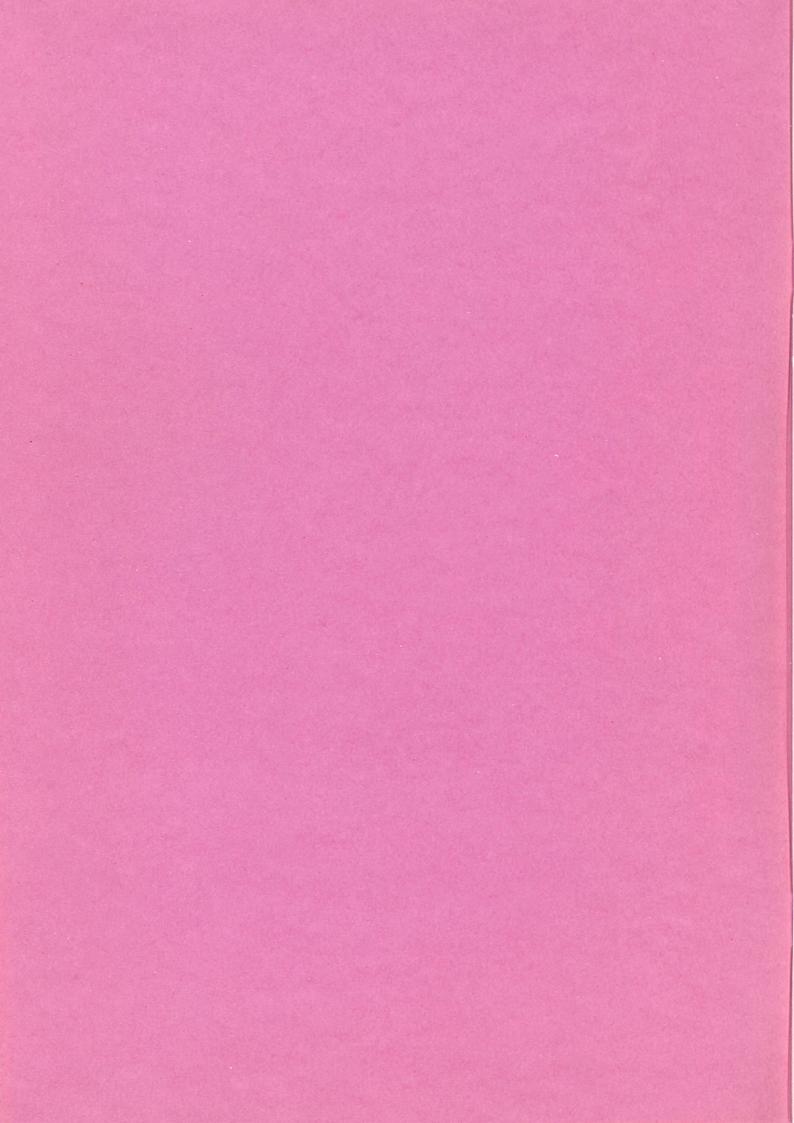


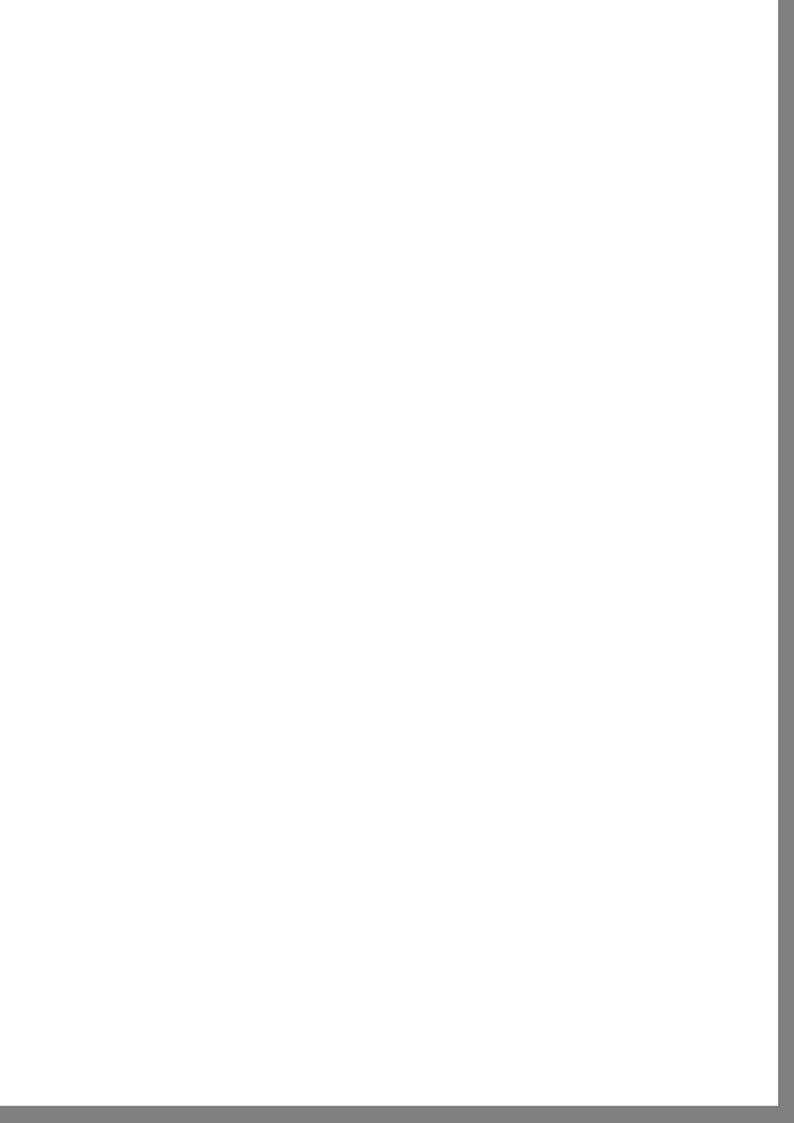

INTRODUCTION

This management report, drawn up by the Management Committee pursuant to Article 4 of the Decision establishing the Office for Official Publications of the European Communities, provides the institutions with an account of the Office's activities over the financial year 1983.

The members of the Management Committee in the year under review were:

- Mr H. J. Opitz, Secretary-General of the European Parliament;
- Mr N. Ersbøll, Secretary-General of the Council;
- Mr E. Noël, Secretary-General of the Commission and Mr J. C. Morel, Director-General for Personnel and Administration of the Commission;
- Mr P. E. Heim, Registrar of the Court of Justice;
- Mr R. Louet, Secretary-General of the Economic and Social Committee;
- Sir Norman Price, Member of the Court of Auditors, who was Chairman of the Management Committee in 1983, and, with effect from 17 October 1983, Mr A. Middelhoek, also a Member of the Court of Auditors.

The Management Committee held its annual meeting of members on 13 January 1984. Meetings of alternates were held on 17 March, 30 June and 24 November 1983. In addition, 21 written procedures were submitted to the Management Committee in the course of the year under review.



CHAPTER I

OFFICIAL JOURNAL

A. INTRODUCTION

The number of pages printed continues to fluctuate considerably from one month to the next. Production in May 1983, for example, was 14 536 pages, while production in December was 33 360 pages, in other words a ratio of 1:2.25. This clearly indicates that the Office's workload is not only extremely high in absolute terms, but that at certain times of the year — which are generally times at which work organization is most difficult — there are marked peaks.

The size of these fluctuations, which no amount of planning of legislative activity could forecast, makes the management of the Office highly complex. Another factor is that, all too often, the quality of copy is still so poor that large amounts of preparatory work are called for, disrupting and delaying production.

B. OUTPUT OF THE OFFICIAL JOURNAL

(1) The overall picture

After a few years of stability, production of the Official Journal in terms of numbers of pages has again begun to rise. It should be pointed out, however, that the levelling-off in the period 1981-82 was only apparent, as it was largely the result of cost-saving measures involving the presentation of the material, and not of any reduction in the volume of the latter.

(a) Number of pages per language

In 1983 the Official Journal totalled 35 341 pages/language compared with 32 672 in 1982. This represents an increase of 8.2% (see Figure 1, p. 10).

In all, 247 384 pages were produced.

(b) Number of issues

In 1983 1 010 issues of the Official Journal were published (988 in 1982), including 376 (373) in the L series, 361 (344) in the C series, 253 (253) in the S series and 20 issues carried over from 1982-83.

(c) S series

254 numbers of the S series were published in 1983 (including one number carried over from 1982-83), and the number of pages per language totalled 7 956 (7 244 in 1982), of which 5 824 pages were for invitations to tender (3 189 pages for public works, 1 456 for supply contracts and 1 179 for GATT procurement contracts).¹

The number of invitations to tender rose from 5 398 in 1982 to 5 824. The breakdown by country of public works, supplies and GATT notices of invitation to tender is shown in Table 1.

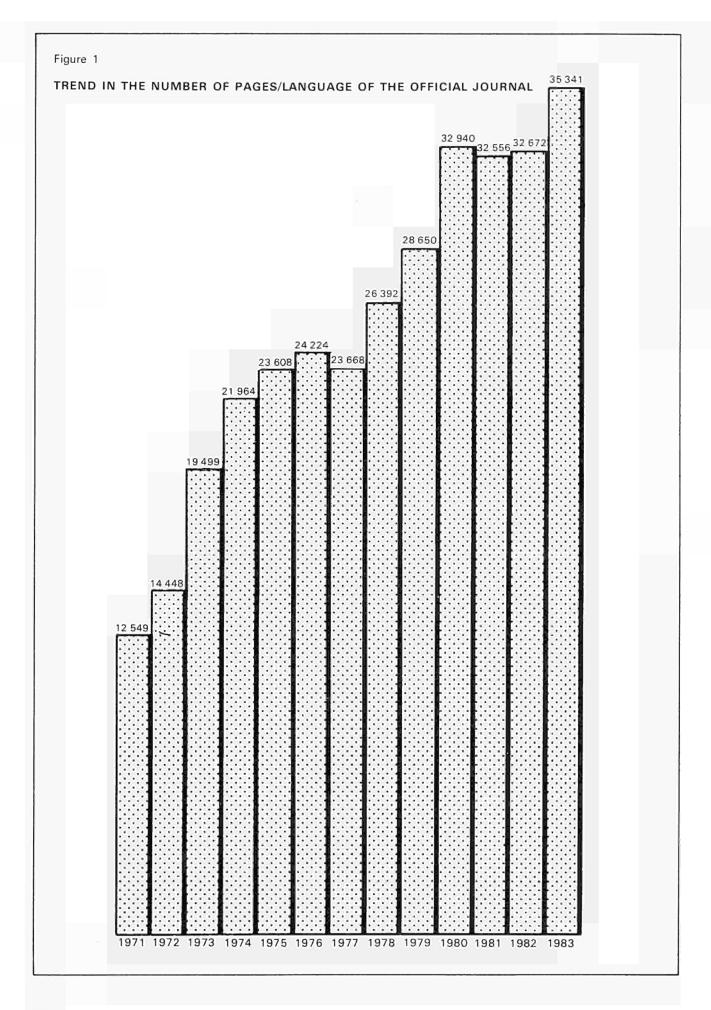

(d) Print run

Taking all languages together, the total print run of the Official Journal exceeded 19.6 million copies in 1983.

(2) Indexes to the Official Journal and Register of current Community legal instruments

(a) Indexes to the Official Journal

Publication deadlines were further reduced compared with those of the previous year. The monthly indexes (Volume 1) were published regularly within about six weeks of publication of the last number of the Official Journal in the month concerned.

Not only was the backlog affecting the Greek version in 1982 cleared, but the monthly indexes for 1983 were published simultaneously with the other language versions.

The monthly methodological tables (Volume 2) were published regularly one month after the publication of the last number of the Official Journal for the month concerned, including those for the Greek version.

The annual tables (Volumes 1 and 2) for 1982 were published between April and early June 1983, including the Greek version. In all, the total number of pages of monthly and annual tables (Volumes 1 and 2) was a clear indication of the scale of the reductions compared with the previous years:

Annual tables (1982): 3 680 pages Monthly tables (1983): 5 760 pages.

In 1984 the use of the Eurovoc multilingual thesaurus in conjunction with computer technology should make it possible to rationalize the new alphabetical tables and make documentary searches easier. Moreover, the methodological tables will be produced entirely by computer technology, which allows the basic composed text of the Official Journal to be re-used. This will save even more time and reduce costs considerably.

(b) Register of current Community legal instruments

Programming and composition of Volumes 1 and 2 of the fourth edition were completed in July 1983. Printing took place in August and September 1983. Delivery took place in October and November 1983 according to language. Production was therefore faster. A Greek version was published for the first time.

The number of pages printed is rising: Volume 1 contained 735 pages per language, while Volume 2 contained between 876 and 886 pages depending on the language version.

The fifth edition will be the first for which procedures developed for faster publication of this document are to be used. The aim is to publish the register in the first six months of 1984.

(3) Production of budget documents

In addition to the general budget of the European Communities published in the Official Journal by the Parliament, the Office is responsible for the Commission's preliminary draft and for the Council's draft of the budget, as well as any estimates of income and expenditure required by the institutions.

The Official Journal department takes responsibility for these documents so as to build up an uninterrupted sequence of successive amendments from the recorded text of the current year's general budget to that of the general budget being drawn up. In this way it was possible to publish the 1984 budget in the Official Journal of 16 January 1984 after the President of the European Parliament had recorded its final adoption on 20 December 1983.

(4) Publication of tariff documentation

The Office is responsible for the working documents of the Commission's Customs Union Service relating to transposition of the Common Customs Tariff and the nomenclature of goods for the external trade statistics of the Community and statistics of trade between Member States (Nimexe) in the harmonized system of codifying and designating goods.

The Office has, in cooperation with a subcontracting printer, set up a text processing system which allows both the real time monitoring of text preparation in its various stages and the establishment of a data base from which the new Common Customs Tariff and Nimexe, once transposed, can be extracted for fully automatic publication in the Official Journal.

These transposed legal instruments are scheduled to come into force on 1 January 1987. Their publication will be required as from 1 July 1985 so that the Member States can amend their national documents accordingly.

At the end of 1983, 62 chapters (out of 97) were at revision level 1 and 45 at revision level 2, which corresponds to the end of transposition for chapters 25 to 97 (industry).

For chapters 1 to 24 (agriculture) there will also be level 3 and level 4 revision.

The Office is currently processing five language versions (Dutch, English, French, German and Italian). The Danish and Greek versions will be included as soon as the Customs Union Service can arrange for their translation.

C. INVOICING

Tables 2 to 5 provide a breakdown of the invoicing of the various services provided by the Official Journal department to the institutions. The total cost of the Official Journal itself was 24 938 472 ECU (compared with 22 329 296.45 ECU in 1982) covering printing costs, transport costs and the cost of Office services. It should be noted that the cost per page showed an increase of only 5.2% over 1982. Table 3 shows the breakdown of indexes between 1982 and 1983 for monthly and annual tables.

PUBLICATIONS OTHER THAN THE OFFICIAL JOURNAL

A. OUTPUT

Output of publications other than the Official Journal may be summarized as follows:

- (i) The number of texts increased by 8.2% from 2 056 in 1982 to 2 224 in 1983;
- (ii) The number of proof-read pages was 155 907, compared with 147 556 in 1982, an increase of 5.7% (see Figure 2);
- (iii) The number of non-proof-read pages was 86 310, compared with 74 083 in 1982, a rise of 16.5% (see Figure 2).

B. BREAKDOWN OF OUTPUT

For the various institutions, the major rises were recorded for the Commission (+33%) followed by the Parliament (+24%).

The number of proof-read pages rose fairly evenly for all languages except Greek, where the workload increase evident in 1982 gave way to a slight fall.

C. INVENTORY OF RECORDS

The opening up to the public of the European Community's archives entailed large amounts of work in 1983, namely the general inventory of records containing classifications and lists of all the records, year by year. Access to the documents will be simplified by the provision of indexes.

The preparation of this inventory, which incorporates a considerable number of different items, called for close cooperation with the originating departments and the creation of a complex information processing system which was still compatible with the general cataloguing system already in use at the Office.

D. COST OF PUBLICATIONS

The total cost of publications was 15 661 869.46 ECU (compared with 12 445 364.10 ECU in 1982). The breakdown is given in Table 9 on page 19.

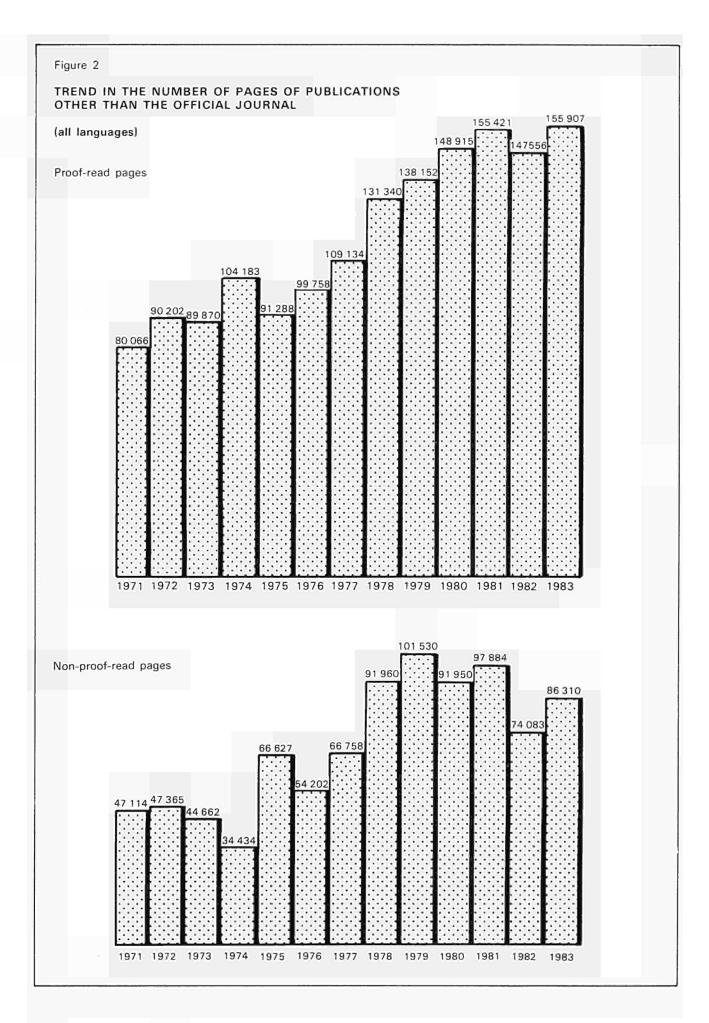

CHAPTER II

GENERAL SALES POLICY AND THE RESULTS OBTAINED, BREAKDOWN OF SALES REVENUE BY INSTITUTION

A. ORGANIZATION

1. Sales network

In 1983 the Office completed the restructuring of its sales network by concluding an agreement with the Press Office in Washington under which the latter would in future perform the general duties of a sales office in the United States.

The usual meeting between the Office and the heads of sales offices was held in Luxembourg.

2. EDC/libraries

Concern had been expressed on a number of occasions by representatives of the documentation centres or depository libraries, and in 1983 the Office therefore undertook to centralize the management of supplies sent to the European documentation centres and the depository libraries.

For this purpose a new section was set up within the Sales Department, and this section's workload was particularly heavy during the launch stage of the operation, involving:

- (i) the reclassification of the currently valid distribution rules;
- (ii) the development of a procedure for distributing and monitoring consignments;
- (iii) the seeking out and identification of publications hitherto unknown to the Publications Office, and
- (iv) a large amount of correspondence with the centres and the originating departments.

B. SALES PROMOTION

The 'Sales Promotion' section continued its activities in the fields of exhibitions, mailing lists, advertisements, etc.

The policy of acquiring new mailing lists for publicity material was continued, principally in close collaboration with other originating departments and ordering departments.

The Office also produced the monthly catalogue, the annual catalogue and the mini-catalogue, again in cooperation with other departments.

By way of general information the Office produced and distributed 22 different 'New issues' and cooperated on the distribution of 11 'New issues' and two pamphlets produced by another directorate-general.

Fifteen advertisements were published and the Office was represented at five exhibitions at book fairs.

C. COPYRIGHT

In 1983 the Office received 18 requests for copyright concessions, including:

(i) translation: 3 (2 Spanish and 1 Japanese)

(ii) partial reproduction: 13

(iii) full reproduction: 2

D. JOINT PUBLICATION

During the year under review the Office was able to implement the principles adopted with regard to joint publication.

This new production and distribution method for publications was of interest to the Economic and Social Committee in particular, and the Office carried out a number of operations on its behalf.

E. SALES RESULTS

1. Official Journal

Table 10 shows the trends in subscriptions to the L, C and S series of the Official Journal. The L and C series showed no upward or downward movement, whereas there was an increase of 14.83% for the S series.

This marked increase should, however, be seen in conjunction with the fall in sales in 1982 due to the expiry of a special agreement wiith the Centre Français du Commerce Extérieur.

Nevertheless, the results for 1983 were encouraging for the S series.

2. Other publications

Table 11 shows the trends in subscriptions to other publications.

With the exception of a drop in the sales of Euro-abstracts (-12.94%) the main bulk of sales produced encouraging results and showed some appreciable increase.

The publications which showed the greatest increase (*European Economy*, *Eurostatistics*, and above all the *Vocational training information bulletin*) are those for which a special promotional campaign had been run.

The *Vocational training information bulletin* showed an increase of 91.17%, which is particularly noteworthy.

In 1983 there was also a new subscription to COM documents. In spite of its comparatively high price the subscription was an undeniable success.

Circulation will undoubtedly rise further in 1984 following the introduction of a system of selective subscriptions worked out by the Office in 1983.

4. Electronic publishing

The Office continued the commercial management of the Cronos, Comext and TED (Tenders Electronic Daily) data bases. The first two are marketed exclusively by the hosts and produced royalties totalling some BFR 972 000.

The TED base is marketed simultaneously by the hosts and the Office directly (some 50 direct customers at present). Full marketing operations started after the pilot launch phase in September 1983.

The Office established some contacts with hosts or information distributors, and these operations will be continued in 1984. The commercial operation of TED produced an invoice total of some BFR 285 000 in 1983.

Furthermore, the Office, in conjunction with the Statistical Office, redefined the sales policy for magnetic tapes. A new tariff structure was drawn up and new purchasing conditions adopted. The sale of SOEC magnetic tapes gave rise to invoices totalling BFR 815 000.

E. SALES REVENUE

Gross sales turnover amounted to 3 370 419.12 ECU in 1983 (3 141 039.92 ECU in 1982).

The net payments received totalled 2 838 854.61 ECU, and the breakdown by institution is as follows:

ACCOUNTS OFFICE

A. BUDGET MANAGEMENT

Total Office expenditure rose from 15 404 794.69 ECU in 1982 to 16 145 131.47 ECU in 1983, representing an increase of 4.8%.

Expenditure under Title 1 (expenditure on staff) rose from 9 319 374.12 ECU to 9 744 071.55 ECU, representing an increase of 4.56%.

Expenditure under Title 2 (operating expenditure) rose from 6 085 420.57 ECU to 6 401 059.92 ECU in 1983, representing an increase of 5.18%.

Investment expenditure totalled 825 689.30 ECU in 1983, against 449 037.88 ECU in 1982.

Postal and delivery charges totalled 3 098 833.08 ECU in 1983, against 3 144 958.21 ECU in 1982. They represent 48.41% of all expenditure under Title 2.

The rate of utilization of the Office's budget appropriations, including amounts carried forward, was as follows: 88.06% for Title 1; 96.35% for Title 2.

Table 12 shows trends in the Office's expenditure between 1982 and 1983 and gives a breakdown of expenditure at 31 December 1983.

B. OPERATING RESULTS

1. Breakdown of the Office's expenditure for 1983

Table 13 shows the breakdown of Office expenditure in 1983 by department.

Table 14 shows the true cost of the services performed and the value of the invoices relating to the services provided by each department.

2. Sales account

The trading results are shown in Tables 15 and 16.

The assets side of the balance sheet as at 31 December 1983 shows:

- (i) the Office's financial resources, amounting to 2 103 597.59 ECU, compared with 1 271 691.44 ECU in 1982;
- (ii) a total of 1 084 599.16 ECU due from customers, compared with 718 644.55 ECU in 1982.

The items entered under liabilities represent:

- (i) payments into the suspense account, totalling 34 038.99 ECU (17 534.97 ECU in 1982);
- (ii) 952 045.39 ECU income outstanding at 31 December 1983 (686 669.25 ECU in 1982);
- (iii) 1 900 728.99 ECU revenue payable to the institutions.

Profit and loss account:

The debit side of the profit and loss account shows that general overheads amounted to 668 803.14 ECU, which represents 15% of total turnover in the year under review (32% in 1982).

The credit side of the profit and loss account shows a 6% increase in gross sales revenue in 1983 compared with the preceding year.

3. Allocation of net sales revenue

Table 17 shows the breakdown of total revenue by type of publication and the allocation of sales revenue to the institutions. Total revenue for the year amounted to 2 838 854.61 ECU, an increase of 40.9% compared with 1982 (2 015 240.98 ECU).

The Official Journal alone represented a total of 1 893 025.30 ECU (BFR 87 262 598), compared with 1 046 789.99 ECU (BFR 47 441 255) in 1982.

GENERAL AND TECHNICAL SERVICES

A. WORKSHOPS

1. Production

The output of the Office's workshops rose considerably in all sectors in the year under review (Table 18).

The increase was achieved in spite of a reduction of 11.7% in the number of hours invoiced (Table 19), indicating a sizeable rise in productivity. A comparison of output in terms of hours invoiced demonstrates this clearly:

Of particular note in the year under review is the contribution of the workshops to the distribution of COM documents, as the latter represent a considerable new workload (7 000 pages approximately, over and above an output of 17 300 pages). This special work was the reason for the marked improvement in productivity in the composition sector shown in the above table. If this factor is left out of the above comparison, productivity in terms of numbers of pages still rose by 40%.

The enhanced effectiveness of the workshops boosted output in spite of the fact that a number of posts suddenly became vacant and even allowed some posts to be reallocated. This explains the discrepancy between the number of hours theoretically included in the forecasts and the number of hours actually worked to cope with the workload (Table 18).

2. Invoicing

The total value of the invoices issued for printing and reprints of publications proper, together with forms, slips, etc., for use by the various departments was 1 948 799 ECU (1 975 722 ECU in 1982), comprising 1 604 940 ECU for labour and 343 859 ECU for materials. The breakdown of this total by institution is given in Table 21.

B. DISPATCHING

The development of activities in this sector is shown in detail in Table 22. To accelerate distribution of the Official Journal and other publications and to handle the increased volume of dispatching, a document inserting machine and an addressing machine were purchased.

C. MICROGRAPHIC SECTOR

Details of the work carried out are shown in Table 24. It proved necessary to purchase two planetary cameras and a microfiche duplicating machine to supplement the equipment of this rapidly expanding section.

D. THE PUBLICATIONS OFFICE BUILDING

The carcass works on the extension of the Office's new building were finished according to plan on 31 December 1983. Work is proceeding normally.

Following the alterations carried out in the building currently occupied, the Dispatching section was moved for the duration of the works to a warehouse rented in the vicinity of the Office's main building.

F. 'NEW DEVELOPMENTS' SECTION

The projects launched in preceding years were continued without interruption. Some projects became operational, and the first results of the effort invested are becoming apparent. Experience gained in the use of the new technologies and rapid progress in the computer field prompted ideas for new production methods for various publications and, in more general terms, for making the publishing activities of the Communities more effective and more economical.

New technology in the publishing field

- Video transmission of the Supplement to the Official Journal

The TED (Tenders Electronic Daily) data base was in operation on a regular basis after its launch in October 1983. A number of improvements suggested by users were incorporated into the software. A procedure for the electronic transfer of data to the data bases of licensed hosts was created. Hitherto, the transfer had been on the basis of magnetic tapes. Work on the incorporation of invitations to tender from third countries, mainly Japan and the United States of America, continued and should produce operational results in the first quarter of 1984.

- Computerized editorial system at the Publications Office

The procedure for inviting tenders for the installation of an editorial system capable of electronic management of multilingual texts through all the stages of the publication process was successfully completed, and a contract was signed on 13 January 1984. The system will be operational in June 1984, and the Supplement to the Official Journal will actually be produced on this system as from September 1984.

Re-use of the texts published in the Supplement to the Official Journal

Using the TED data base, a reference file of awarding authorities was created and the invitations to tender which were repetitive in nature were identified. The various language versions of these notices will be checked by the translation department. In this way a stock of re-usable texts will be produced which can be stored in the editorial system, allowing substantial savings both in translation and composition.

- Standard format for the exchange of composed texts by telematics

The standard format was used on a daily basis for the transfer of 'straightforward' texts. The theoretical work in connection with the acceptance of typographically complex texts and tables was completed. Practical tests to validate the results are proceeding smoothly. In addition, the structure of the files for these transfers was made generally compatible on the basis of the Unisist recommendations and is now being applied to such diverse publications as the Supplement to the Official Journal, the budget documents, catalogues, etc.

A format reference manual is in preparation and will form an integral part of the technical specifications for all future invitations to tender.

- Indexing

The first version of the Eurovoc multilingual macrothesaurus was completed at the end of 1983.

Eurovoc, whose semantic relations (hierarchical, equivalence and associative) are based on the AFNOR, ISO and BS standards, covers all the fields of Community language. It comprises 19 major subject fields (arranged by subject) and is divided into 149 microthesauri, each of which contains one or more top terms. There are some 5 000 descriptors, with 4 000 to 4 500 non-descriptors depending on the language version.

With effect from the beginning of 1984 the Office will use the Eurovoc system for indexing the Official Journal Tables) and will subsequently extend it to cover other publications.

- Documents COM final

Following the study undertaken in 1982 the operational stage of the production of COM final documents started on 1 May, with the Office providing composition, trimming, microfilming and distribution on the basis of subscriptions. The backlog of documents published in the first four months was cleared in the third quarter.

Some 4 000 documents and 1 400 microfiches (all languages) were distributed to the members of the public concerned. In addition, a periodic catalogue was produced. This catalogue, which is subject-based, cumulative and was produced with computer technology, helps users in documentary searches.

Eight periodic catalogues and one annual catalogue will be published for 1983. The annual catalogue, which incorporates all the data published in the periodic catalogues, will be distributed at the end of the first quarter of 1984.

At the request of the European Parliament and the Economic and Social Committee some studies were begun at the end of 1983 to establish whether the same service could be provided for these institutions' documents in the foreseeable future.

Given the complexity of these operations, a computerized system for the follow-up and coordination of this work was devised and implemented.

The section also regularly advised the other departments at the Office on computer aspects of publishing.

Automated distribution

The management of mailing lists and subscriptions continued normally using the computer resources of the Commission's Computer Centre and the Office's own resources. A new mini-computer became operational in September and the first terminals were connected. After a period of familiarization the Office's staff began work on the conversion of existing software and the installation of new software packages. An accounts management software package was installed and is currently undergoing tests to determine how it can be adapted to satisfy the Office's specific requirements. A data base management system has also been installed with a view to using it to take over the mailing lists.

Automated office equipment

The applications installed in the previous years (see 14th annual management report) were operated normally and further improved.

To meet growing demand for word processing capacity, five stand-alone work-stations were purchased, bringing to 20 the total number of work-stations installed.

The invitation to tender for the computerized presentation of estimates produced no practical results in view of the Commission's choice of data base management software. A detailed review of the specifications and a renewed study of the market are required as far as the latter is concerned.

CHAPTER IV

THE PRINTING MARKET AND THE GEOGRAPHICAL SPREAD OF CONTRACTS WITH OUTSIDE FIRMS

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THE PRINTING MARKET AND THE GEOGRAPHICAL SPREAD OF CONTRACTS WITH OUTSIDE FIRMS

In 1983 the operation, started in 1982, to conclude new general contracts was completed, and the new general contracts came into effect.

The market study, which involved 334 firms, allowed a statistical comparison of the prices applied in the various countries of the Community for identical services. The study, which was widely distributed, generated keen interest in printing circles and should allow the competition factor to be more fully exploited in the light of a more transparent market.

The immediate effect of this was an appreciable fall in prices compared with those applied for earlier contracts.

Lastly, it should be noted that the general contracts represent the first application of an entirely new style of invitations to tender which considerably reduces the typing and translation involved in their production and, in spite of the novelty aspect, no major problems arose with regard to the application of these contracts.

In all, of the 70 contracts currently managed by the Office, two-thirds are less than two years old, a fact which demonstrates the effort made to conclude new contracts.

The overall computerized management and planning system progressively implemented during the year under review included the installation of the financial and administrative planning module.

The work of the section (see Table 26) further increased, and 15 invitations to tender were issued which in turn led to 56 new contracts, some of which are the result of the market studies conducted in 1982.

In addition, 114 requests for additional payments were dealt with, and credit notes totalling 72 145.45 ECU were obtained as a result of invoice checking.

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CHAPTER V

STAFF OF THE OFFICE AND PERSONNEL QUESTIONS



STAFF OF THE OFFICE AND PERSONNEL QUESTIONS

A. WORKFORCE

As in previous years, there were adjustments between the staff at the Commission and that at the Office in connection with the exchange of promotion possibilities in accordance with the decision of 1980.

In 1983 four new posts — two B and two C posts — were added to the establishment plan of the Office. At 31 December 1983 255 officials and one member of temporary staff were employed at the Office.

B. AUXILIARY STAFF

Owing to the need to replace officials on maternity leave, extended sick leave or to an excessive workload in certain sectors, the Office was obliged to take on auxiliary staff for limited periods of three to four months. At 31 December 1983 only one member of auxiliary staff was still employed at the Office.

C. LOCAL STAFF

Budget appropriations in 1983 allowed 61 members of local staff to be employed. The Office continued its policy of establishing these members of staff in 1983. Accordingly, 23 members of the local staff who had passed internal competitions were established as probationer officials (5 in category C and 18 in category D). This process of establishing staff anticipated the new possibilities created in the 1984 budget.

In addition, there was some recruitment to strengthen the dispatching teams for the Official Journal, in particular the night teams. As 20 out of 23 members of local staff were established by converting the local staff posts into permanent posts, the permitted strength of local staff at the Office was lowered to 41.

On 1 December 1983, 38 members of local staff were employed at the Office and 3 posts were vacant.

Table 28 shows in detail the administrative procedures relating to recruitment and staff careers at the Office.

The index of the cost of living in Luxembourg was applied to the remuneration of freelance proof-readers.

E. VOCATIONAL TRAINING

Table 29 provides a breakdown of the number of officials registered for various training courses. An increasing number of courses and seminars related to data processing, and this trend is likely to continue in years to come.

F. MANAGEMENT/STAFF CONSULTATIONS

On 18 April 1984 the trade union representatives met the representatives of the Office's Management Committee, the chair being taken by the Committee Chairman-in-Office, Mr Middelhoek.

The Director described the main features of the year under review and outlined the major short- and medium-term prospects for the work of the Office in the field of publishing and production.

The following matters were also discussed at the request of the staff representatives:

1. Staff requests with regard to the 1985 budget

At the request of the trade union representatives the management summarized the factors underlying the staff requests for 1985.

In order to meet commitments in the event of Spain and Portugal joining the Community on 1 January 1986 the Office must make preparations to publish in 1985, in the two new official languages, all the secondary Community legislation in force on the date of the accession.

According to the estimates produced by the relevant departments of the Commission the number of pages to be produced will increase to between 35 000 and 40 000 printed pages for each language. This figure represents one year's production of the Official Journal for each special edition. To meet this demand the Office will be asking for a number of posts to match the workload, namely 14 temporary B posts, in the budget discussions. If these posts become available the pressure on existing resources will be lessened and the recruitment of successful candidates from proof-reader competitions will be made easier.

As regards the establishment of local staff, the Director confirmed the request to establish all the local staff working at the Office, with the exception of staff working at night on the dispatching of the Official Journal. In fact, under the current provisions of the regulations only local staff may work night-shifts in teams. As the agreement between the Office and the staff representatives provides for the Office's own staff to work at night on dispatching the Official Journal, this staff must of necessity be local staff. The Office had of course requested the Commission to take steps to include this type of work in Council Regulation No 300/77 determining the categories of officials entitled to allowances for shiftwork, and the rates and conditions thereof.

It should, however, be borne in mind that political pressures advocating a decentralization of printing activities — and consequently of dispatching — of the Official Journal, as well as the importance which the electronic publication of the Official Journal will inevitably assume, will have a negative effect on the duration for which the current dispatching procedure can be maintained.

Nevertheless, the budgetary authority had refused additional appropriations for local staff under the 1984 budget to replace outside staff on the night dispatching of the Official Journal. The Office would resubmit the request.

As regards the request for staff in 1985, the trade union representatives also raised the question of equal opportunities for promotion and careers for Office staff *vis-à-vis* that of the Commission.

The Office stressed that its staff policy had always been successfully oriented towards achieving a perfect balance between the two administrations, and the request for local staff and some other posts to be upgraded in 1985 should also have some effect. The representatives of the trade unions nevertheless raised the point that, for certain grades and categories, there seemed to be less scope than at the Commission.

In conclusion, it was pointed out that in all questions affecting the Office's staff requirements and establishment plan the competent authority was the Management Committee. If the staff representatives felt the need for discussions on these points, they would have to be held within that framework, and the procedures followed by the Commission in its own affairs should be followed *mutatis mutandis*.

2. Freelance proof-readers

The proof-readers' competition had been held, and a rapid processing of recruitments and the application of the code of good conduct were planned. However, the Office would always need freelance proof-readers on whom it could call when the normal workload was exceeded. It was essential to be able to meet the priorities set by the institutions. A meeting with the representatives of the Staff Committee would be held to implement the code of good conduct.

3. Effect of new printing technology at the Office

As agreed, the representatives of the trade unions had received a report describing the effects of new technology on the structure and operation of the Office.

On this point the Director stressed that the introduction of new equipment and procedures would always go hand-in-hand with appropriate programmes to train staff for the new kind of work. As regards working conditions he confirmed that the Office would apply the guidelines drawn up by the Commission.

It was agreed that the report would be studied by the trade unions before it was discussed with the management of the Office.

4. Buildings

The Director informed the trade union representatives of the state of progress on the extension to the Euroffice building as well as on the relevant budgetary negotiations.

The trade union representatives stressed the precarious situation of the dispatching service owing to the age of the storeroom.

5. The Community budget situation

The Chairman of the Management Committee emphasized the degree of uncertainty which surrounded the discussions on the 1985 budget. The Office had always counted on a degree of understanding on the part of the budgetary authorities, but it was likely that the current situation would also have repercussions on the activities of the Office.

CHAPTER VI

REPORT ON THE APPLICATION OF THE CURRENT PROVISIONS RELATING TO MEDIUM- AND LONG-TERM TRANSLATIONS



REPORT ON THE APPLICATION OF THE CURRENT PROVISIONS RELATING TO MEDIUM- AND LONG-TERM TRANSLATIONS

Table 29 shows the translation work done in 1983 on behalf of the Office and institutions under the agreement between the Commission of the European Communities and the Office for Official Publications of the European Communities concerning the attachment to the Office of the Medium- and Long-term Translation Service.

A. WORK DONE FOR THE EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT

(a) Reports of proceedings

In 1983 the MLTTS was responsible for the translation of one day of debates of the report of proceedings for each of the 11 part-sessions and one extraordinary session (Budget) of the European Parliament.

The portion of the reports of proceedings translated by the MLTTS represented approximately 250 standard typed pages for each part-session. The total for 1983 includes the figures for December 1982, while those for December of the year under review will be included in the returns for 1984.

The workload in the various target languages varies with the number of speeches in the other languages. The less a particular language is used during the debates, the more the workload of the corresponding translation department increases.

The deadlines for this translation work are approximately one month. The delays in the translation of the proceedings into Greek were again considerably less than in the preceding year.

In 1983 the MLTTS translated 21 134 pages. The decrease over the preceding year is explained partly by the fact that the MLTTS now translates only one day of the debates, and partly by the simplified procedures adopted for explanations of vote and by a reduction in speaking time, and consequently in the length of the verbatim report of proceedings.

(b) Miscellaneous

This heading covers documents of all kinds, in particular minutes translated into Greek and Danish by the MLTTS.

B. WORK DONE FOR THE COUNCIL

The 30th review of the Council's work ran to 449 pages, which were translated into all the official languages — a total of 2 694 pages.

C. WORK DONE FOR THE PUBLICATIONS OFFICE

(a) Invitations to tender

Table 30 shows the number of pages of invitations to tender for public works and supply contracts, including type B notices, published pursuant to the Agreement on government procurement concluded under GATT.

In 1983 translations of invitations to tender for public works contracts accounted for 59.7% of the total number of pages translated under the agreement concerning the MLTTS (compared with 49.77% in 1982). These translations arrived at the rate of 20 documents of 1.35 pages per day, representing 27 pages for translation into six target languages, i.e. a total of 162 pages/day. The time allowed for translation of invitations to tender is two working days. The total number of pages translated was higher than in the preceding year.

It should be noted that although the number of texts translated from Greek remains modest (79), it is increasing at a constant rate. The task of translation from that language posed many problems, particularly with regard to technical terminology.

It is worth pointing out, finally, that the degree of difficult, and technical complexity of the documents, in particular as far as the supply of computer equipment is concerned, is growing all the time.

(b) Management report and miscellaneous

The heading 'Management report and miscellaneous' (65 + 2519 pages in 1983) includes the invitations to tender for printing work issued by the Publications Office. The remainder consists of various documents relating to the Office's activities in respect of which the Office requested a translation.

D. GENERAL OBSERVATIONS

In 1983 the MLTTS met its obligations under the terms of the agreement between the Commission and the Office. Generally speaking, deadlines were observed.

In spite of the shortage of typists, the typing of fair copies of the various texts destined for printing gave no cause for complaint.

Cooperation between the Office's departments and those of the various institutions posed no insurmountable problems and may be deemed excellent.
