic and cover the minimum content of a registration certificate to allow the vehicle to engage in international travel.

Nine Member States have signed and ratified the Convention, 4 Member States have signed but not ratified it and two Member States and the Community are not signatories thereto.

Therefore, since the Vienna Convention only provides for a minimum amount of information to be set out on the certificate, and the Convention is not in force in all Member States, it is appropriate to provide for harmonised rules at Community level.

3. COMMENTS ON THE PARLIAMENT'S AMENDMENTS AT SECOND READING

Parliament proposes two identical amendments:

Amendment 1.

That the phrase 'the vehicle is fitted with secret identification marks' be added to the list of optional information contained in Annex I, section VI, under code letter E.

Amendment 2.

That the phrase, 'the vehicle is fitted with secret identification marks' be added to the list of optional information contained in Annex II, section VI, under code letter E.

4. GENERAL CONCLUSIONS

The two amendments deal with hidden security markings, invisible to the naked eye, which are placed on some components of some motorbikes. If a police officer stops a motor bike he suspects has been stolen and been fitted with false number plates, and if he has the necessary scanning equipment, he can read these codes and, in principle, check if they correspond to the vehicle described in the registration document. However there are a number of problems with this system: 1)The police officer would need to know which security markings correspond to which vehicle, and this is not shown on the registration certificate. 2) not all vehicles are fitted with security markings. 3) the markings are neither standard in format nor location. 4) very few police forces are equipped with scanners. Therefore, although the purpose of the amendments is to reduce vehicle theft, which the Commission fully supports, they are of limited practical utility.

Consequently the Commission rejects the Parliament's amendments (see annex).
