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Introduction

The Publications Office is an interinstitutional body governed by a Management Committee consisting of the Secretaries-General of the institutions, the Registrar of the Court of Justice and the Director-General for Personnel and Administration of the Commission. It is responsible for all the editorial work required to enable the institutions and other bodies of the European Union to meet their publishing obligations.

This Management Report, drawn up by the Management Committee pursuant to Article 4 of the Decision establishing the Office for Official Publications of the European Communities, provides the Institutions with an account of the Office's activities during the year under review.

- Mr Dietrich Pause, Secretary-General of the Committee of the Regions, until 30 August 1999; Mr Vincenzo Falcone, acting Secretary-General of the Committee of the Regions, as from 1 September 1999.

The Management Committee met on 9 June (full members) and on 16 February, 16 March and 12 October (alternate members). In addition, 22 written procedures were submitted to the Management Committee in 1999.

The Management Committee completed its work on reformulating the basic texts establishing the Office. The draft decision is currently being adopted by the various institutions. Publication of the decision in the Official Journal will enable work to begin on recasting the Office's operating rules and the Management Committee's rules of procedure.

The preliminary draft budget for 2000 that the Management Committee submitted to the budgetary authority was slightly up on 1999 (+ 2.42 %). This in fact represented zero growth, given the increase in the cost of living. The Management Committee noted with satisfaction that its request for a strengthening of the management structures, and the conversion of a number of posts to higher categories had been met. The new organisation which is thereby established will make it possible to respond more effectively to the qualitative and quantitative requirements resulting from the various aspects of developments in the role of the Office's work.

1999 saw continued support for electronic publishing projects and was marked by the stabilisation and expansion of systems set up over the year (S series of the Official Journal on CD-ROM and the Internet, EUR-Lex on the Internet and CELEX+) and by the development of new projects (L and C series of the Official Journal on CD-ROM, OJ C E (an exclusively electronic Official Journal)).

The Management Committee began a new, large-scale project — an integrated, complete and user-friendly tool for accessing legal texts, and a single portal for accessing European Union law. An interinstitutional task force provided a detailed report on the requirements and a draft design for an integrated system based on looking for synergies between the existing systems (EUR-Lex, EUDOR and CELEX) and respecting the principles of user-friendliness, simplicity, exhaustiveness, cost-efficiency and savings resulting from this rationalisation. For reasons of coherence, the Management Committee also decided to merge the various supervisory structures within the Interinstitutional Group Lex (GIL).

With regard to electronic publishing, the alternate members of the Management Committee came together as a working party in order to examine in detail the future of electronic publishing, with a view to submitting an interim report to the full members of the Management Committee during 2000.

In accordance with the Management Committee's request, the microfiche edition of the Official Journal was discontinued as of 31 December 1999. The CD-ROM edition took its place in the range of products offered by the Office as from 1 January 2000. Nonetheless, in order to satisfy certain customers' requests to continue providing this format, the Office, with the Management Committee's approval, granted a licence to publish the Official Journal on microfiche to a private publishing house which specialises in the production and marketing of collections on microfiche. This agreement is part of the partnership with the private publishing sector.

Under the guidance of an interinstitutional committee, progress was made on preparing an invitation to tender to establish new contractual arrangements for multimedia publications and Internet publishing.

Restructuring of the system for consolidating Community law continued under the auspices of an interinstitutional working party which was set up by the Management Committee and asked to finalise the work programme put forward by the Commission Secretariat-General. This group approved the principles before the programme was set up, and identified the consolidated products which are to be produced and made available on CELEX and EUR-Lex. At the end of the year, the Office published a new invitation to tender. When the contract is concluded, the revised system will be reinforced by a 'publishing' provider who carries out the work and cooperates with the 'intellectual' provider of legal expertise who was already chosen during the year.

Following the ratification of the Treaty of Amsterdam, the Management Committee agreed that a consolidated edition of the Treaties should be published on paper and on CD-ROM. The French language version was published on paper at the end of the year; other language versions and the CD-ROM edition will follow early in 2000.

Relations with the staff of the Office were also the subject of particular attention throughout the year. The Chairman held a policy concertation meeting with representatives of the unions and professional organisations, and at the beginning of the year the Management Committee met staff representatives, with a view to considering the budget for the following year

(preliminary draft budget 2000). Mrs Reding, the Commissioner responsible for the Publications Office, also made a point of meeting the representatives of the unions and professional organisations at the Office on 7 October 1999.

Renovation work on the Mercier building, which houses most of the Office's departments, began in spring 1999. This work, which is being financed by the owners of the building, is expected to last three years. The Office has set up a series of planning, monitoring and coordinating groups which work in close cooperation with staff representatives and the safety and occupational hygiene departments in order to ensure that the work is carried out as efficiently as possible while keeping the inconvenience and the disturbances of the staff to a minimum. The staff were kept continuously informed of the schedule and the progress of the work via a dedicated site incorporated in the Office's intranet.

On 22 October 1999, the Office celebrated the 30th anniversary of its establishment at an official ceremony, to which the Office's staff were invited by the Management Committee. Many eminent personalities from the world of politics and from the institutions also attended this event, which was widely covered by the press and the media.

1999 — Main trends

Following the conclusion of new framework contracts for the production of the Official Journal, one of the main features of 1999 was the increased concentration on the preparation of industry-standard electronic files (SGML, HTML, Formex). These files have become the foundation of the production line. Various media are published simultaneously, each medium being a sub-product of the main file.

Moreover, the electronic publishing systems set up in 1998 and 1999 (S series of the Official Journal on CD-ROM and the Internet, EUR-Lex on the Internet and CELEX+) were stabilised and expanded. Other projects — such as the L and C series of the Official Journal on CD-ROM, and an entirely electronic edition of the Official Journal known as OJ C E — were launched and developed over the year.

The institutions' determination to improve the transparency of their work and make it easier for the citizens of Europe to gain access to documents — confirmed by a European Parliament resolution of 12 January 1999 — led to the setting up of a project to create a single portal for accessing European Union law. The institutions' legal databases (EUR-Lex, EUDOR and CELEX) will be linked to this portal. A detailed report on the requirements and a draft design were prepared in 1999. A single supervisory structure is overseeing the implementation.

It is important to stress that the very encouraging growth in the use of these three bases did not lead to a proportional decrease in the use of the paper editions. This suggests very clearly that the dissemination of legal documents has improved and reached more people, which is in line with the task entrusted to the Office by the institutions in their quest to make EU information, and legal information in particular, more transparent and accessible.

Within the framework of the permanent effort that the Publications Office undertakes to contain or even reduce the publication costs, the financial year 1999 was particularly profitable in the field of the reduction of production costs of the Official Journal:

- adoption of a new typeface making it possible to include more characters per line and an increase of the type area, leading to a 15–20 % reduction of the number of pages;
- new contracts operational as from April, providing reduced prices which reflect technological progress in the field of publishing;
- in September launching of the OJ C E (electronic), which reduced the printing costs by the equivalent of approximately 30 000 pages;
- the discontinuation of the paper edition of the Supplement to the Official Journal covered a complete year for the first time.

To illustrate this reduction in costs, the Commission's budget for the OJ L+C has been reduced by 34.5 % over five accounting years (in million ecu/euro: 43.5 in 1996, 40 in 1997, 36.9 in 1998, 33.2 in 1999 and 28.5 in 2000).

For the Office, however, the fact that some databases (e.g. TED —Tenders Electronic Daily) are free of charge and some products (e.g. the paper edition of the Official Journal S series) have been discontinued, coupled with a policy of low pricing for products still on sale, has led to a significant loss of revenue in 1999. These losses come on top of those incurred prior to 1999, after the fall in the number of paid subscriptions, in particular, when free on-line products were introduced (EUR-Lex, ECLAS — European Commission automated library system).

The loss of income caused by discontinuing the S series of the Official Journal and by making TED free of charge is estimated at almost EUR 5 million. The appropriations available to provide customer service (help-desk), among other things, proved insufficient over the year and will need to be adjusted in future.

Moreover, the policy of free information inevitably leads to a gradual disaffection in the network of intermediaries. To halt this development, which may be damaging to the institution's policy on information, it will be necessary to examine the role and the potential future of these intermediaries.

In the 30 years since its inception, the Office has witnessed profound technological changes that have revolutionised the world of publishing. The speed of these changes and of the attendant changes in consumers' habits is increasing over time. Nevertheless, the criteria for production and distribution — quality, efficiency and cost-effectiveness — must remain unchanged.

It is worth emphasising that the percentage of the Office's total production which is still published on paper remains relatively high since, up to now, only the legislative documents published in the paper editions of the L and C series of the Official Journal are deemed authentic. Nonetheless, in 1999, other products (such as the S series of the OJ) which are mainly for professional use, moved from a format which was once exclusively paper to one which will be exclusively electronic from now on. Moreover, a purely electronic edition of the Official Journal, called the OJ C E, was launched in 1999. It already contains the Commission's preparatory acts and, from the beginning of 2000, will reproduce the Parliament's written questions.

In terms of sales revenue, information in non-paper formats accounts for around 20 %. But this figure barely reflects the much higher level of investment in terms of human and financial resources that the Office dedicates to publishing and distributing information electronically, both free of charge and for payment, and the relative amount of consultation of electronic publications as compared to paper editions.

Like every other organisation whose tools and products are highly computerised, in 1999 the Office devoted a great deal of effort to checking all of its systems and products and adapting them to protect them from the 'Y2K bug'. This thorough preparation meant that the changeover occurred without any major problems.

As every year, the Office endeavoured to make maximum use of the budgetary resources allocated to it, with the out-turn of the budget reaching 99.68 % of the available appropriations.

The resignation of the Commission in spring 1999 delayed the planned restructuring of the Office, which, among other things, had included the setting up of a 'Production' Directorate and a 'Reception' team reporting directly to the Director of Production. This restructuring plan was approved by the Management Committee and subsequently, in November 1999, by the Commission. Following its approval, a new organisation chart was distributed, and the vacancy for the position of Director of Production was published.

The crisis within the Commission — the main client institution — and its resulting decision to handle routine business only, also affected actual production. The number of publications instigated by Commission departments slowed down, and this contributed in large measure to the drop in the number of published titles (down 4.39 %).

1.1. Official Journal

1.1.1. General

(a) The new contracts covering production of the Official Journal came into force on 1 April 1999. Two previous printers did not have their contracts renewed, and a new printer was selected. Overall, the number of suppliers decreased.

Technically, the new contracts are an important step, as they require production lines (pre-press) to be completely SGML-based, so as to ensure that output files are fully compliant with Formex V.3, which lends itself to archiving and re-use. Getting these new techniques up and running proved a long and difficult task, despite great efforts on all sides.

- (b) A purely electronic Official Journal was created in 1999, the OJ C E ('E' for electronic), where all the Commission's preparatory acts are published (2 596 pages in the second half of 1999). Parliament's written questions will also be included shortly. An important characteristic of this Official Journal is that there is no physical version, apart from three CD-ROMs for archiving purposes. The electronic versions of the preparatory acts that the Commission produces and sends to the Office using Greffe 2000 are thus prepared and published completely electronically.
- (c) Because of the year 2000, many of the major computer systems used every day to produce the Official Journal had to be renewed. Although this operation was planned well in advance, the bulk of the work was concentrated in the second half of the year and added to the workload of the Official Journal teams, particularly in the fields of public procurement and the automated publication of periodicals.

1.1.2. Production

1.1.2.1. Official Journal

(a) OJ L + C: while the page count of the OJ L series decreased by around 2 %, that of the OJ C series appears to have dropped by almost 20 %, although the actual decrease is of the order of 14 % since 15 000 pages of the European Parliament's OJ, which, in the past, would have been counted in 1999, are to be counted under the current year from now on. This change was made because of an adjustment to the publication schedule of the minutes of the European Parliament's sessions to ensure that the monthly OJ CD-ROM is published regularly.

Despite this, there are still peaks in the workload towards the end of the year (production for the OJ L series was almost double that of the monthly average) and, to a lesser extent, in July. These production peaks cause significant problems in terms of meeting publishing deadlines and inevitably have financial consequences, i.e. cost overruns.

To evaluate the change in workload correctly with regard to the number of pages published, it is necessary to take into account a change in the presentation of the Official Journal (a new character font, Albertina) that took place in the second quarter of 1999. This makes it possible to lower the page count by around 12 % for the same amount of text.

(b) OJ S: although publication of Japanese and United States notices was stopped on 30 June 1999, the number of published notices was practically unchanged, year on year. This is indicative of strong growth in the number of notices from the European Union, and from France in particular.

A new, fully electronic production line was set up; this was one of 1999's major projects. In addition to sending notices by mail (which are immediately scanned) and by fax, contracting authorities can now send electronic notices via the Internet or in blocks in XML format through relay centres, which are generally the national Official Journals.

1.1.2.2. Budget documents

The Office published the preliminary draft and draft budgets, which, taking all 11 language versions together, amounted to 20 724 pages (1 884 per language) and 16 896 pages (1 536 per language) respectively.

1.1.2.3. Decentralised bodies

A total of 78 787 trade marks were published in the Official Journal of the Office for Harmonisation in the Internal Market — 65.5 % more than in 1998.

1.1.3. OJ L + C CD-ROM

Production of the monthly OJ L + C CD-ROM began in 1999. The Official Journal collections for each year will also be available on two CD-ROMs per language version. The production runs for these products are constantly increasing (see also 1.4.4.2).

1.1.4. OJ S CD-ROM

A new version of this CD-ROM was launched in 1999. It enables subscribers to enjoy the easy access of CD-ROMs while also providing easy Internet access to the latest updates and the archives included in the TED (Tenders Electronic Daily) database. The very latest technology was needed to achieve this, and some teething problems were encountered. These have now been resolved.

1.1.5. Other CD-ROMs

CD-ROM and paper editions of customs documents (TARIC, Combined Nomenclature) were published at the same time, making it possible to reduce the print run for the paper editions. Publication of the trade marks bulletin (OHIM) on CD-ROM continued unchanged.

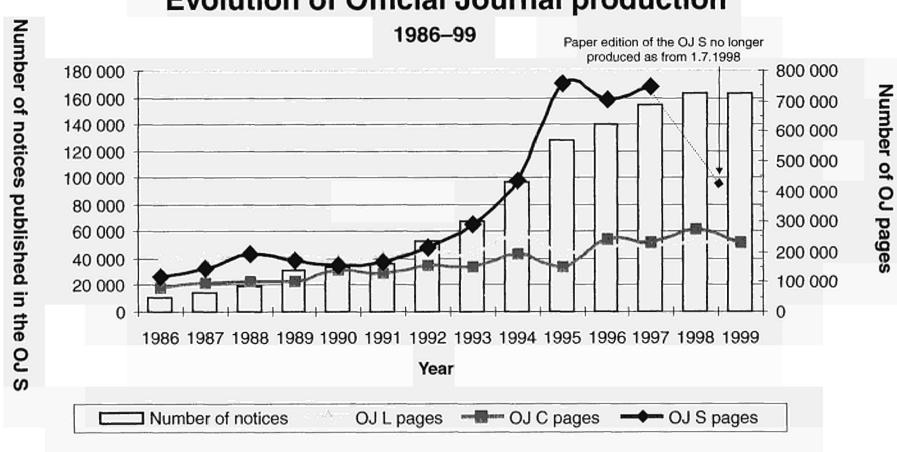

1.2. Publications

1.2.1. General

The optimisation of the various stages of production of publications and the computerisation of all those involved both internally (Publications Office, translation services, authors) and externally (service providers) continued during 1999.

It should be noted in this connection that:

- around 90 % of texts were cleaned up using semi-automatic correction tools; following a major effort to provide training for all proof-readers, completed early in 1999, the intensive use of this new production environment throughout the year led to an increase in productivity;
- increasing use of the telematics infrastructure between the various parties involved in the production line (file transfer procedures, computerised letterboxes, electronic acknowledgements) made the processes for transferring data more reliable and considerably shortened production times, thereby significantly reducing the number of missions by proof-readers (down 40%). These procedures were used for the monthly Bulletin and the General Report of the European Union and, in part, for recurring publications;
- a centre for the automatic collection and routeing of electronic files was set up in the unit, regulating the flow of more than 3 700 files in 1999.
 This development of a workflow tool was the first example of the use of the new Management Information System (MIS) project currently under development.

As part of the efforts to standardise drafting, the *Interinstitutional style guide* continued to arouse growing interest in the institutions and various outside bodies. This guide contains a set of uniform drafting conventions and recommendations in all official languages, making it a useful tool for the preparation of institutional texts. Its purpose is to facilitate everyday working practices. Its use enables considerable reductions to be achieved in costs and production times for publications and ensures consistency between texts and a better overall production quality. After being distributed in paper form, all language versions of the style guide have been placed online on EuropaTeam on the EUR-OP website, the interinstitutional intranet server. Dissemination on the Internet is also being finalised and should be followed by the introduction of regular updating procedures.

As in previous years, the *Interinstitutional directory* appeared only once in the 11 languages. With the advent of the new millennium, it was necessary to give priority to developing the new version of the multilingual database, which is used to produce the organisation plans, and of the IDEA computerised publication. The base is due to start up at the beginning of January 2000.

1.2.2. Production

The volume of work in 1999 was slightly down on the previous year (-3 % in terms of the number of brochures published and -8 % in total pages produced).

This table shows that the number of proof-read pages remained at the same level as in 1998, even though proof-reading resources fell by around 6 %.

On the other hand, the decrease in camera-ready publications is chiefly due to the falling volume of publications on demand (POD) during the second half year.

The main regular publications (in terms of deadlines and quality) were the following:

- General Report of the European Union plus supplements,
- annual reports for the main directorates-general of the Commission, the Court of Auditors, and the agencies and other bodies of the European Union.

Other high-profile publications included:

- Treaties (over 1 000 pages, 12 language versions),
- Economic and monetary union Compendium of Community legislation, Economic and Financial Affairs DG (major project to prepare manuscripts in the 11 language versions from the Official Journal and Internet documents on the basis of a list provided by the originating department),
- Compendium of legislation (European Central Bank),
- Infopacks prepared by DG Commerce (WTO Conference in Seattle),
- information campaign for the new Commission (DG Education and Culture),
- information campaign in the run-up to the European Parliament elections (regional brochures).

The Graphic Design Office was involved in most of the publications mentioned above, including in the preparation of events and brochures marking the 30th anniversary of the Publications Office.

1.2.4. Official documents

The number of official documents (COM final, opinions of the ESC, opinions of the Committee of the Regions) published per language was slightly down in 1999, with 960 compared to 1 040 in 1998.

1.3. Databases and CELEX

1.3.1. CELEX

A detailed annex on CELEX can be found at the end of this report (Annex I) (see also 5.1.1.5).

The main event in 1999 was the migration of the CELEX base to a new technical platform. To enable professional users to continue to make full use of the contents of CELEX after the Mistral search system was abandoned, a new web CELEX+ search interface providing, among other things, inte-

grated access to legal texts in various formats was opened on schedule in April to serve internal users in the institutions in April 1999 and external users at the end of the year.

The Office continued to improve the base in terms of coverage, quality and access. A detailed study was made of the contents of certain sectors of the base.

The increase in the number of consultations continued in 1999. The number of documents viewed was 16.5 million in 1999 (14 million in 1998 and 8 million in 1997). Direct consultations increased by over 1 million, from 1 180 326 in 1998 to 2 360 574 in 1999.

1.3.2. **EUDOR**

The operation to input the Official Journal from 1952 onwards was completed in 1999. As a result, all the L and C series of the OJ between 1952 and 1999 are available to the public via EUDOR web. The stability of the web application was also improved during the second half of 1999. In addition, coverage of COM documents was significantly increased following efforts to input the COM documents published between 1990 and 1996.

The improvement in coverage, the stabilisation of the internal distribution application, known as EUDOR-in-a-box, and generalised access to this application for officials, made it possible for the institutions and, in particular, the team responsible for consolidation of documents to actively exploit the content of the files. This partly explains the significant increase in the number of pages delivered.

A start was made on the digitisation of the reports of the fifth legislative period of the European Parliament and on preparations for the archiving of the European Court Reports.

1.3.3. Integrated access to legal texts

In 1999 the Management Committee of the Office approved the setting up of an interinstitutional task force with a remit to study the actual range of services providing legal texts in electronic form and to submit proposals for creating on the EUROPA server a new integrated, user-friendly and exhaustive system of access to legal texts. In its report, the task force recommended a distribution structure on three levels:

- (1) integration of existing services in order to eliminate all redundancy of work and functions;
- (2) creation on the EUROPA server of a single entry point (portal) giving access to Community law regardless of its physical location;
- (3) setting up of an exhaustive fund of legal texts and rationalisation of production processes.

The Management Committee approved the task force report and instructed the Office to draw up a plan of action with a view to implementing an integrated service. This service will be gradually introduced over the coming years.

1.3.4. IDEA

Input to the IDEA base in 10 language versions continued on a fortnightly basis. From January 2000, the Greek version will be integrated thanks to the new Unicode format used in the new base. Other languages or alphabets (Cyrillic etc.) may follow.

Following requests from private publishers and other clients, the contents of the base were converted into SGML format to prepare for possible future uses.

1.3.5. Documentary publications

1.3.5.1. Tables, Directory and catalogues

Following the introduction of Formex V.3 and a change to the contract with the service provider, the publication of alphabetical and methodological tables was delayed. The normal rate of 11 monthly issues and one annual issue has since been restored.

In 1999, the 32nd and 33rd editions of the *Directory of Community legislation in force* were produced in 11 languages.

A cumulative catalogue of publications was published (in 11 languages).

The catalogue of COM documents appeared in the form of 11 monthly lists and one annual edition (July 1998 – June 1999).

The catalogues and tables are produced from the records stored in the Crenot database.

1.3.5.2. Minicatalogue

In 1999 the minicatalogue was published in 10 language versions (with an average of 186 pages per language).

1.3.5.3. Eurovoc thesaurus

The Eurovoc thesaurus is a tool for indexing Community documents (multi-lingual, alphabetic, permutated and thematic indexing). The Finnish and Swedish versions were incorporated. Preparatory work was carried out on the Eurovoc fourth edition project.

1.3.5.4. Electronic archive (ARCEL)

The ARCEL application logs, validates and archives the electronic files of the Official Journal in Formex (SGML) format supplied by the printers. Bibliographic information corresponding to the files is also validated and archived.

In 1999, work on the correction and validation of Formex documents was changed following the introduction of Formex V.3. All the documents published in the 1999 L + C series of the OJ were processed, and validation of Formex V.3 began. In 1999, 70 994 validated documents were archived. The base contains 410 992 validated documents in all.

1.3.5.5. DBREF

The DBREF reference base contains the titles of documents and data on their location in the EUDOR archive. In 1999, 1 082 861 titles were added, many of which come from OJs published before 1990. On 31 December 1999, DBREF contained 2 772 963 titles.

1.3.6. Consolidation of Community legislation

At the end of 1998, the Office was charged with centralising all of the document consolidation operations, for which it had previously been responsible for part only. Under this new arrangement, the Secretariat-General of the Commission is responsible for proposing a work programme which has to be approved by an interinstitutional working party. The Office is responsible for carrying out the work.

Moreover, the mechanism for consolidation which was put in place several years ago in the Office had to be replaced, as essential software was no longer Y2K-compatible.

All of the following factors generated a considerable workload in 1999:

- issuing of a call for tenders for legal expertise, principally in the context of codification and recasting of legislation;
- phasing out of the old production line;
- recovery of past consolidations;
- installation and testing of a new production line;
- issuing of a call for tenders for production under the new procedures;
- opening up document consolidation for dissemination via the Internet (EUR-Lex).

One of the principles of the new method of production is that it uses the same format for structuring texts as the Official Journal (Formex V.3). Consequently, all acts which are liable to consolidation have to be converted into this format in order to make them also available for other uses (as at 31 December 1999, 934 documents representing 39 000 pages had been converted into Formex V.3).

Moreover, by grouping together the various strands of consolidation, it was possible to make available for consultation in the same format on a single and easily accessible site (EUR-Lex) the consolidations previously produced by different means. As at 31 December 1999, 415 consolidated families in force were also available.

As for production in 1999, the Office continued its consolidation of 180 families totalling 950 acts (1998: 65 families and 513 acts).

This is equivalent to 35 800 pages for the 11 language versions (1998: 6 512 pages). One of these families will be codified, i.e. it will be reintroduced into the legislative process with a view to adoption of a new text with legal force.

1.4. Electronic publishing and Internet dissemination

1.4.1. Introduction

The tendency of originating departments to move towards electronic publishing, especially the Internet, continued; these departments are increasingly contacting the Office for advice and for multimedia publications (CD-ROM and Internet sites). The major quality problems identified in the publications produced outside the Office persisted, particularly for CD-ROMs. A number of originating departments who were made aware of these problems acknowledged the value of the action taken by the Office to improve their publications and are considering using the Office systematically in future.

1.4.2. Highlights of 1999

- 1999 saw a substantial increase in the number of periodical CD-ROMs produced (e.g. Eurostat) in addition to the monthly OJ L + C series.
- New functions were added to the EUR-Lex site (electronic OJ C E, consolidated texts integrated into current legislation, preparatory acts including those supplied by the Commission via Greffe 2000).

- Launching of a project to install an editorial web publishing system on the Internet. The results are very promising and have aroused great interest among the institutions.
- Issuing of multimedia call for tenders for an initial set of five lots.

Publishing and Internet Dissemination' Unit

1.4.3. Operation of the 'Electronic After two years in operation, the Electronic Publishing and Internet Dissemination Unit has become a fully-fledged partner of the originating departments, who are making increasing use of its advice (one third of the unit's activities) and its services. The unit plays an active part in the Internet coordination structures.

> Levels of activity remained very high, but increases in staff did not keep pace with this trend (two B grade officials recruited, two B posts open for recruitment), a fact which significantly increases the workload and affects, in particular, the unit's availability to originating departments and increases delays. Recruitment is also affected by the difficulty of finding qualified permanent staff in the field of multimedia technologies. A training plan with adequate budgetary resources has to be launched in order to ensure continuing training for staff and to keep pace with the evolution of multimedia technologies.

1.4.4. Detailed activity report

1.4.4.1. Producing multimedia publications

1999 saw a fall in the number of files submitted by the institutions (115 in 1999 as against 147 in 1998), whereas the number of deliverables (220) and the associated budget (EUR 2.6 million in 1999 as against EUR 2.2 million in 1998) are increasing. This is due to the fact that the files sent to the Office are increasingly complex and time-consuming, whether they be for producing CD-ROMs or for setting up Internet websites. Originating departments are now entrusting the Office more and more with all of their service requirements, ranging from design to technical production.

The following difficulties affect the production of multimedia publications:

- originating departments underestimate the administrative procedures or launch them at the last moment;
- it is widely, but erroneously, believed that electronic publication simply involves placing material on a medium and that it is possible to make changes at any stage in the production cycle;
- the continuing evolution of needs and objectives after the project has started up, plus a temptation to move towards the most recent technologies;
- poor quality of the electronic documents supplied and delays in their availability.

Originating departments are generally able to make substantial savings by using the Office rather than carrying out the same projects via independently negotiated contracts, which can cost up to twice as much in certain cases. Even if these gains are difficult to quantify, the originating departments also reap the benefit of synergies with other similar projects which shorten or even eliminate certain key phases in multimedia projects, such as preliminary studies, general design, prototype, etc.

1999 saw a major increase in the production of periodical CD-ROMs (for example Eurostat), even though the number of open files remained steady (one file may contain several productions). On top of these, there are the monthly L and C OJ series CD-ROMs.

The Office is called upon increasingly by the originating departments to supply regular updates of their electronic publications (CD-ROMs or Internet sites). This (continuing service) dimension has to be built into the estimate of the workload and allocation of human resources in the Office in order to guarantee a quality service to all institutions.

The Commission and the European Parliament have made the most use of the Office to carry out their multimedia projects.

1.4.4.2. Management of Internet services

EUR-Lex and associated publications

The Office is responsible for developing and managing the EUR-Lex site. Work progress and the coordination of developments were discussed in the interinstitutional EUR-Lex Steering Committee until the Interinstitutional Group Lex (GIL) was set up at the end of 1999.

In 1999, the trends in EUR-Lex services and associated publications were as follows:

 opening (in January 1999) of the 'OJ online for the institutions' site in the EuropaTeam environment; this site contains all the OJs published in EUR-Lex since its opening in January 1998;

- extension of the holding period for OJs from 20 to 45 days;
- adaptation of the UDL (Uniform Document Locator) programming interface to provide the institutions with online access to all the documents stored in EUR-Lex and the OJ;
- launching of the production of the monthly OJ L + C CD-ROM, derived from the EUR-Lex site, including the corresponding annual collections;
- opening (in April 1999) of the 'preparatory acts' section;
- start-up (in August 1999) of the publication of the OJ C E in EUR-Lex, in OJ online for the institutions and on the monthly OJ L + C CD-ROM;
- opening (in November 1999) of the 'consolidated legislation' section which is integrated into the current legislation;
- launching (in November 1999) of the integration of the preparatory acts delivered by the Commission by way of the Greffe 2000 system.

Preparatory work for loading the consolidated edition of the Treaties into EUR-Lex was carried out at the end of 1999.

Preparatory work was also started in coordination with the Employment and Social Affairs DG on publishing the Treaties in alternative formats for use by the disabled and designed for loading on to the EUR-Lex site or even to be published on CD-ROM.

The number of visitors to the EUR-Lex site is steadily increasing.

EUR-Lex is among the 10 most frequently visited sites of the European institutions.

User satisfaction rates are high as indicated by the statistics produced by the EUR-Lex reader service, which receives over 300 messages per month. More than three quarters of the questions relate to the content of the site or to Community policies. The service is very stable, and the availability rate of Official Journals on the day of publication is close to 100 %.

The success of the monthly OJ L + C CD-ROM is growing. The size of the production runs is constantly increasing, currently standing at more than 5 000 copies (all language versions together). Customer reactions are very positive. Surveys carried out in the specialist press are encouraging. More than 10 000 copies of the annual collection were produced. The timetable for producing this CD-ROM is extremely tight so as to guarantee that it is available to customers once the period during which the OJs are held in EUR-Lex has expired (currently 45 days).

Publications Office Internet sites

The http://www.eur-op.eu.int site has been totally restructured, successfully making use of web publishing techniques. The graphics are now consistent throughout the site, which offers thematic and multilingual navigation possibilities. The various language versions making up the site can be loaded as and when they become available without affecting the consistency of language and thematic consultation, as this is generated automatically. These mechanisms allow readers to access documents as and when they are available instead of waiting for the final language to become available before downloading. EUR-OP News and the Interinstitutional style guide are the first two publications to take advantage of this development.

Links to the new services offered by the Office have been established, e.g. for electronic commerce.

The Office's presence on the EuropaTeam site has been strengthened by the introduction of the 'OJ online for the institutions' service and the opening of a 'preview' section where the Office makes the prototypes of new services available before they are officially opened.

CIRCA

The Office is involved, together with Eurostat, the Informatics Directorate and DG Enterprise in the management of the CIRCA project (Communication and Information Resource Centre Administrator) and has taken part in meetings of the Steering Committee and the Technical Committee. The CIRCA project is enjoying growing success among Commission departments and the institutions (more than 5 000 recorded users, over 300 forums opened). The Office is responsible for its promotion in an interinstitutional context and the adaptation of CIRCA forums using conventional procedures for publication requests.

The Office uses CIRCA in the following projects:

- European Publishers' Forum
- Interinstitutional Committee multimedia publications (tools and methods)
- EUR-Lex Steering Committee until June 1999, thereafter Interinstitutional Group Lex (GIL).

Several CIRCA forums are also used to coordinate certain technical projects between requesting services, the Office and the service providers.

1.4.4.3. Organising subcontracting

Multimedia calls for tenders

The launch of the multimedia call for tenders was delayed owing to the heavy workload, the difficulty of finalising price schedules and the resultant changes to the technical specifications. Rapid developments in technology make this kind of exercise difficult. A call for tenders was issued for an initial set of five lots, namely:

- Lot 1 Study and evaluation of multimedia publication
- Lot 2 Processing of electronic files
- Lot 3 Creation and processing of publications in presentation format
- Lot 5 Express dispatch of multimedia publications by remote transmission
- Lot 6 Multimedia publications with specific programming

A call was launched to acquire tools suitable for monitoring the quality and improving the technical consistency of the PDF files supplied by the printers.

1.4.4.4. Quality management

Multimedia publication vade-mecum

A draft *Multimedia publication vade-mecum* is in preparation. This is proving to be a long-winded and difficult exercise in view of the volume of the topics to be covered and the constant developments in technology, processes, formats and standards.

Editorial system for multimedia publication

A project on the setting up of an 'editorial system for multimedia publication' (editorial web publishing) was launched and successfully completed. It made it possible to identify the technical solutions likely to improve the service to clients, to facilitate the management of Internet sites and to improve their technical and ergonomic consistency.

1.4.4.5. Interinstitutional cooperation

The Office held three meetings of the Interinstitutional Committee on Multimedia Publications — Tools and Methods. The following were the main items discussed at these meetings: the *Multimedia publication vademecum*, the terms of reference of the multimedia call for tenders and the presentation of the 'editorial system for multimedia publication' draft.

The Office continued to participate in various coordination bodies, including:

- Interinstitutional Internet Editorial Committee (CEII),
- Europa and EuropaPlus editorial committees, including their technical subcommittees and the Europa Forum,
- CIRCA Steering Committee and Technical Committee,
- EUR-Lex Interinstitutional Steering Committee until June 1999 and thereafter Interinstitutional Group Lex (GIL).

2.1. General organisation

2.1.1. Sales networks

2.1.1.1. Conventional and electronic publications

All partners in the various sales networks of the Publications Office are now able to sell all forms of subscription to the information contained in the Official Journal, irrespective of the medium used.

The year 1999 saw the general sales agent network enlarged with the establishment of offices in South Africa and South Korea, while the office in Israel was closed. The necessary measures have been taken to replace this agent.

As at 31 December 1999, the networks comprised:

- 49 official general agents worldwide (35 in Europe, including 19 in the European Union);
- 60 Eurobooksellers within the European Union;
- 15 gateways;
- 20 agents specialising in offline products, in addition to the general agents;
- 16 agents specialising in document delivery;
- 17 Eurostat datashops (datashops opened in Finland, the United Kingdom and Norway).

The annual meeting of the general sales agents in the European Union was held in Stockholm on 10 and 11 June 1999. The main items discussed were:

- the analysis of sales and product trends (microfiches, OJ S and single portal for legislation);
- direct online orders;
- invoicing in euro;
- the Commission's 1999 standard publications programme ('programme ordinaire de publication' — POP);
- capillarity and partnership, centralised distribution, possible (subsidised) use of the network for distributing free material;
- promotion and marketing trends.

The first electronic commerce website of the Publications Office was opened to the public in 1999, offering a limited choice of titles (around 200 for all language versions) and allowing orders to be placed by and delivered directly to customers. The same system is used for taking orders from agents (around 50 000 publications, available for a fee, may be ordered). Work to increase the power of the system is to continue throughout 2000. In particular, problems associated with free publications and the quality of data need to be dealt with (see 2.1.5).

The trend towards providing free access to databases has become more pronounced with the introduction of free access to the APC (now: PreLex), OIL and Sesame databases. The level of turnover is currently insufficient to run the gateways network in every country. The gateways networks in Israel and the Netherlands have terminated their contracts, although the Netherlands is continuing to provide the service on a temporary basis until an organisation is found to take over its activities, following the example of Belgium.

2.1.1.2. Document delivery

Following the approval of new guidelines and a new contract by the Management Committee in 1998, a 'Call for proposals to participate in a network of document delivery agents' was published in the S series of the Official Journal. The new contract guarantees agents access to information sources and harmonises the conditions which apply to the Office's intermediaries. Sixteen contracts were signed by the end of 1999, and a further five are in preparation. Once these contracts are signed, all Member States should have at least one approved agent in their country, all agents being free to sell where they choose.

On 13 and 14 December 1999, an initial information and training meeting was held for members of the network.

Activities in 1999 focused on examining around some 50 applications, drawing up new contracts, and organising support for the recently-established network. The section also continued to send out invoices for similar work on behalf of the originating departments (BACH, BCSR and Eurostat datashops).

There were 532 invoices sent out amounting to a total of EUR 864 585, with Eurostat datashops accounting for a majority share in terms of overall amount invoiced.

The Office dealt directly with complex requests from the institutions. These involved the delivery of large volumes of 'customised' information on various media. The close collaboration with the Information Officers was extended. Almost 1 200 requests from Luxembourg and Brussels were processed.

2.1.2. Invoicing

The number of invoices sent out in 1999 was 11 377 (32 % down on the 16 755 in 1998) for a total of EUR 16 951 016 (22.4 % down on 1998). As mentioned in the 1998 Management Report, this marked drop in receipts is almost entirely the result of changes to the distribution of the S series of the OJ, with the withdrawal of the paper edition, free access to the TED database and lower prices for CD-ROM subscriptions. The prevailing free access to electronic products means that their share of the total amount invoiced is declining. The success of CD-ROM subscriptions (more than 9 000 in 1999, see Table 19 (b)) is failing to counteract this trend because of lower subscription rates, which are intended to cover only the costs of the medium.

2.1.3. Stock management and orders

The interest of originating departments in reproduction on demand was confirmed when drawing up the Commission's publication programme. A new general contract for the production of these publications was signed in December 1999. In 1997, 1 505 products were placed in this category, to which a further 548 new publications were added in 1998 and 549 in 1999.

In 1999, 19 011 sales articles, taking all languages and media together, were produced (including 10 218 Official Journal articles). This represented an increase of 5 % over the 18 035 sales articles produced in 1998 (including 11 294 Official Journal articles).

2.1.4. Identifiers and production of catalogues

1999 saw the launch of a number of major projects for the identification and cataloguing of publications. In addition, efforts undertaken to restructure catalogue production around a bibliography database allowed the necessary functions to be defined. The project is to be implemented in 2000. Following a survey of the needs of the different units at the Publica-

tions Office, restructuring of the catalogue numbers was begun, naturally taking into account the impact of the Commission's reorganisation which took place in 1999.

Efforts to introduce systematic ISSN numbering were undertaken in cooperation with the ISDS (International Serials Data System) centre in Paris.

A survey of catalogue users was also carried out to determine their needs in terms of the usefulness of the media used.

In 1999, 2 994 new entries were registered in the catalogue (including periodicals, except the Official Journal and COM documents).

2.1.5. Free distribution

2.1.5.1. Distribution to relay centres

At the end of 1999, numbers of relay centres served by the Office were as follows (the figures in brackets show the change compared with 1998):

- 1. Relay centres receiving publications on a daily basis:
 - full documentation centres: 296 (+ 3);
 - specialised documentation centres: 190 (- 1);
 - Info-Points Europe: 123 (+ 30);
 - depository libraries: 91 (- 1);
 - reduced depository libraries: 12 (-1);
 - rural development forums: 118 (+ 13);
 - Euro Info Centres: 286 (+ 39).

It should be noted that whereas around 10 Euro Info Centres (EICs) were closed in the Member States, around 50 others were opened in autumn 1999 in the applicant countries (mainly in eastern Europe).

- 2. Relay centres receiving only a selection of publications:
 - European reference centres: 165 (-7);
 - centres for local urban initiatives (CLUI): 18 (– 1);
 - European Parliament Epicor network: 152 (- 3);
 - public libraries in four countries of the European Union:
 - United Kingdom: 223 (+ 29),
 - Spain: 39 (=),
 - Sweden: 276 (=),
 - Denmark: 25 (=).

The trend for some originators to give priority to electronic information continued, with the paper editions of some publications disappearing, to be replaced by publication on the Internet and cumulative CD-ROM editions. This is especially true of Eurostat and the European Foundation in Dublin.

The same trend is apparent for distribution of the Official Journal (see also 2.1.5.3). As the microfiche edition of the OJ L + C series was discontinued at the end of 1999, a promotion campaign for the CD-ROM edition was launched, the effects of which will be fully appreciated in 2000.

2.1.5.2. Orders from officials of the institutions

An average of 50 orders per day continued to be received throughout 1999. The Publications Office set up a circuit for publication requests in close collaboration with the Commission's DGs. By the end of the year, almost all the DGs had appointed correspondents for this task.

2.1.5.3. Free distribution of the Official Journal L + C series

The Management Committee hoped to see a marked reduction in the free distribution of the paper edition of the OJ L + C, specifically in favour of the online edition of the Official Journal on EuropaTeam and the monthly CD-ROM.

The institutions updated the lists of free copy recipients and surveys of the relay centres were undertaken. The impact was greatest at the European Parliament, as it was decided that, for the new term, the Members of the European Parliament would no longer receive the paper edition of the OJ L + C series but the CD-ROM edition instead. The Commission in turn cancelled around 500 internal subscriptions to the paper edition of the OJ.

2.2. Sales promotion

2.2.1. Fairs and exhibitions

The Publications Office participated in the following 15 events.

Participation in these events — which in individual cases may meet concerns of a directly commercial nature or reflect a desire for the institutions to raise their profile — is hampered by mounting problems of funding.

2.2.2. Promotional activities

The Publications Office distributed a number of different catalogues:

- publications: 356 900 copies, including the general catalogue (82 000 copies), the key publications catalogue (240 500 copies), the Eurostat catalogue (11 400 copies) and the list of publications of Cedefop in Salonica (23 000 copies);
- documents: 9 400 copies per month;
- other catalogues, i.e. the catalogue of consolidated texts (1 000(¹) copies per month) and the database directory (11 400 copies).

During 1999, 16 advertising leaflets were produced and distributed to an average of around 75 000 recipients.

2.2.3. Marketing operations

In the third quarter of 1999, subscribers included on the leaflet mailing list were surveyed. The survey was carried out by means of a questionnaire on the number of copies received per language, the topics chosen and activities covered by the correspondents.

The results should provide more information on the recipients and their fields of interest in order to target promotional activities more effectively.

2.2.4. EUR-OP News

In 1999, the distribution of *EUR-OP News* remained stable at 303 500 copies per issue for all 11 language versions.

The three large-scale distribution channels for *EUR-OP* News continued to be subscriptions, bulk consignments to the sales offices and distribution at book fairs or other events at which the Office was represented.

At the end of 1999, the number of copies sent out had reached 295 280 compared with 271 897 in the previous year. This increase was due to a larger number of individual subscriptions (188 503 in 1998 compared with 274 265 in 1999).

EUR-OP News has been available in 11 languages at the Office's website since October 1998 (http://www.eur-op.eu.int). The website was revamped in 1999 and more frequent updates are now possible thanks to the use of web publishing techniques.

Although *EUR-OP News* is a popular source of information on publications, finance is a recurrent problem.

2.2.5. Publications Office on the Internet

The information made available by the Office on the Internet, including *EUR-OP News*, continued to be a great success, with 10 000 connections per day recorded. The Office website has 5 600 HTML pages, following the removal of outdated information.

In December, the site was used to inform electronic product customers about the Y2K compliance of each product (CD-ROM and databases). The Office sent a letter to the sales offices and customers who came forward, giving them the URL address to contact.

2.3. Information campaigns

2.3.1. Visits and presentations

As in 1998, the Publications Office organised 22 information events on its own premises for 496 visitors, compared with 355 in 1998.

In addition, the Office held or took part in 27 external training events and seminars.

2.3.2. Info-Points Europe, Luxembourg

The number of help-desk calls increased by 72 % (compared with 87 % in 1998), as a result of the continuing increase in the number of products supported (CELEX, EUR-Lex, TED, EUDOR, EUDOR-in-a-box and all CD-ROMs), the number of customers for electronic media (especially the CD-ROM edition of the OJ L + C series) and the growing complexity or variety of the computer systems on which the Office's products operate. This aspect is dealt with by the help-desk whenever changes are made to the Office's products. Support from the help-desk during product tests and immediately after product launches is greatly valued by customers and originating departments.

In addition, the spread of Internet use leads to additional calls from new users, for whom the help-desk services are useful and much appreciated.

The downward trend in subscriptions continued to accelerate in 1999, for the same reasons as in 1998 and 1997: preference for 'value added' alternatives, reduced budgets for the acquisition of publications, availability of the same information free of charge on the Internet (the case for the Official Journal on the EUR-Lex site) and substantial reductions in the prices of alternative electronic products. The OJ L + C CD-ROM has proved to be a successful alternative to the paper edition.

In addition, the OJ S CD-ROM continued to be successful, especially the twice-weekly subscription, the number of subscribers having increased by almost 10 %, paradoxically at the same time as the TED database was made free of charge with the same CD-ROM user interface.

As in 1998, CELEX and TED continued to be the 'flagship' licensing products, accounting for 84 of the 105 licences in force, or 80 % of the total number and 77.3 % of the total amount invoiced. The top position in 1999 was occupied for the first time by CELEX, with 47.7 % of the total amount invoiced. Conversely, the change in the price of the TED licence resulted in a marked decrease in the amount invoiced for Publications Office products.

2.5.2.2. Invoicing of online products

Table 31 gives details of direct invoicing of customers by the Office for all the commercial databases, and the invoicing of gateways by the Office for their customers' consumption.

It should be noted that:

- Gateway-invoicing includes a 'commission' component of between 25 and 40 % depending on the turnover. This component which obviously did not exist with a direct invoicing system results in a reduction in the net amount. Furthermore, since gateway-invoicing takes place at the end of the contractual period, it does not necessarily reflect the consumption per calendar year.
- Online consultation of CELEX stabilised, with direct consumption at practically the same level as in the previous year (-2.61 %), and consultation of the gateways and flat-rate CELEX increased by 29.04 and 212.42 % respectively in 1999. This means that CELEX still has a hard core of very faithful users who appreciate the extra professional benefits it provides, despite the existence of alternatives available free of charge.
- The reduction of 30.50 % in total turnover is significant and is for the most part due to the TED database being made free of charge at the beginning of 1999, in addition to the closure of other databases. The downward trend in sales revenue from databases is very marked and will need to be taken into account in future budget estimates. This applies in particular to the financing of the help-desk, which mostly serves customers of the databases provided free of charge.
- As at 31 December 1999, there were 223 subscribers to the flat-rate CELEX compared with 71 in 1998, i.e. an increase of 214.1 %. The simplicity of the invoicing procedure attracts subscribers and a considerable amount of revenue has been generated (see Table 31).

2.6. Review and outlook

Continuation of the policy to provide databases free of charge throughout 1999 resulted in a marked fall in revenue (reduction in the total amount invoiced: – EUR 4 901 482), which was for the most part due to changes in the publication of the S series of the Official Journal.

However, the position of the S series of the Official Journal is paradoxical. The OJ S on CD-ROM, available for a charge, and the TED database, available free of charge, share the same interface. Furthermore, TED is disseminated much faster, allowing replies to tenders to be sent in several days earlier. Nevertheless, the number of CD-ROM subscriptions increased by almost 10 % in 1999. Telecommunications costs, difficulties in obtaining a connection or inadequate customer equipment probably account for this phenomenon in part, but it is also likely that well-informed and professional customers prefer to pay for a service which allows them to demand, in return, higher standards of quality and reliability. It can therefore be assumed that a high-quality CD-ROM or a documentary database with advanced functions does not necessarily suffer as a result of competition from services provided free of charge.

Revenue is likely to continue to fall in 2000, albeit to a lesser extent. This will come as a result of discontinuing the microfiche edition of the Official Journal and substituting it with a more reasonably-priced subscription to the CD-ROM, in addition to stepping up promotion of the CD-ROM as opposed to the paper edition.

At the present time, the main challenge is ensuring that material is read. Faced with an overwhelming supply of information, the most limited resource is currently the time which readers can and wish to devote to searching for data. This new element should therefore be the determining factor in adapting products and tools to attract the attention and interest of customers. It is the publisher's task to ensure that the author's work is as visible as possible. In order to achieve this, the publisher must optimise dissemination of information by offering readers the most user-friendly and high-performance tools to provide results which help readers in their search for information.

Demands for better quality and higher performance — both in terms of the products and the human resources disseminating them — are constantly mounting. This is particularly true of the professional public.

In 1999, the Publications Office continued its efforts to improve the quality and reliability of its products. The meticulous verification undertaken to ensure that the Office's electronic products were Y2K compliant was particularly beneficial in this respect. Although no major problems were detected, it forced the Office to inspect its products and allowed it to uncover and solve a number of minor problems. On the other hand, it should be noted that the technical changes made to some products highlighted the benefits of customer support services, i.e. the help-desk, in helping customers to overcome specific difficulties arising from such changes. The growing supply of electronic products means that the Publications Office must give priority to the need for such assistance.

Related activities, such as cataloguing or managing identifiers, become more important when greater discipline is introduced into the running and execution of the institutions' publication programmes.

The objectives of sales policy are determined by the following factors:

- The coexistence of products provided free of charge and products for which there is a charge a phenomenon which will become even more apparent when the new access portal to European law is opened.
- Distribution of the same material in different media (paper, online databases, CD-ROMs, the Internet). The value of electronic media as alternatives to paper editions is increasingly being recognised, insofar as they are produced using established and reliable methods.
- Electronic commerce. The Office is rapidly to expand its activities in this area against a background of major upheavals in this fast-developing market. The challenge is to set up an interactive and efficient electronic commerce service, to communicate with and make life easier for customers. The operations which serve to establish the image and reputation of bodies involved in electronic commerce are becoming increasingly expensive and complex. It is therefore vital to work with good professional intermediaries.
- Centralisation of the message-handling function linked to products available free of charge and on payment of a fee, not only for electronic information, but also for the handling of tangible products. This development appears to be unavoidable given that:
 - some originating departments already want the Publications Office to distribute their publications free of charge, in accordance with their own rules;
 - customers prefer to go through a single contact point to obtain a number of publications from different departments;
 - centralised stock control allows for more efficient distribution throughout Europe, both in terms of cost and speed of delivery;
 - customers are increasingly demanding a rapid 'round-the-clock' service.

3.1. Introduction

While the number of joint publications was down on 1998, the number of joint-publication contracts signed remained virtually constant. The number of publication and translation licences (full and partial) fell slightly. On the other hand, there was a marked drop in the amount invoiced in terms of fixed payments and royalties; this was due, firstly, to the exceptionally high amount invoiced in 1998 and, secondly, to changes in the copyright policy for the Official Journal made during the first half of 1999. Texts of the Official Journal can now be reproduced in unlimited quantities, provided the source is acknowledged. Reproduction of Official Journal texts for commercial purposes is no longer subject to the payment of fees or royalties.

The Office intends to intensify its partnership with private publishers through the European Publishers' Forum and to improve the results.

3.2. Coedition

Seven joint publications appeared in 1999, compared with 14 in 1998. Seven joint-publication contracts were signed (six in 1998) and three were being negotiated as at 31 December 1999 (10 in 1998).

3.3. Copyright

The legal services of the institutions were consulted on a memorandum on the copyright policy applied by the Office on behalf of the institutions. Following its approval by the Management Committee, this memorandum was distributed within the institutions.

The number of requests involving various aspects of copyright for Community publications remained almost constant in 1999 compared with the previous year — up from 647 to 660 (+ 2.0 %). However, the nature of the requests (and of the replies given) changed. There were more requests for Community material available on the various websites of the institutions and, in many cases, the replies simply confirmed that this material could be reproduced, provided that the source was mentioned. It is plain that the trend for copyright activities is towards providing advice to originating departments and the general public and away from issuing licences, or indeed granting authorisation against payment of rights. As a result, the amount of fixed payments and royalties is becoming less and less important as the main indicator of copyright management activities.

Fifty-three licences were issued, 23 of which were for translation (60 and 37 respectively in 1998).

3.4. Fixed payments and royalties

In 1999, fixed payments and royalties (including invoicing for the European Publishers' Forum) were invoiced for a total of EUR 148 534.89 (ECU 218 166.05 in 1998) — a reduction of 31.9 %.

3.5. European Publishers' Forum

3.5.1. Members

As at 31 December 1999, the Forum comprised:

- 264 full members (publishing houses) compared with 193 in 1998 an increase of 36.8 %;
- 257 guest members (European organisations, various representatives of publishing houses, representatives of European institutions, etc.) compared with 180 in 1998 — an increase of 36.0 %.

3.5.2. Meetings

Two meetings of the Forum were held in 1999.

The seventh meeting was held in Brussels on 30 April 1999. It was attended by more than 90 members, including publishers and representatives of the Commission and other European organisations. In addition to the contributions by the representatives of the European Publishers' Federation and the Office, mention should be made of contributions by the following bodies:

- the Commission's Transport DG;
- the Commission's former DG X (Information, Communication, Culture, Audiovisual);
- the Commission's former DG XXII (Education, Training and Youth);
- Kogan Page Ltd, United Kingdom;
- Gospodarski Vestnik International Publications, Slovenia.

Owing to the reorganisation of the Commission in September 1999, the Commission's departments were not adequately represented, and the eighth meeting, which was held in Frankfurt on 14 October 1999, was held on an informal basis. The publishers nevertheless confirmed at this meeting their interest in the material produced by the institutions.

3.5.3. Catalogue

Each year, on the occasion of the Frankfurt Book Fair, the Office produces a catalogue containing a selection of publications on European subjects produced by members of the Forum. The 1999 edition contained 200 titles in English, French and German, from 36 Austrian, Belgian, British, Danish, Dutch, French, German and Italian publishers.

3.5.4. Newsletter and website

Two newsletters were published in 1999, mainly providing information on the activities of the Forum — meetings, catalogue, etc. — and on manuscripts offered for licensing and calls for cooperation between publishers.

The finishing touches to the website were begun in 1999 and are to continue in 2000.

3.5.5. Results

The Forum is now fully operational. Its failure so far to produce the anticipated results has largely been due to a lack of material likely to interest commercial publishers. This state of affairs, already reported on in 1998, continued in 1999. The Office must therefore keep working on ways of making the various departments of the institutions aware of this new approach to publishing, which is part of the policy of subsidiarity and partnership.

Reorganisation of the Commission's standard publications programme, which introduced electronic archiving and production on request of reports,

studies etc., also provides for this material to be made available for initiatives of the Forum. The year 2000 should therefore present publishers with a greater range of accessible texts.

4.1. Budget accounting

Total budget expenditure in 1999 was EUR 54 947 545.61, amounting to 99.47 % of the available appropriations (EUR 55 239 000). Expenditure was broken down as follows:

- 90.12 % (EUR 49 780 464.51) in payment appropriations;
- $-\,$ 9.35 % (EUR 5 167 081.10) in appropriations carried forward from 1999 to 2000.

The rate of utilisation of appropriations varies from one title to another, as shown in the table below:

With 9.35 % of appropriations carried forward to cover expenditure contracted in 1999 but not yet cleared for payment by the end of the accounting year, the Publications Office remained very close to the theoretical limit of its budget, having spent 99.47 % of the available funds.

Seven appropriation transfers were made in connection with the 1999 budget. Exceptionally, one of these was from Title 2 to Title 3 to boost the CELEX budget and offset the loss of revenue resulting from the launching of the EUR-Lex site.

Table 33 recapitulates the Office's expenditure for 1998 and gives details of the utilisation of the 1999 budget.

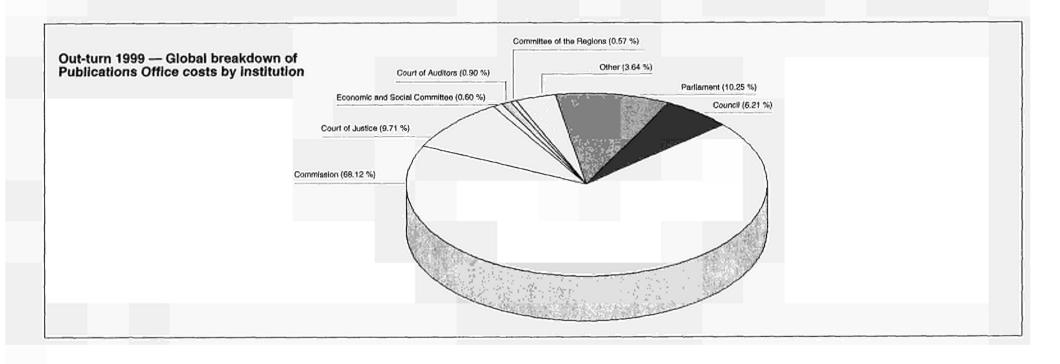

4.2. Commercial accounting

4.2.1. Operating results

4.2.1.1. Balance sheet at 31 December 1999 (Table 36)

(a) Assets

The assets in bank accounts at 31 December 1998 amounted to EUR 7 033 173.36 (1998: ECU 5 616 497.86), including EUR 2 905 030.74 in national-currency accounts (1998: ECU 833 272.85) and EUR 4 128 142.62 in euro accounts (1998: ECU 4 783 225.01).

The amount of accounts receivable was EUR 8 517 210.16 (1998: ECU 7 368 846.36). This represented 50.05 % of the net total invoiced in 1999 as against 33.60 % in 1998. It should be noted that around 30 % of turnover in 1999 was generated in the last quarter of the year and that the amount of part payments received stood at EUR 2 441 254.09, i.e. around 29 % of accounts receivable. In 1999, the Office received EUR 16 085 694.88 in net sales revenue (including around EUR 2 374 000 by cheque and EUR 87 850 by credit card), as against ECU 19 997 473 in 1998 (down 19.56 %). Receipts represented 94.53 % of net turnover (91.19 % in 1998).

(b) Liabilities

Prepayments held in suspense accounts amounted to EUR 139 906.42 (1998: ECU 89 046.78). Part payments from our sales network came to EUR 2 300 000.45 (1998: ECU 1 339 249.62).

At the end of 1999, the amount of sales revenue received and payable to the institutions was EUR 4 591 919.27 (1998: ECU 4 186 239.88).

4.2.1.2. Profit-and-loss account at 31 December 1999 (Table 37)

In 1999, gross turnover amounted to EUR 23 578 923.67 compared with ECU 31 445 073.41 in 1998 — a drop of 25.02 %. The net figure fell by 22.40 % to EUR 17 015 754.47 (1998: ECU 21 928 454.26).

The expenditure side of this account includes trade discounts totalling EUR 6 610 428.55, or 28.04 % of gross turnover in 1999 (30.22 % in 1998 and 32.18 % in 1997).

An operation conducted jointly with the Commission's Financial Controller made it possible to clear a total of EUR 3 307.84 for 1999 under the heading 'Insolvent debtors'.

5.1. Informatics and general services

The year 1999 was very important for computer applications at both European level and worldwide, more specifically because of the preparations for the year 2000.

It also saw the introduction of the euro as the currency for 11 Member States of the European Union.

The first of these events, in particular, had major repercussions on information systems and consequently on computer applications at the European Commission and the Publications Office.

Considerable efforts were made by the Informatics Unit in its additional task of finalising work on the introduction of the euro and providing coordination between units for activities associated with the year 2000.

In addition, during 1999 the work of the General Services Department was transferred to the OPOCE/2 Unit, renamed the 'Informatics and General Services' Unit.

As a natural extension of its duties, the unit also worked together with the owners of the Mercier and Gasperich buildings to ensure that the infrastructure of the buildings was Y2K-compliant and to guarantee their safe and smooth running.

5.1.1. Informatics

5.1.1.1. Operations and open systems

Operations

The Operations Section is responsible for managing the basic computer infrastructure and the telephone system, and for the day-to-day operation of central computer equipment (mainframes and servers).

Particularly worthy of mention is the upgrading of the telephone switch-board, primarily in order to solve problems associated with year 2000 compliance. This upgrade was accompanied by the addition of new functions, specifically better management of the lines linking the Office to the public network, which are used for making FTP transfers.

A dual fax server was set up to receive contract notices for publication in the Supplement to the Official Journal, in order to deal with almost all of the incoming faxes received by to the Office and, in due course, send some of the outgoing faxes.

As regards mainframes, the operation of facilities management on one of the existing machines was discontinued owing to the replacement of SEI-OP2 by SEI-JOS and CATEL by CatDiff. These new applications are part of a non-proprietary operating system. The last application operated in facilities management, Crenot, was included in the mainframe site on the Office's premises and was upgraded to a machine with a CPU which is 75 % more powerful. This will allow the Office to successfully phase out this operating environment over the next four years.

Open systems

First and foremost, this sector has undergone expansion of its NT servers, with five new machines having been installed during 1999. The new machines have been set up to serve the new electronic mail system developed

from INSEM3, to operate Suiprod—a production-monitoring application—and as part of the new informatics system set up for the pre-press section of the Publications Office printshop.

The new electronic mail system is being used with the new Suiprod systems and by the client workstations linked to the abovementioned fax server.

The disk space is expanding at a remarkable rate because of the constantly increasing computerisation of the daily activities of the Publications Office.

5.1.1.2. Project management

The Project Management Section is responsible for developing and maintaining the Office's information systems. It also aims to ensure consistency of the information systems and to pilot surveys on development methods and technological aspects.

The section advises and helps other units to draw up specifications and to define the objectives of their requests for developing their computer applications.

The following are some of the projects completed by the Office in 1999:

- Introduction of the euro on 1 January 1999: the preparatory work was completed in 1998 and the changeover to the euro went smoothly.
- One of the major challenges of 1999 was to prepare for the year 2000. This involved a large share of the section's resources. The central applications were adapted and in some cases replaced, while the section participated in tests and in coordinating initiatives.
- One of the major projects carried out in the area of publishing applications was to replace the production of the S series of the Official Journal with a new application, SEI-JOS. The system began operating in December 1999.

Another major challenge in this area was the introduction of the Formex V.3 standard in the new contracts for production of the Official Journal, which applied as of 1 April 1999. This necessitated considerable changes to the reception, validation and storage of electronic documents.

The project to develop a production monitoring system was begun with the Publications Unit and Electronic Publishing and Internet Dissemination Units.

As part of documentary consolidation (Consleg), the production mechanisms were completely overhauled and the reception, validation and storage systems enlarged to accommodate the Consleg source and results documents. Version 1.0 of the Consleg production monitoring system was developed and made available to users for testing and validation.

An initial version of the new APA documents production system — APA-JO — was finalised and is undergoing final tests.

Migration of the database for the production of the interinstitutional directory Anninter and replacement of the publishing tool in this production system were successfully carried out.

An amendments management system was developed under the SEI-BUD project. It was due to begin production at the start of 2000 in order to avoid any problems associated with the preparations for the year 2000.

 The main project undertaken in Internet/documentary systems was the migration of the CELEX database from Mistral to a DORIS/Oracle system. The application began operation in December 1999.

The 2.0 version of the new Internet sales catalogue, CatDiff, was completed and brought into service. The 2.0 version is primarily intended for use by the Office's commercial partners, especially the sales agents.

 The main event relating to the administrative and management applications was the introduction of the new commercial management application, Gescom, which started operation in June 1999.

The Office also replaced the OJ budget management system by the software package Oracle Financials, and began introducing the SIC Personnel application.

5.1.1.3. User support

This section was particularly busy during 1999, initially with finalising the migration of client workstations to the Intel processor (the Office has 720 such workstations), and subsequently with the work required to guarantee Y2K compliance of the various computer tools.

The working environment for computer applications at the Publications Office was further standardised and integrated, with an improved service for users of other types of workstation (Sun or Macintosh stations).

A particular effort was made to improve communication between users of the various different services and the unit in charge of informatics, specifically via the intranet, which underwent considerable development over the year. The intranet is set to become a vital tool for disseminating useful information within the Office.

Support for users

The number of requests for computer materials and the number of workstations (NT + UNIX + Apple) remained stable in comparison with the preceding year. Conversely, the number of calls received by the help-desk fell slightly (down 10 %), which points to better stability of the NT system than with Windows 3.1.

Management of the workstations was noticeably improved by the introduction of the SMS software. This allowed information to be collected on an on-going basis, software updating to be centralised, anti-virus checks to be carried out and the remote service facility to be used on 700 PCs at the Office.

Infocentre

The 'Infocentre' section collaborated successfully on a number of major infrastructure projects (NTP, intranet). Other projects were started, such as posting various forms on to the intranet, graphic management of the premises, and the Adonis system.

As regards applications based on web technology, useful experience was gained from the electronic release of the Office's procedures manual. Other projects of varying scope on data management were also started (WinRef, archiving of budgetary documents).

Activities associated with the year 2000 specifically included providing assistance to the units for local applications.

The Infocentre received 14 project requests from the units, 12 of which they were able to carry out.

5.1.1.4. Security and quality control

Computer security

In 1999, this section dealt with 1 358 requests for access, compared with 1 121 in 1998 (up 21 %). Most of the requests related to management of NT-users, their network resources and electronic mailboxes, associated with the migration of NTP during 1999.

Given this state of affairs, an overhaul of the procedure for requesting access was begun in order to give access to new users automatically, cut down on the numbers involved in the process and thereby reduce the period for granting access.

The section also reviewed its anti-virus procedure, in close collaboration with User Support, in order to improve its effectiveness and as far as possible avoid the propagation of viruses within the Office.

Following certain changes to the contracts with the Office's external contractors, peripheral security was also monitored systematically with a move towards stricter filtering of correspondence between our network and the outside world.

Quality control

The section continued its work on the quality control of strategic information systems at the Office, specifically SEI-JOS, SEI-BUD and EUDOR.

As regards documentation for the applications, considerable efforts were made to detail the production flows and make the information available online through the Office's intranet site. In terms of monitoring, the section introduced the generation of monitoring files for work on a time-rate basis undertaken by external personnel working on behalf of the unit.

Finally, the section took an active part in monitoring activities in the run-up to the year 2000 by helping the project leader with project monitoring tasks. This involved conducting specific tests on a selection of applications and on products distributed by the Office, in close collaboration with the Sales and Copyright Management Unit.

5.1.1.5. 'Formats and Documentary Systems' centre of competence

Formex

The new Formex (Version 3) specifications were brought into operation on 1 April 1999, with the start of the new OJ contracts. Improvements and changes associated with the new limitations on publication were incorporated into the system. A consolidated version (3.0.2 final) has been made available from the end of November 1999, to begin operation in mid-February 2000.

A website based on the electronic specifications was opened for a limited number of users. Depending on the results of this trial, the site may be opened for general use. The Formex help-desk dealt with calls from various users of the standard (256 requests as at 13 December 1999). A number of meetings were also held in parallel with contractors supplying documents structured according to the Formex V.3 standard.

CELEX

During 1999, the Office helped to set up the new architecture for distributing the CELEX database. This migration was accompanied by the extension of the database's query services. Access to the base was simplified and an advanced query facility added to the existing menus.

5.1.2. General services

5.1.2.1. Buildings

The year 1999 marked the start of major renovation work on the Mercier building, primarily involving the old part of the building which dates from 1972.

Although it is difficult to appreciate the full extent of the various works undertaken, the following jobs have either been completed or are underway:

- recabling of the entire building (fire detection, public address system, etc.);
- division of the underground car park into compartments;
- 80 new fire doors fitted in addition to the 160 existing fire doors;
- repair of the sanitary fittings;
- improvements to the first-aid room;
- refurbishment of areas specifically reserved for charging batteries;
- renovation of workshops and printing offices;
- new rendering of the facade on the ground floor of the old part of the building.

All security facilities in the building (fire detection, access control, surveillance of technical equipment) are currently undergoing a thorough examination in order to guarantee the best possible level of surveillance and security. A specific survey is also being carried out on the internal and external closed-circuit surveillance system, owing to the risks associated with the district in which the building is located.

Particular attention was paid to the security of the building in the run-up to the year 2000. Guaranteeing the safety of personnel and the integrity of the building are constant concerns and numerous tests have been carried out with this purpose in mind.

The work undertaken on the building has been meticulously monitored by both management and the departments concerned through weekly site meetings, monthly coordination meetings and biannual meetings of an enlarged monitoring group. Staff and 'health and safety' representatives are closely involved in the regular inspections of the work. The main documents relating to the building work are available on the 'renovation' section found on the intranet site homepage.

5.1.2.2. Canteen

In 1999, the number of visits to the canteen fell by 2.47 % from 79 761 in 1998 to 77 793, or 328 per day. An average of 282 meals per day were served, although the total fell by 2.03 % from 68 500 to 67 110 meals.

5.1.2.3. Switchboard

In 1999, the number of manually-connected outgoing telephone calls from the Office was around 23 520 (excluding those to the Commission).

The Office has been connected to the Commission's telephone management system (Gestel) so that it is now possible to update the telephone directory within about 24 hours. The introduction of this system has made it noticeably easier to regularly update the directory in question.

5.1.2.4. Mail room/messengers/drivers

The number of letters dispatched and recorded by serial number fell by 15.41 % from 13 802 to 11 675 originals and from 41 406 to 35 025 copies.

The number of letters received and machine-recorded by time and date also fell by 2.63 % from 104 061 to 101 323. Conversely, the number of envelopes stamped and posted increased by 4.35 % from 30 092 to 31 400.

In 1999, the Office's team of drivers covered a total of 175 640 km, or a daily average of 732 km. The number of missions carried out by the drivers — mostly to Brussels — fell by 2.12 % from 283 to 277. A total of 350 consignments were carried, plus six trips per day to the Gasperich depot, the Jean Monnet Building and the Luxembourg Post Office.

5.1.2.5. Physical inventory of property

The system for the physical inventory which has gradually been introduced since 1996 was tested and is operating entirely satisfactorily.

In addition, the new computerised system for monitoring office supplies, and which allowed consumption to be analysed throughout 1999, fulfilled all expectations.

5.2. Workshops

The restructuring of the Commission and its departments, and the reform of its publishing procedures which took effect throughout 1999, slowed down the promotion of Community policies. As a result, the publication of specialised and general reports fell. The activities of the previous College of Commissioners were restricted solely to routine business for most of 1999.

The production parameters reveal a decrease on the preceding year in almost all sectors. These results are due to the abovementioned changes within the Commission. Moreover, as far as production systems are concerned, not all sections are equipped with the latest facilities. The Office has to choose which work to accept by taking account of the desired quality and delivery periods and the specified print-run.

As to the distribution of working time in the workshops per institution, the Commission remains by far the main user of workshop services (86 % of working time).

5.2.1. Printshop

5.2.1.1. Pre-press

A great deal of work was completed in this section and was then sent out of the Office for printing. This allowed for optimum use of resources in this section, which accounts for the more or less stable rate of production. Owing to its complexity, some of the photocomposition work required substantial resources to be diverted from work involving the entire production chain (pre-press, printing and post-printing). This key sector continues to undertake all of the Office's graphic design work.

5.2.1.2. Printing

The delay in the downstream preparation of a number of jobs led to under-utilisation of machinery in the first six months of 1999, the period in which the work was programmed. These delays subsequently affected work planning. All sections of the printshop were affected by these difficulties.

The volume of colour production remained stable and higher than black-and-white production.

5.2.1.3. Post-printing (finishing, stitching)

This section was most affected by the drop in production and is being analysed to establish whether equipment dating from the end of the 1970s should be replaced. The necessary investment would obviously have to be assessed in the light of the Office's future tasks.

5.2.2. LOD (industrial photocopiers)

This section was marked by an increase in the average number and volume of requests for reproduction of publications on demand. The online connection for reproduction from the EUDOR archive allowed production periods to be significantly reduced.

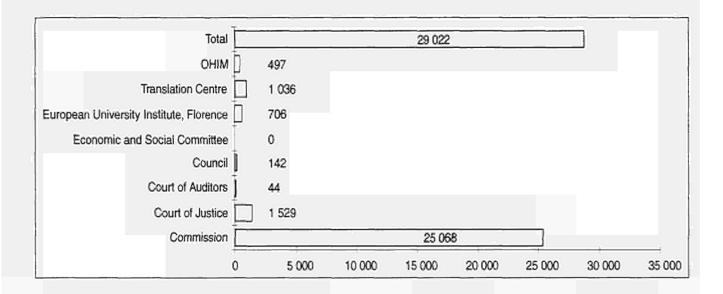
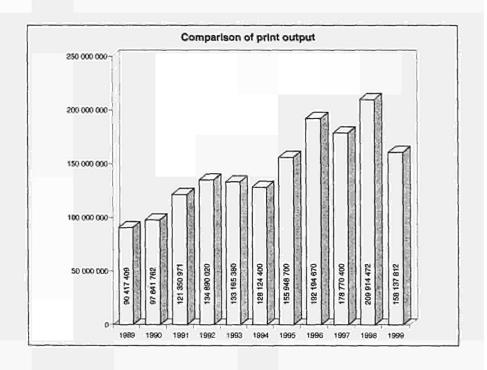

5.3. Stock management and distribution

5.3.1. Service contracts

The invitation to tender issued in 1998 with a view to renewing the contracts for transporting publications produced by the Office was closed in 1999 with the conclusion of two new contracts, one covering regular recipients and the other for ad hoc distribution operations throughout the world.

A new call for tenders on urgent dispatches and mass ad hoc dispatches was started in 1999.

The procedure for renewing the handling contract for storage and distribution on Office premises was also started.

5.3.2. Equipment and supplies

New equipment has been added to the publication packing lines. Following a call for tenders in two lots, a CD-ROM processing module and similar products were acquired in addition to a supplementary strapping system. A second call for tenders for the replacement of two computerised addressing systems which have become obsolete was issued in 1999 and will be concluded in 2000.

Following an invitation to tender, multiannual contracts were concluded for the supply of various board products used for distributing publications.

5.3.3. Address-file management

The Office has now taken over address-file management for the European Parliament.

In addition, specific mailing lists have been created for each Committee of the European Parliament to provide more accurate targeting of European Parliament publications.

Various surveys were conducted in the course of the year with a view to updating the files of certain authorising departments (Court of Justice, promotions sector of the Office).

This year has confirmed the 1998 trend in user interest in the computerised integration of addresses. The target of 100 000 addresses handled using this procedure was reached in 1999.

The highlight of the year was reaching the symbolic figure of 1 million managed addresses.

5.3.4. Basic distribution

Statistics show that distribution of paper copies of the Official Journal fell by approximately 20 % in 1999. One of the major reasons for this fall is that the OJS series existed in paper form for six months in 1998 before becoming a wholly electronic product.

The major increase in the distribution of OJ CD-ROMs is due to the fact that only OJ S CD-ROMs were accounted for in 1998, whereas in 1999 this category covers both the OJ S CD-ROM (multilingual) and the OJ L + $\rm C$

CD-ROMs. In the case of the latter, each CD represents a title in one language version. There has therefore been an apparent explosion in the number of CD titles, although the frequency with which these periodic products are issued actually remains stable.

The number of titles of other CD-ROM publications increased by 15 %.

The most remarkable figures, however, concern the number of copies, where production increased fourfold in 1999. Of the large number of CD-ROMs received in 1999 but not distributed in 1999, 300 000 on the subject of the euro entered into stock at the end of the year and will be distributed early in 2000.

Paper publications other than the Official Journal saw a fall of 12 % in the number of titles and a fall of 14 % in the number of copies, thus arriving at intermediate levels compared with the years 1995 and 1996. One of the likely reasons for the scaling down of general publication activities was the resignation of the Commission in 1999.

Nevertheless, this reduction in volume meant that publications were distributed more quickly: in 1999, around 75 % of the publications delivered were distributed in 72 hours, compared with 69 % in 1998.

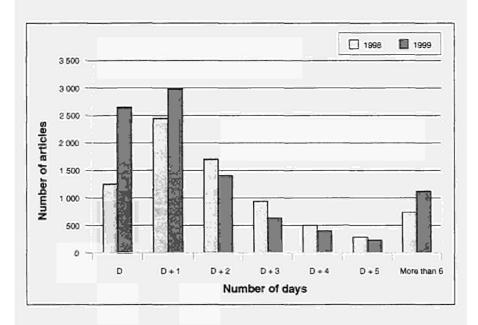

5.3.5. Execution of orders

Analysis of the publication orders in 1999 is complex. In June 1999, the computer applications Artop and Comop, which had been used to manage the stocks and the publication orders, were replaced with the Gescom application,

Certain concepts, which are explained in more detail under Table 48, vary from one application to the other, thus making it difficult to compare 1999 with previous years.

In addition, the gradual implementation of various Gescom modules has not been without difficulty for the user departments, owing to various problems.

The external departments which used Comop to issue orders directly appear to have needed a rather long time to learn to use the new tool. This would go some way to explaining the decline in orders during 1999.

After the spectacular increases in this sector in 1997 and 1998, the figures for orders in 1999 are again close to those of 1996.

The changes made in the area of computerisation make it impossible to assess the order execution times for 1999.

5.3.6. Stock management

The overall volume of publications in stock has remained stable between 1998 and 1999, at around 29.5 million copies.

From January to May 1999, 2 310 705 outdated publications, including more than 750 000 OJs, were withdrawn. The figures for the period starting in June 1999 are not yet available. The total weight of withdrawals for 1999 is around 745 tonnes.

What is interesting, however, is that the number of titles in stock is rising slightly; this may mean that, all things being equal, the authorising departments are beginning to reduce the number of runs of their publications. This would be in line with the Office's wishes, in view of both the not inconsiderable storage costs and the options available nowadays for publishing on demand.

5.3.8. Micrography

The Management Committee decided to cease production and marketing of microfiches of the Official Journal, which represented approximately 77 % of the activity of this sector, on 31 December 1999.

At this stage, the figures are nevertheless reasonably similar to those of 1998. There is a certain stability to this sector, since its target customer base consists primarily of libraries and archives.

5.3.9. Video

This sector remains small in 1999, with a drop of more than 20 % in terms of both orders executed and copies handled.

6.1. Introduction

The procedures for the renewal of contracts for the publications-on-demand service and the renting of the central unit of the Computer Centre have been completed.

Eight multiple framework contracts for highly specialised computer services were concluded with 13 companies and came into force in August 1999.

An invitation to tender for a framework contract of five lots for services in the area of multimedia has been published.

As part of the drive to improve accessibility of Community law, two particularly sensitive and urgent invitations to tender have been concluded. The first covers the production of the consolidated edition of the *Selected instruments taken from the Treaties* in 12 language versions; the second involves a framework contract for the expert legal services required to consolidate the Community acts, for which the institutions have given responsibility to the Office.

The framework contracts for the production of all the series of the Official Journal entered into force in April 1999.

7.2. Temporary staff

In order to cover certain languages for which the reserve lists had proved insufficient, 19 contracts for temporary staff were concluded or renewed during the year. Two interinstitutional competitions, one for Finnish proof-readers and the other for Swedish proof-readers, were organised by the Court of Justice in cooperation with the Commission (and, in particular, the Publications Office). These competitions were completed in June 1999 and have enabled the Publications Office to meet its needs in those languages.

7.3. Auxiliary staff

In order to cover ad hoc proof-reading requirements and medium-term absences of clerical and secretarial staff (e.g. on maternity leave), the Office awarded a total of 20 new contracts to auxiliary staff during the year.

By the end of the year, there were still 13 auxiliary members of staff — eight in category B, four in category C and one in category D.

7.4. Back-up and freelance proof-readers

In application of its code of conduct, the Publications Office awards temporary and auxiliary contracts for *intra muros* services and engages freelance proof-readers for *extra muros* services to supplement its production and proof-reading teams.

The original 1999 budget appropriation, under item 1174 covering fees for back-up and freelance proof-readers was EUR 1 675 000.

Transfers totalling EUR 265 000 were made from this item to items 1110 — Auxiliary staff (EUR 250 000) and 1175 — Other support services (EUR 15 000).

The Publications Office spent EUR 616 961 on auxiliary proof-reader contracts.

Total appropriations spent on reinforcing the proof-reading and production teams in the Office were therefore EUR 2 026 961.

In order to swell the reserve lists of back-up proof-readers in the 11 official languages, the Office organised several aptitude tests during the year. A total of 255 applications were processed and 152 applicants took the tests.

In application of the code of conduct 'Employment of back-up and freelance proof-readers by the Publications Office', the joint monitoring group, made up of two members appointed by the administration and two appointed by the Staff Committee, met four times in the course of the year. The members of the Staff Committee were regularly informed of staff changes.

Over the same period, work for the Court of Justice required 50 man-months, taking all languages together, in addition to proof-reading 'by the page'.

7.5. Training

7.5.1. Training plan

The implementation of the training plan for 1999–2000 involved the issuing of three invitations to tender for the design of courses tailored to the Publications Office's requirements (multimedia, Corel Ventura, developing a website).

7.5.2. Attendance at training courses in 1999

In 1999, 427 officials attended 1 655 training courses, which means that 81 % of staff attended at least one course.

The courses involving the greatest numbers were on computing (946), languages (235) and training in drafting (203).

The Office organised 50 training courses, tailored specifically to its needs, out of its own budget. These were attended by 307 persons and included courses in:

- SGML levels 1 and 2
- DTP
- Production
- Multimedia
- Corel Ventura and Photoshop
- Outlook/Expeditor
- Handling complaints and disputes by telephone

The Office committed EUR 133 000 for these activities.

7.6. Consultations with staff representatives

In 1999, seven meetings were held between the representatives of the Local Staff Committee (CLP) and the Office's Management Committee. The Management Committee also invited the CLP to send two representatives to the meeting on 16 March 1999.

The Office continued and consolidated its policy of permanent social dialogue with the staff and its representatives.

Thanks to the monthly meetings with those elected to the CLP, information can be exchanged at a sufficiently early stage, i.e. prior to a definitive decision by the Management Committee for information from the Office to the CLP, and as requests, concerns and rumours arise for information from the CLP to the Office.

Further instances of this policy of transparency were the referral to the Joint Committee on Health and Safety of all information on the renovation work on the Mercier building, the creation of a monitoring committee and a coordination committee, the participation of staff representatives in site meetings and the setting-up of an ad hoc site accessible to Office staff and to all members of the monitoring committee.

All of these measures make it possible to limit the negative reactions to certain initiatives.

Another effective channel of communication between the Office Management and its staff is *EUR-OP Infos*, the Publications Office's newsletter. Nine issues were published in 1999. In addition to recurring topics, such as directions given by the Management Committee, other matters covered by *EUR-OP Infos* included changes in staff (arrivals, departures, internal movements), the progress of major projects, the renovation of the Mercier building and the European Publishers' Forum.

Three issues are worthy of particular mention:

- 1/99: official ceremony of 31 December 1998 on the occasion of the presentation by the President of the Commission of OJ L 359 (euro conversion rates) at the Office;
- 6/99: publication policy of the Commission and role of the Office;

 8/99: photographs and speeches held by personalities present at the academic symposium organised for staff as part of the Office's 30th anniversary.

7.7. Consultations with trade unions and professional bodies

The trade unions and professional bodies (OSPs) asked for and obtained the following:

- a technical meeting on 10 March 1999 with the Director-General of the Publications Office, mainly on the preliminary draft budget for 2000;
- a policy meeting (the last one having been held on 12 October 1998) on 9 July 1999 with the Secretary-General of the Commission, in his capacity as Chairman of the Management Committee, on the resignation of the Commission and its impact on the social dialogue and on the 2000 budget procedure.

On the occasion of her taking up duties as the Member of the Commission in charge of, *inter alia*, the Publications Office, Mrs Reding met a delegation of trade unions and professional bodies at Luxembourg.

In addition to concerns about the resignation of the Commission, the action taken in response to the Decode exercise, and the reorganisation of the Commission (new organisation chart, impact on the Office), an issue often raised, *inter alia*, as part of the reform of the social dialogue launched by Vice-President Kinnock, was that of Luxembourg as a site.

The usual matters relating to social infrastructure, appropriations, posts and competitions in the professional areas covered by the Publications Office (printing, production, proof-reading) were addressed in the meetings that the OSPs had with the Office's Management Committee, the Secretary-General of the Commission and Commissioner Reding.

7.8. Commission reform and participation in the Task Force for Administrative Reform

Since his appointment as President of the Commission, President Prodi has expressed his intention to bring about wide-ranging reform to the Commission's structures and methods.

Mr Kinnock, the Vice-President for Administrative Reform, implemented several measures, including the creation of a task force reporting directly to the Director-General of the Commission's Personnel and Administration DG.

This task force identified areas of discussion which it referred for comment to 'reform' correspondents nominated by each Director-General from his own staff.

Two representatives of the Publications Office (one correspondent and one alternate) took an active role in this initiative, which will serve as the basis for the White Paper and action plan to be approved by the Commission on 1 March 2000.

The reform was the subject of frequent discussion at the weekly meetings of assistants.

8. Application of the current provisions relating to longand medium-term translations

In 1999, Group G of the Translation Service (SdT) translated 13 964 pages for the Office.

As in previous years, *EUR-OP News* accounted for much of this workload. As from 1998, this quarterly publication has been translated into all the Community languages.

The work carried out by SdT's CELEX team under the contract for rendering services in connection with the CELEX database amounted to approximately three man-years.

The Office also continued its close collaboration with the SdT's Directorate for General & Language Matters in 1999, particularly in relation to the translation of the Commission's organisation chart and the drawing-up and publication in paper and electronic form in all language versions of the *Interinstitutional style guide*.

Lastly, mention should be made of the collaboration between the Office, the SdT and other directorates-general of the Commission in setting up systems for managing and exchanging computerised textual data. This will substantially reduce the time required for publishing the Commission's major documents, such as the *Bulletin of the European Union*, the budget and Community agreements.

Annex I — CELEX

(The interinstitutional computerised documentation system for Community law)

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General overview

What is CELEX?

CELEX (*Communitatis Europeae Lex*) is the official interinstitutional legal database of the European Union.

CELEX came into operation in the early 1970s for internal use by the Commission; in the course of that decade it became interinstitutional, and at the beginning of the 1980s it was converted to a multilingual system accessible to the general public.

CELEX covers:

- Community legislation, including preparatory documents and references to national implementing measures,
- case law of the Court of Justice and the Court of First Instance,
- parliamentary questions.

CELEX is distributed to users external to the European institutions via three main channels:

- direct distribution by the Publications Office to privileged users such as the Commission's network of European Documentation Centres (EDCs) and Euro Info Centres (EICs);
- ordinary customers can subscribe to CELEX through a network of 17 official gateways, which provide access online to the database, housed in the Commission's computing centre;
- in addition, 26 licence holders are disseminating derived versions of CELEX online or on CD-ROM, which enables them to create information products incorporating CELEX data presented together with other relevant information.

Activities during 1999

The most important event in 1999 was the migration of the CELEX dissemination databases to a new technical platform. After more than 20 years of service the Mistral system was replaced by a more flexible open system, that will facilitate future developments of the service.

In order to enable the professional users to continue to fully exploit the contents of CELEX even after the closure of the Mistral search system a new expert search www-interface was opened for internal users in April 1999 and for external users at the turn of the year 1999–2000.

The Publications Office continued its efforts to improve the coverage and quality as well as the accessibility of the database and general reviews of the contents of certain sectors of the database were undertaken.

The increase of the number of consultations of the database continued in 1999. The number of documents visualised was 15 million in 1999 compared to 14 million in 1998 and 8 million in 1997. The number of direct consultation sessions went up with more than 1 million from 1 180 000 in 1998 to 2 221 500 in 1999. CELEX continues to be one of the European Commission's most widely used intranet services.

Following a decision by the Management Committee of the Publications Office the CELEX Interinstitutional Group (GIC) was replaced by a single steering committee for all legal information systems produced by the Publications Office. The GIC as well as the new committee, Interinstitutional Group Lex (GIL), and the Council Working Party on Legal Data Processing (GIJC) assisted in the management and dissemination of CELEX.

The Council Working Party held two meetings (on 10 and 11 May and 28 and 29 October). The GIC met twice (on 3 March and 28 June) and the GIL had two meetings (on 23 September and 30 November).

Integrated service for access to legal documents

In 1999, the Publications Office's Management Committee commissioned an interinstitutional task force to study the current provisions of services offering legal documents in electronic form and make proposals for an integrated, user-friendly and comprehensive system of access to legal documents at the Europa server. In its report the task force recommended a three-level distribution structure:

- 1. the creation of a comprehensive repository for legal documents and a streamlining of the production chains;
- 2. an integration of existing services to avoid duplication of work and eliminate redundant functions;
- 3. the creation of a common point of entry, a portal, to EU law on the Europa server.

The Management Committee adopted the task force report and asked the Publications Office to draw up a plan for the implementation of an integrated service. This service will be introduced gradually during the coming years. CELEX will, among other things, get an extended coverage in order to be one of the cornerstones of this comprehensive integrated service.

1. Production

A CELEX document consists of two basic parts:

- the analytical part, containing the title, date, various descriptors and links to other documents, which is created for each language version by a program on the basis of the same coded version of the document. Because of this parallelism between all the language versions the term 'documentary unit' is used below to refer to a given document.
- the textual part, containing the text and annexes to the document (except for Sector 7 where the documents do not contain text, and Sectors 5 and 9, which are partly loaded); these texts were in the past loaded as they became available, which explains the differences in text coverage.

These two parts are loaded on a weekly basis.

1.3. Extending coverage

COM documents not published in the OJ C series

As part of the Greffe 2000 system, COM documents are made available in an electronic version by the Secretariat-General of the Commission. This has made it possible to load in CELEX the full texts of all COM documents distributed by Greffe 2000, including those not published in the OJ C.

1.4. Production tools

The production system was adapted to work with the new dissemination platform. Preparations were also made for the migration of the production system to a new technical platform in 2000 following the migration of the dissemination system.

2. Dissemination

This chapter provides statistics on the dissemination of the CELEX reference databases and the derived versions. The increased use of the CELEX reference databases has continued throughout 1999 as a result of the introduction of the new user-friendly interface using the Web technology. The statistics below show the development of the direct dissemination of CELEX to the institutions as well as to external users (2.1), the commercial aspects of the direct dissemination of CELEX to external users (2.2) and the dissemination of derived versions (2.3).

Table 5 (a) — Trend in number of documents viewed by direct consultation

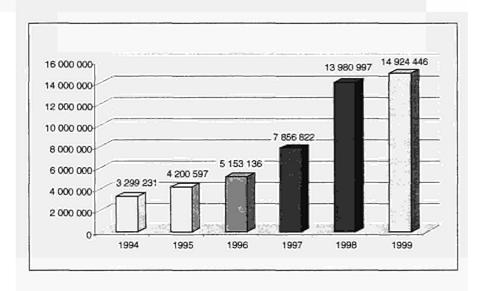
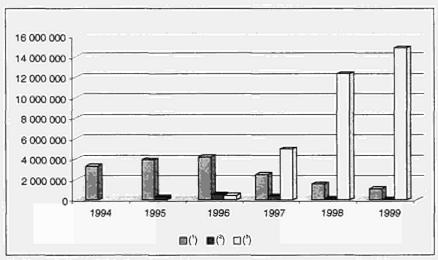


Table 5 (b) — Breakdown of the number of documents viewed by type of consultation

Table 6 (a) — Trend in number of direct consultation sessions

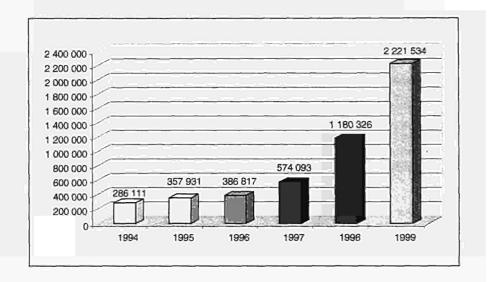
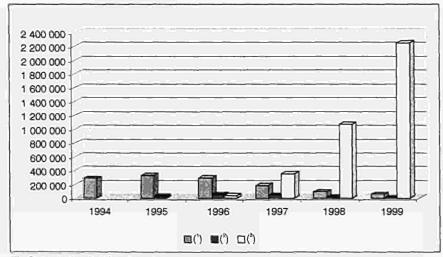


Table 6 (b) — Breakdown of the number of sessions by type of consultation

2.2. Access by external users

Online dissemination of the reference databases is managed by the Publications Office. The computer infrastructure is provided by the Commission's Data Centre. There are two types of online distribution:

- direct distribution: users (mainly privileged users, i.e. European Documentation Centres, Euro Info Centres etc.) who have concluded an access contract with the Publications Office;
- indirect distribution: users who have concluded a contract with an official gateway agent.

2.4. Publishing the *Directory* of Community legislation in force

The 32nd and 33rd editions of the *Directory of Community legislation in force* were published in February and October respectively.

3. Major development projects

3.1. New graphical expert interface

A first version of the new 'expert search interface' was introduced in April 1999 for users within the European institutions. This interface was developed in order to replace the Mistral native search language and to enable professional users to fully exploit all the data in CELEX through flexible search and display modules. An improved version of this expert interface was opened to both internal and external users at the end of 1999.

3.2. Preparations for the migration of the production system

In the year 2000 the CELEX production system will also be migrated to a new and more flexible technical platform. In order to facilitate this migration extensive preparatory work was done during 1999 alongside the migration of the dissemination system. Unfortunately, certain development projects, such as the introduction of new types of documents in CELEX, had to be postponed while awaiting the new production system.

4. Resources

4.1. 1999 financial year

The Publications Office spent EUR 1 587 506 on CELEX in 1999 (excluding re-use of revenues from 1999), broken down as follows:

- item 3431 'production': EUR 662 556;
- item 3431 'documentation': EUR 19 600;
- item 3431 'Software licences': EUR 155 000;
- item 3431 'development': EUR 750 350.

Table 12 gives the breakdown of these amounts.

In 1999, the Publications Office's CELEX team comprised eight posts: six A posts, one B post and one C post.

The human resources allocated to dissemination within the Sales Unit are estimated at three man-years.

The work done by the Translation Service (translation of the web screens, language-checking, etc.) amounted to approximately three man-years.

The human resources allocated by the other institutions to CELEX input in 1999 were as follows:

- European Parliament: 1.5 man-years.
- Court of Justice: 1.5 man-years.
- Council: 1 man-year.
- Economic and Social Committee: 0.5 man-years.
- Committee of the Regions: 0.5 man-years.

Despite the decrease in prices following the introduction of the Web interface the income from CELEX continued to grow in 1999. The remarkable increase in income from consultation is mainly due to the fact that a growing number of subscribers have chosen the flat-fee rate (at EUR 960/year). The revenues from flat-free subscriptions were EUR 222 285 in 1999 compared to EUR 71 150 in 1998.

4.2. 2000 financial year

The 2000 draft CELEX budget gives the following estimates:

- item 3431 'production': EUR 700 000;

- item 3431 'documentation': EUR 25 000;

- item 3431 'software licences': EUR 362 000;

— item 3431 'development': EUR 563 000.

The total budget is EUR 1 650 000, which is EUR 200 000 more than in 1999. The real expenditures in 1999 were EUR 1 587 506, compared to the planned EUR 1 450 000.

This was mainly due to licence costs related to the software for the new platform.
