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Foreword by Patrick Venturini, Chairman of the Management Committee

The information and communication strategy has been on the agenda of the institutions and bodies of the European Union for a long time. It is the tool for bringing the European Union closer to its citizens, as well as to those throughout the world interested in European affairs, by sending coherent messages to the general public and offering high-quality information products and services to specialised audiences and readerships. The Publications Office once again contributed to this goal by offering the means to attain them, with its capacity to offer high-quality service to its clients and the general public.

Multilingualism, another concern of the institutions, is an essential tool for achieving communication with the Union's citizens. The Publications Office with its connections to the sales network and information relays is very well placed to identify themes interesting a certain public in a certain Member State and thus to advise author services accordingly.

The role of the Office in these domains will be enhanced through the revision of Decision 2000/459 governing the organisation and operation of the Office, so that it will become a main actor in the implementation of the information and communication strategy and — why not — a reference point for information concerning the European Union.

2007 was marked by publishing the Official Journal daily in 23 languages, by the publication of the 'acquis communautaire' in Bulgarian and Romanian, languages that became official as of 1 January 2007, by the completion of the consolidation of legislation in the nine languages that became official on 1 May 2004 and by the launching of the consolidation in Bulgarian and Romanian.

The year was also marked by the launching of an ambitious project named Publications Office Digital Library which aims —after scanning about 14 million pages— to make available all publications of the European Union since its creation.

Another important issue addressed during 2007 was the technical evolution with a view to guaranteeing the authenticity of the electronic edition of the Official Journal. To date, the online edition of the Official Journal is solely for information purposes. In practice however, this edition is the one most consulted by professionals and citizens alike, as is confirmed by the ever-dwindling numbers of subscriptions to the authentic paper edition, the number of subscribers to which is as low as 3 in certain languages. In our increasingly electronic world, there is therefore an urgent need to guarantee the authenticity of the electronic edition. The Publications Office thus established a plan, extending over the whole of 2008, for an entirely secure production and dissemination line which would fulfil this requirement.

The Office's online public services were continuously modernised, extended and promoted over the year:

■ EUR-Lex, the single access point to European law, which is highly appreciated by professionals and the academic world, offers new search facilities through its Expert search. New categories of documents have been incorporated as well as features such as access to national legislation.

- TED, the linchpin of European public procurement which represents 16% of the EU's gross domestic product —, is a continuously expanding service which also benefits from the high multiplying effect of so-called OJ eSenders, who act as collecting agents for public procurement notices, and licence holders, who further disseminate the information on public procurement opportunities.
- EU Bookshop, the virtual library of the European Union, is kept up-to-date with all new titles; it now contains some 26 000 titles, most of them in several languages, which go back to the 1950s and may be downloaded free-of-charge or ordered by the citizens.
- CORDIS, the Community Research and Development Information Service, the most renowned online service in the world of science, offers numerous services for the benefit of the specialised audiences it addresses. In 2007, a service level agreement signed between the Office and the Directorate-General for Research set up a CORDIS Management Board which handles strategic aspects and editorial policy for projects developed under the seventh framework programme for research and technological development (2007-2013).

Last but not least, 2007 was marked by a change of the leadership of the Office. As of 1 August, Ms Martine Reicherts was appointed Director of the Office. Her innovative ideas and ambitions will help the Office move forward in the field of new technologies related to publishing.

I know that the Publications Office will be able to face new challenges because I was again able to witness the skills and professionalism of its staff.

On behalf of the Management Committee, I wish to thank each and every staff member for their commitment and enthusiasm in carrying forward the Office's numerous projects and their dedication at the service of the citizens on behalf of the EU institutions.

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Executive summary

Numerous issues were discussed during the four Management Committee meetings held in 2007, such as the progress of various projects (publication of the secondary legislation in Bulgarian and Romanian, the future of the Official Journal, the online EU Bookshop service for general publications, the EUR-Lex integrated portal to EU law, the CORDIS portal, etc.). The Management Committee was fully involved in the recruitment procedure for the post of Director of the Office and proposed the appointment of the current Director to the Commission which followed the recommendation. The Management Committee reviewed the draft text prepared by an interinstitutional group whose mandate was to draft a revised text of Decision 2000/459 laying down the rules on the organisation and operation of the Publications Office. The draft was transmitted to the Institutions' Legal Services. (A, I)

In 2007, the Publications Office's Management Committee kept abreast of production, dissemination and administrative data via the quarterly information reports communicated by the Office's Director and of other issues raised by written procedure or via information notes.(*A*, *I*)

The annual meetings with the Commission directorates-general, other institutions, agencies and bodies have become an integral part of the Office's strategy of exchange with author services. (A, II.1)

Five service level agreements were signed during the course of 2007, negotiations were underway for four others, and two updates were signed. (A, II.2)

Timely planning and the submission of annual publications programmes is becoming more and more the norm. 1 829 publications were foreseen in the 2007 POP. (A, II.3)

2007 was mainly devoted to the consolidation and enhancement of the contractual framework between the Publications Office and its commercial distribution network. The Office offered publications on consignment to increase the display, visibility and thus the sales of selected EU publications in bookshops. In order to address the request by author services to be visible in important internet bookstores and book referencing portals, first contacts were held with major players in the internet book sales and search engines. (A, II.4.1)

The European Forum of Official Gazettes — an informal association of organisations responsible for publishing the national legal gazettes — met in Helsinki and Talinn in June. (A, II.4.2)

The EU Publishers' Forum — a useful search tool for licensing rights or producing joint publications — held its annual meeting in the presence of Commissioner Orban at the Frankfurt Book Fair in October. (A, II.4.3)

Following discussions on structure, content and legal value of the online edition of the Official Journal, organisational measures and technical developments were decided to bring the reliability of the electronic version to the same level as that of the paper edition which is, currently, the only medium having legal value. The structure of the Official Journal was modified as of 1 January 2007 to ensure a clearer classification of the acts published, preserving, nevertheless, the essential continuity with the previous structure. (*B, I.1*)

2007 witnessed the completion of the 5th enlargement of the European Union and the addition of two further official languages — Bulgarian and Romanian. In accordance to the Council Regulation No 920/2005, the publication of the Official Journal in Irish started

on 1 January 2007 and the derogation for the Maltese edition was abandoned on 1 May 2007 as foreseen in Council Regulation No 1738/2006. These decisions brought the total number of languages in which the Official Journal is published to 23. (*B*, *I*.1)

After an increase of 26.5% in 2006, partly due to the upcoming enlargement, the volume of pages produced in 2007 remained stable (-0.5%) despite the additional languages. For the second time in the history of the Official Journal, the volume of the OJ L&C series, including the budgetary documents, exceeded 1 million pages. (B, I.1.2, Annex III, Tables 1 to 3, and Graph 2)

At year-end, 672 volumes of the Official Journal Special Edition with the secondary legislation in Bulgarian and Romanian, representing 90.32% of the total (744 volumes), were printed. (*B*, *I.1.2.3*)

The OJ L&C CD-ROM was regularly produced in 22 languages (Maltese included) from May 2007 onwards. One thematic CD-ROM, containing the Common Nomenclature, was published in 2007. (*B*, *I.1.2.4*)

The EUR-Lex online service remains highly appreciated by professionals, public authorities as well as by NGOs all over the Union and beyond. With an average of 5.6 million visits per month — and peaks up to 8.1 and 7.8 million respectively in June and July —, it provides user-friendly access to some 2.3 million documents of European law in all languages. (B, I.2.1 and Annex III, Graph 4)

For N-Lex, the common access portal to the legal websites of the Member States, several national authorities expressed an interest in having their legal databases become accessible through the portal. (*B*, *I.2.2*)

At year-end, the number of consolidated families of legislative acts (in all languages except Bulgarian, Romanian and Maltese) stood at 2 676. (*B, I.3*)

The *Directory of Community legislation in force* is published monthly in an updated online version. It includes hyperlinks to all acts, including their consolidated versions over time. An archive gives access online to the legislation in force on 1 January and 1 June of a given year. (B, I.4)

The number of procurement notices published increased by 14.6% to attain 307 231 notices. The volume of notices received in structured electronic format increased significantly, reaching 76% of the total at year-end (59% in 2006). (B, I.5, Annex III, Table 4, and Graph 3)

Consultation of the TED database was stable in 2007 with some 26 million notices consulted. The number of subscriptions to the OJ S CD-ROM decreased by 22% (1 665 versus 2 128 in 2006) while that of licence holders increased (117 versus 113 in 2006). (B, I.5.3 and Annex III, Table 12)

Copyright activity increased marginally in 2007 compared to 2006 (807 copyright requests received versus 793 in 2006). (*B*, *II.1*)

Some 44 000 bibliographical notices were processed in 2007. ISBN and ISSN attribution increased in 2007 (+51%). The Office is also an official agent for the attribution of Digital Object Identifiers: 1 288 DOIs were attributed during the year. (*B*, *II.2.1 and Annex III*, *Table 9*)

Studies on the interoperability of thesauri and on the renewal of the Eurovoc maintenance and dissemination sites were conducted during the second half of 2007. A call for tender for the renewal of Eurovoc is currently under preparation. (*B*, *II*.2.2)

2007 saw the site of the *Interinstitutional Style Guide* extended to all official languages resulting from the 2004 enlargement. An updated paper edition in English was published in July 2007. Visits to the pages of the Style Guide make up around 59% of the visits to the the Publications Office's website. (*B, II.2.3*)

The number of proofread pages increased significantly by 98% (557 882 compared to 281 773 in 2006) while the number of camera-ready pages decreased by 7.7%. Around 300 000 pages concerned the completion of 497 volumes of the 2004 and 2005 European Court Reports (representing 41 volumes per month). This was made easier by the availability of a new contract. (*B*, *II*.3)

The graphic design section contributed to the production of Office own-items and was also involved in a number of major projects for various author services. (*B*, *II.4*)

For general publications, development of Plan-Publi — the monitoring and document management tool — continued, and access was opened to some 20 author services by year-end. Although there was a decrease in the number of titles published (6 107 compared to 6 896 in 2006), in fact more pages were produced: a total of 528 986 compared to 449 019 in 2006. 53 websites (40 in 2006) were developed in 2007. The editors' function was expanded by increasing the capacity to handle hard-copy titles, whilst the editorial function for multimedia projects was created. The number of cost estimates drawn up came to 3 207 in 2007 compared to 3 240 in 2006. This gave rise, however, to a marked increase of 27.6% in the number of order forms drawn up: 1 696 in 2007 compared to 1 329 in 2006. The value of order forms increased by 50.7% over the previous year: 24 275 546 euro compared to 1 108 415 euro. 3 284 invoices were processed in 2007, of which 2 975 for a total value of about 15 million euro were for print publications, and 309 for a total value of approximately 4 million were for multimedia products. (*B, II.5 and Annex III, Tables 5 and 26*)

The number of publications distributed on delivery decreased by 24% and that of individual orders by 15%. 35.9 million copies were distributed in 2007. The efforts made in 2007 to encourage authors to reduce their stocks, did not produce the expected results: the overall stock rose to 34.5 million copies (+8.8% compared to 2006). The mailing list management system contains some 800 000 addresses. The number of electronic surveys increases constantly and confirms the need for developing new electronic methods of dissemination. (*B, II.6 and Annex III, Table 10*)

The digital workshop created in early 2006 aims at making available in electronic format all paper publications as a major contribution to establishing EU Bookshop as the electronic library for all EU publications from 1952 onwards. The expansion of the Publications Office's print-on-demand service will offer author services an alternative to large initial print-runs. In 2007, the number of pages produced by the digital printshop was 9.8 million (10.8 million in 2006). (*B, II.7*)

The number of interventions required from the Office's helpdesk rose again in 2007 by 30%. (B. II.8 and Annex III, Table 19)

The Publications Office participated in various international exhibitions, promoting not only EU publications but also its online services. A particular effort was invested in promoting the 'Together since 1957' theme throughout the year. Development and production of promotional fact sheets, leaflets and posters were high on the agenda. (B. II.8.3)

The Publications Office issued in 2007 2 025 commercial invoices (which also includes 67 credit notes) for a total amount of 4 449 815 euro, i.e. a decrease of some 16% in the number of invoices and a decrease of 14% in commercial invoicing compared to 2006. It is however worth noting an increase of around 37% in sales revenue of monographs (books) in comparison with 2006. (B, II.9 and Annex III, Table 18)

Priced publications represented 4.3% of the general publications. (B, II.9)

Paying subscriptions to all types of periodicals decreased by 20.8%. The number of different types of subscriptions to periodicals other than the Official Journal dropped from 14 in 2006 to 11 in 2007. (B, II.9 and Annex III, Table 13)

Licences for TED and EUR-Lex showed an increase of 3.5% and 8.7% respectively, demonstrating that they fulfil a market need. (B, II.9 and Annex III, Table 16)

For the first time since its opening in March 2005, EU Bookshop crossed the threshold of 1 000 000 visits within the same calendar year. This confirms the growing interest for the website and is also a result of the enhanced and continuous promotion activities undertaken in 2007. (B, II.10 and Annex III, Graph 6)

In September 2007, the Publications Office's Digital Library project took shape. It aims to create a complete online archive of all official European Union publications ever published. Individual requests for digitisation of old publications are already served by the in-house scanning workshop which saw its activities increase considerably in 2007. (*B*, *II.10*)

The high level of usage of CORDIS was confirmed throughout 2007 (40 662 336 visits) as well as the high level of availability (99.8%). All FP7 calls for proposals were published on time. The 2007 user satisfaction survey showed a high level of satisfaction, in particular with CORDIS News and FP7 pages. Users have quoted that CORDIS has significantly improved in usability and clarity. This is also reflected by an increased number of subscribers for the paper edition *CORDIS Focus* (+10%). With the aim of improving the governance, synergy and complementarity of activities conducted by the Publications Office and Research DGs, a Service Level Agreement (SLA) was signed on 27 September 2007. This SLA covers governance, communication, publications, promotional and information activities. (*B, III and Annex III, Graph 5*)

The Office's establishment plan reached 655 officials. (C, I.1.1, Annex III, Table 30 and Graph 1)

Priorities for training in 2007 were set, with particular emphasis on the development of skills in electronic publication, in marketing and editorial techniques. The overall average training received was 10 days per staff member. (*C, I.2*)

In 2007, the overall budget managed by the Publications Office amounted to 172.88 million euro (183.38 million euro in 2006), of which 131.79 million euro came from budget items formally delegated to the Office, 7 million euro from budget items subdelegated to the Office and 34.09 million euro from appropriations from the institutions' budgets. The Office issued recovery orders for a total of 11.4 million euro. (*C, II*)

In terms of public procurement, the Office conducted 52 tender procedures in 2007. 108 contracts were established in 2007 for a total of 125 654 262 euro. (*C*, *III*)

The unit dedicated to IT projects management focused on managerial and organisational aspects of the various projects and improved procedures. Several major development projects were implemented. (C, V)

The risk analysis exercise focused on critical procedures and reviewed the register of risks and the status of the action plans. (*C*,*VI*.1)

In 2007, the main tasks of the internal audit were the audit of the effectiveness and adequacy of the internal control in the area of general services, building management and

IT infrastructure, management of contracts, implementation of ICS, and the follow-up of audit recommendations. The IAC carried out advisory tasks for the internal control standards, and ensured coordination with external auditors. (C, VI.2)

Ex-ante financial control covered 1 022 transactions in 2007 (38% of relevant files). Ex-post control of payment transactions covered 732 transactions (14.52% in number, 18.42% in value), and 69 commitments introduced by units exempted from ex-ante control corresponding to 57.7% of the global amount were also checked. (*C*, *VI.3*)

In 2007, evaluation activities focused on two areas: the key performance indicators reported to the Management Committee and the ex-ante evaluation of the contract for the production of the Official Journal Series L&C. Further evaluations of calls for tender were prepared. In conjunction with the risk analysis of procedures, simplification possibilities and documentation status were explored. (*C*, *VI.4*)

The switch to a central cogeneration system resulted in a 40% reduction of the Mercier building's CO₂ emissions. In July 2007 the quality label 'SuperDrecksKëscht fir Betriber' was awarded to the Office because of its compliance with the Luxembourg provisions in the field of recycling. (C, VII)

Meetings with the Local Staff Committee were held at regular intervals in 2006. The Committee was kept informed on the evolution of the Office's structure, budget, building and recruitment procedures. The Staff Committee was invited to its yearly exchange of views with the Management Committee. (D, I)

A staff satisfaction survey was carried out in 2007. The suggestions related to well-being will be addressed in an action plan. (*D*, *II*)

Policy strategy

I. The Management Committee

The Publications Office is an interinstitutional body governed by a Management Committee, in which each institution is represented by its Secretary-General or, in the case of the Court of Justice, by the Court's Registrar. The Office's mission is to offer the highest-quality publishing service to its clients — the originating departments of the institutions and other bodies of the European Union — so that the latter may fulfil their publishing obligations.

For questions related to personnel management, the Chairman may invite the Commission's Director-General for Personnel and Administration to contribute to the Committee's work. In 2007, this post was held by Mr Claude Chêne.

In 2007, the Management Committee met on 29 June (Members), 9 March, 25 May and 19 October (Substitute Members). On 29 June 2007, the Management Committee decided unanimously to propose to the Commission the appointment of Ms Martine Reicherts to the post of the Director of the Office. This took place on 1 August.

At the same meeting, the Management Committee reviewed the draft text submitted by the interinstitutional group whose mandate was to produce a revised version of Decision 2000/459 laying down the rules on the organisation and operation of the Publications Office. The draft was then transmitted to the Institutions' Legal Services for further fine-tuning.

In the context of the above-mentioned revision, the President of the Management Committee proposed that the new Director be entrusted with a mission to reflect on the strategic guidelines for the Office over the next five years; this analysis should lead to the establishment of a development plan. A mandate to this effect was approved, and a first report was transmitted to the President in November. The final report is due in April 2008

The Management Committee was kept up-to-date on ongoing activities by the quarterly information reports on its production, dissemination and administrative tasks communicated by the Director. Furthermore, 11 files were submitted to the Management Committee by way of written procedure.

The Management Committee also received regular reports on the following activities or projects:

- progress of the secondary legislation project in the two new official languages;
- the future of the Official Journal. The detailed document was approved. The document contained proposals to modify the structure of the contents of the Official Journal and a series of actions to be undertaken to guarantee the authenticity of its electronic edition. The implementation of the new structure took effect as of 1 January 2007. A proposal for implementing the authentic online edition is foreseen to be submitted towards end 2008;
- the development and enhancement of the Office's online public services and more particularly the progress on the usage and further development of the EU Bookshop service the online digital bookshop of the European Union. The project of incorporating into EU Bookshop all publications of the European institutions was approved and work started in December 2007.

The Management Committee approved the reorganisation of some services of the Office which took effect on 1 January 2008.

II. Relations with institutions and other bodies

1. Institutions and other bodies

New clients in 2007 included the European Chemicals Agency (ECHA), the European Group of Ethics (EGE), the European Research Council (ERC) and the European GNSS Supervisory Authority (GSA).

The annual meeting with the *Commission's Directorates-General* took place in Luxembourg on 14 June 2007. This event was held earlier this year, in order to raise awareness within the DGs as regards the necessity of early planning of the publications programmes.

Meetings with the *Representations* of the European Commission (23 and 24 April 2007), with the *Institutions* (8 November 2007) and with the *Agencies and other bodies* (17, 18 and 19 October 2007) took place in Luxembourg.

In particular this year, and in cooperation with the European Training Foundation in Turin, the annual agency meeting started with a workshop on dissemination and distribution issues.

There was particular interest in the publications planning tool (Plan-Publi), the Digital Object Identifiers (DOIs) and copyright issues.

For quality improvement purposes, as of 2007 every annual meeting is subsequently evaluated through a satisfaction survey questionnaire. The results show a high level of satisfaction, which was also confirmed by the results of the annual satisfaction survey addressed to all author services.

2. Service level agreements

Five new service level agreements were signed in 2007: with the Court of Justice and four Commission Directorates-General (Secretariat-General, Budget, Research, and Economic and Financial Affairs), whilst updates to two existing agreements were signed, notably with CEDEFOP and the European Economic and Social Committee (EESC).

3. Publications programmes

Publications programmes are meant to facilitate consulting and planning of projects and eventually encouraging synergies among author services. Author services are asked to send their publications programmes to the Office. The number of titles registered in 2007 (as at 31.12.2007) came to 1 829 (2006: 1 512, i.e. an increase of 20.2%), of which 1 571 were planned as hard-copy publications and the remainder on electronic media.

4. Other organisations

4.1. The sales agents network

2007 was mainly devoted to the consolidation and enhancement of the contractual framework between the Publications Office and the members of its commercial distribution network. The current network was carefully monitored. This includes offering publications on consignment.

Furthermore, to expand and update the network of commercial distributors worldwide (in particular outside Europe), a call for expressions of interest was launched. To increase the awareness of professional distributors and draw their attention to this selection process, an information seminar was organised at the Frankfurt Book Fair.

In order to address the request by author services to be visible in important internet book stores and book referencing portals, first contacts were held with major players in the internet book sales and search engines.

4.2. The European Forum of Official Gazettes

In 2007, the Publications Office continued its work as secretariat of the *European Forum* of Official Gazettes and of the working parties set up by this informal association of organisations responsible for publishing the national legal gazettes, inside and outside the European Union.

Its agenda reflects the general tendency in Europe to introduce new technologies in the production and dissemination of the legal gazettes. For the time being, the following subjects are being studied in specialised working groups: 'Archiving of the electronic legal gazette', 'Consolidation', 'Access to official gazettes and legislation' and 'Indexing'.

The Forum held its fourth meeting in June.

4.3. The European Union Publishers' Forum

The annual meeting of the Forum took place at the Frankfurt Book Fair on 11 October 2007.

Two bulletins and the annual catalogue were published.


Several specific actions were conducted during 2007:

- The Publications Office pursued its efforts to increase the awareness of author services for the re-use of Community material.
- General information about the Forum and copublishing is featured in the new Publications Office website. Integration of joint publications into the EU Bookshop service under a specific heading 'Partnership publications' is being prepared.
- The Forum was presented at the Prague Book Fair and at the institutions' annual meeting.
- Several presentations were addressed to the institutions, agencies and commercial publishers regarding the partnership cooperation between the EU and commercial or public publishers in view of promoting copublishing.

15 contracts were signed in 2007 (9 licences and 6 copublishing agreements, among which three *ad hoc* copublishing agreements with international organisations, OECD and Rosstat).

4.4. The Bridge Forum Dialogue

The Publications Office is a member of the Bridge Forum Dialogue, a non-profit organisation established in Luxembourg. Other European institutions also belong to this organisation. The Bridge Forum Dialogue serves as a platform for interdisciplinary debates. It aims at linking, on the one hand, the European institutions established in Luxembourg and, on the other hand, the actors and institutions of Luxembourg academic, financial, economic and legal fields.



Access to EU Law

1. Official Journal

1.1. Overview

After an increase of 26.5% in 2006, partly due to the upcoming enlargement, the volume of pages produced in 2007, including the budgetary documents, remained stable (–0.5%) despite the four additional languages: Bulgarian and Romanian, following the 2007 enlargement (completion of the 5th enlargement), Irish as of 1 January 2007 further to Council Regulation No 920/2005, and from 1 May 2007 onwards, Maltese, as foreseen by Council Regulation No 1738/2006.

For the second time in the history of the Official Journal, the volume of the OJ L&C series, including budgetary documents, exceeded 1 million pages.

The first release of the new workflow 'Plan-JO' was put in production on 9 July 2007, and further developments are on track. The integration of the OJ production within Plan-JO started step by step with Council documents. The production of the daily L is covered since November 2007. The rest of the OJ production will be integrated into Plan-JO at the end of March 2008 at the latest.

The efforts devoted in 2006 by an interinstitutional working group to re-thinking the structure of the Official Journal came to fruition: as of 1 January 2007, the OJ has a new structure which ensures a clearer classification of the acts published, preserving, nevertheless, the essential continuity with the previous structure. Concerning the authentic online edition, an action plan was established; conclusion of this ambitious project is foreseen by the end of 2010.

Last but not least, 2007 saw the printing of 672 volumes of the Secondary Legislation in Bulgarian and Romanian; what remains to be published in 2008 are international agreements and some acts adopted at the end of 2006.

1.2. Production

1.2.1. Official Journal L&C

The volume of the Official Journal L series decreased by 17.8% from 574 016 pages to 471 769 pages. The volume of the C series rose by 28.4%, from 377 207 pages to 484 313 pages (see Annex III, Table 1). The increase of the OJ C series is due to the backlog of 2006 texts which were published in 2007.

The number of issues published in 2007 was 356 for the OJ L (of which 350 OJ L and 6 OJ LM, where LM is the Special Edition in Maltese) and 404 for the OJ C (of which 69 OJ CA in English only), compared to 426 and 460 respectively in 2006 (see Annex III, Table 2).

The proportion of issues delivered in time reached 99.8%.

1.2.2. Budgetary documents

The number of pages of the preliminary draft general budget and of the draft general budget totalled 44 088 pages (2 004 pages per language version) and 34 760 pages (1 580 pages per language version) respectively. Compared with 2006, the total volume of budgetary documents produced decreased by 10.2%, the total number of pages produced being 83 986.

1.2.3. Publication of the legislation in force in the new official languages

At the end of 2007, 672 volumes of the Special Edition of the Official Journal (secondary legislation) in Bulgarian and Romanian were printed. This represents 90.32% of the total (744 volumes).

As far as the secondary legislation in the official languages of the 2004 enlargement is concerned, it is to be noted that in 2007 two 'volumes-balais' were published and one is still in production (41 volumes out of 44 in total were published by end 2006).

1.2.4. OJ L&C CD-ROM

The CD-ROM of the OJ L&C series was produced throughout 2007 in 21 languages until April 2007 and in 22 languages from May 2007 onwards; it was delivered every month within the agreed deadlines.

The 2007 Common Nomenclature was published as a thematic CD-ROM.

1.3. Quality control

465 345 pages of the Official Journal were proofread in 2007, representing some 49% of the OJ pages published, or 13% more than in 2006. New quality control activities have been initiated, such as the quality control of consolidated legal acts, of tender notices published on TED, as well as of EUR-Lex site pages.

After the quasi-completion of the publication of the «acquis communautaire» in Bulgarian and Romanian, proofreading teams for these languages were successfully integrated into the unit. The smooth introduction of teleworking in 2007 is also worth mentioning with, so far, 9 participants.

On the quality of legislation, regular meetings with the Parliament, the Council and the Commission Legal Services have been instituted, with a view to cooperating and improving the current situation.

2. EUR-Lex — the integrated access to EU law

2.1. Overview

The main tasks for 2007 consisted in ensuring the regular production of the EUR-Lex legal database, the continuous, timely, qualitative, easy and user-friendly access to the data in the EUR-Lex service for users and licence holders and further developments of EUR-Lex and connected services.

Availability of the site was 95%.

By the end of 2007, EUR-Lex contained some 2.3 million documents.

The CELEX database was finally closed down on 4 April 2007; all its data and functionalities are available in EUR-Lex.

EUR-Lex is available in all official languages including Irish since the beginning of 2007.

Licence holders received extractions of data in XML as well as in an older format. Most licence holders have adapted their systems to XML, and the other format might be dropped during the first semester of 2008.

A study in order to rationalise and harmonise loading chains was launched at the end of 2007.

The Publications Office set up the appropriate infrastructure to take over the dissemination of the Commission's PreLex database, where the legislative process of the acts is recorded (1 August 2007).

2.2. Improvements

The necessary developments were made in order to ensure that the EUR-Lex site interfaces are also available in Bulgarian, Irish and Romanian.

LexAlert was maintained throughout 2007 and has 855 active internal users, out of 2 150 subscribers. Many of these use the facilities offered by RSS feeds.

Early access to case-law was adapted in order to allow display of all information available, regardless of the language version consulted.

The final version of the study on the usability of EUR-Lex was delivered in May 2007. 30 key issues, ranked according to their importance (critical, serious or minor issues), were identified. As a follow-up to the study, several measures have been taken: improvement of the 'refine search' function; analysis and revision of all error messages; quality control by the proofreaders of the Official Journal of all EUR-Lex screens in all language versions, which should lead to more accuracy and consistency throughout the site and between language versions. Furthermore, the implementation of a 'simpler search' and a study on the functionalities of the search engine used by EUR-Lex (Lucene) have been started.

For institutional re-users, web services were made available with the appropriate technical documentation.

Several trainings on EUR-Lex Expert Search have been held. In order to better train users inside the institutions, a new contract has been signed with a view to developing training material. The first training courses will take place in early 2008.

Information and support to the users were ensured through regular newsletter and thematic files, as well as new FAQs and other editorial texts.

In cooperation with the Commission's Secretariat-General, the quality of information on national implementation measures was improved. The browsing access to case-law and to COM documents has been renewed according to requests made by users. Early access to COM documents was improved: since July 2007 the titles of documents are visible on the first screen of early access. Appropriate actions have been taken in order to set up a full collection of COM documents issued by the Commission since 1958, which should be available online by mid-2008.

SEC documents are regularly entered into the database. The opening of the early access screens for SEC documents is foreseen for the beginning of 2008.

There have been significant developments for N-Lex, a common access point to national legal websites, opened as an experimental site in April 2006. The Council Working Group for Legal Data Processing set up in June 2007 a working group with the mandate to reflect on possible solutions to the challenges related to the project. The working group came to the conclusion that the implementation of 'connectors' hosted by national web-servers, as put in place for the first time in Latvia, would be the best solution to deal with the vulnerability of the system to changes made on national sites. Several Member States have expressed their interest in the new system. Spain has finished developing its connector. Denmark, Italy and Finland are working on its implementation.

The Office carries on studying possibilities to improve the existing architecture, notably by introducing a Web Content Management System.

2.3. Enlargement and evolution of the linguistic policy

All measures were taken in order to ensure the availability of the Special Edition of the OJ in Bulgarian and Romanian and to load editions made available in Irish. Screens were translated into the new languages.

Provisional versions of acts were made available on EUR-Lex immediately after finalisation by the Legal Services of the institutions. The first volume of Bulgarian and Romanian Secondary Legislation, in PDF format, was published online in December 2006. As at 31 December 2007, 11 685 acts in Bulgarian and 12 731 acts in Romanian were available on EUR-Lex. In 2007, 25 OJ issues in Maltese were published.

3. Consolidation of EU legislation

Consolidated texts were produced within one to three months of the publication of a modifier depending on the volume of changes to be integrated.

Daily consolidation of the legislation in force was kept up to date in 19 official languages throughout 2007, and in 22 languages as soon as consolidated versions were available in Bulgarian, Maltese and Romanian.

By year-end 601 families (out of about 1 650) in Bulgarian and Romanian and 1 315 (out of about 2 769) in Maltese were consolidated; it is to be noted that for 1 215 families in Maltese not all texts are available.

4. Directory of Community legislation in force

The Directory is updated each month with hyperlinks giving access to all acts in force, including the consolidated versions over time. The online edition includes a PDF version which can be printed chapter by chapter.

Work on a directory of preparatory acts in pending legislative procedures as well as on a directory of consolidated texts is well advanced and should be concluded during the first quarter of 2008.

TED — Tenders Electronic Daily

5.1. Overview

The daily production continued to increase in 2007. The new workflow system expected for the first semester was not delivered; this situation created difficulties to adapt the current system to a new production contract which came into force in December.

5.2. Production

The increase in published notices was slightly higher than expected, reaching more than 300 000 published documents on TED (14.6% more than in 2006).

Publishing deadlines were met for more than 99% on average of documents received during the first three quarters of the year, but the average for the whole year is 97.6% due to the above-mentioned problems at year-end.

The SIMAP site was updated to make it fully multilingual, to improve its usability and ergonomics and to be in line with the new look for TED.

Quality control by the proofreading teams and an external contractor significantly improved the quality of notices published. A new contract on quality control entered into force in December 2007.

5.3. New data collection techniques

The use of the online forms (eNotices) increased significantly in 2007: 29% more than in 2006. The number of operational eSenders went up to 48. This represents a rise of 26% compared to 2006, which is more than the objective of 10%.

The eSenders now cover almost 17 EU countries plus Switzerland and Norway. By year-end, 12 Member States were sending more than 90% of all their notices via an eSender. Overall, an average of 76% of notices was transmitted in structured electronic format.

A project for a new type of forms was launched, destined to suit the specific needs of the external aid services of the Commission and to provide XML input for notices from DG AIDCO.

5.4. TED and OJ S CD-ROM

TED functionalities were improved following the suggestions of a usability study and suggestions from users. The site was also adapted to implement the new look created by the graphic designers of the Office.

The number of CD-ROM subscribers went down by 21.8% (from 2 128 to 1 665), while the number of licence holders increased from 113 to 117.

II. Publications from A to Z

1. Copyright and rights management

The Publications Office pursued its actions to improve the author services' knowledge and respect of intellectual property especially regarding third-party copyright material. Various standard documents (licences, permissions, copyright notices, disclaimers, etc.) were drafted

Informative and explanatory presentations adressed to author services and to our business partners were prepared and given during general meetings with institutions, agencies and other services.

Invoicing for royalties and flat fees amounted to 44 743 euro in 2007.

In 2007, 807 copyright requests were received (793 requests in 2006).

A total number of 133 licence agreements were concluded in 2007, 26 of which covered translation rights (135 and 21 respectively in 2006). 11 licence agreements were granted for Eurostat data, 25 for the EUR-Lex website and 56 for Eurovoc data.

The number of requests for advice and general inquiries on copyright matters has increased significantly (180 files).

2. Indexation and publishing tools

2.1. Cataloguing and international identifiers

2.1.1. ProCat (professional catalogue of documentary, bibliographical and juridical notices)

A total of 44 070 notices were processed in 2007 (see Annex III, Table 9).

2.2.2. Identifiers

11 419 international identifiers were allocated in 2007 compared to 7 518 in 2006 (i.e. an overall increase of 51.8%). For various identifiers, the breakdown is as follows: 3 030 ISSN, 6 727 ISBN and 1 288 DOI.

2.2. Eurovoc

The multilingual Eurovoc thesaurus is used for the indexation of the Official Journal documents on paper (alphabetical and methodological indexes), on CD-ROM (XML version) and online (in EUR-Lex). It is also used for the indexation of all documents published by the Publications Office via its EU Bookshop service.

Version 4.2 of Eurovoc, which was made available online in July 2005, includes 6 645 descriptors and is available in 21 official languages and in the language of one candidate country (Croatian). Irish and Maltese versions have not yet been developed.

The alphabetical and thematic versions of Eurovoc can be downloaded from the dissemination website in 21 official languages (http://europa.eu/eurovoc/).

During 2007, a Eurovoc update was carried out for the new 4.3 release. New concepts were sent to the Commission's Translation Directorate-General by year-end.

55 licences (of which 1 is a commercial licence) were granted in 2007 (compared to 41 in 2006 and 44 in 2005). Normal licences are free of charge.

An Interoperability Feasibility Study between Eurovoc and other thesauri, such as ECLAS (the EC library thesaurus), GEMET (the Environment Agency thesaurus), the Unesco thesaurus and EET (the Cedefop thesaurus), has been carried out. The objective of this study was to propose a theoretical and methodological approach to realise the interoperability between Eurovoc and the other mentioned thesauri. A sample of data from each vocabulary has been selected in order to apply the methodology and set up a testing environment for assessment

Another study of commercial Thesaurus Management Software (TMS) led to the identification of four TMS that fulfilled the Eurovoc features and were fully tested.

On the basis of the recommendations, technical specifications have been prepared in order to launch an open call for tender for a new thesaurus management software and public website for Eurovoc.

2.3. Style Guide

In 2007 the key objective for the Interinstitutional Style Guide was to open the sites of all languages that became official after the 2004 enlargement. On 31 December 2007, the sites in all new language versions, i.e. Czech, Estonian, Latvian, Lithuanian, Hungarian, Maltese, Polish, Slovak and Slovene, were available.

Furthermore, the much-requested publication of the updated paper edition of the English Style Guide in July 2007 was achieved successfully.

Much work was invested in cooperation with the institutions to update the guidelines for the part dedicated to the OJ.

Last but not least, the number of visits to the Style Guide website kept increasing, and it has become the most visited of all websites of the Publications Office.

3. Editorial services

Following a call for tenders, new contracts for proofreading services with three companies were established in August. That allowed a considerable reinforcement of the proofreading capacities of the Office in the second half of the year.

In total 557 882 pages, all languages included (see Annex III, Table 7), were processed by the proofreading service during the year. This important increase in processed pages was due to the fact that in 2007 the Office started to catch up on the language versions of 2004 and 2005 of the Court of Justice's jurisprudence volumes. 497 volumes were passed for press after correction during the course of the year.

4. Graphic design

Throughout 2007 the graphic design section contributed to the production of Office's own publications, leaflets, etc., such as the Annual Reports, the Newsletter, VoxOffice, stand design for various fairs and events plus the Office's calendar and diary.

The graphic design team treated 278 files in 2007.

The section was also responsible for the design of *The European Commission 1958-1972* (Secretariat-General), *Euratom*, 50 years of nuclear energy serving Europe (Energy and Transport DG), a new graphic layout for Eurostat titles, the *Fact Sheets on the European Union* for the Parliament and the *Cash Controls* brochure for the Taxation and Customs Union DG.

5. Cross-media publishing

5.1. Overview

The call for tenders for publishing services foreseen to represent a sizeable portion of hard-copy production in the coming years was launched.

Development of the Plan-Publi system for management and follow-up of the production process continued apace. By year-end, access in consultation mode had been activated for some 20 author services.

The 'editors' function was expanded in 2007 by two internal transfers: one to increase existing capacity for hard-copy titles and another to ensure the editorial function for multimedia files.

In 2007, taking multimedia and print activities as a whole, 3 284 invoices for a total value of 18 646 369.57 euro were received from service providers, of which 823 were paid directly by the Office under the codelegation procedure and 100 under the agency procedure. This compares to 2 951 invoices handled in 2006 for a total of 15 830 830 euro. Of the 3 284 invoices processed in 2007, 2 975 for a total value of 15 090 591 euro were for paper publications and 309 for a total of 4 069 051 euro, were for multimedia products.

5.2. Production

There was a decrease in the number of titles published: 6 107 compared to 6 896 in 2006. However, the number of pages treated totalled 528 986 compared to 449 019 in 2006 (see Annex III, Table 5). Production deadlines have been respected throughout 2007 to the extent to which the Office is in control of the specific stages of the production process.

The number of cost estimates requested by author services remained fairly stable: 3 207 in 2007 compared to 3 240 in 2006. There was a sizeable increase (27.6%) in the number of order forms drawn up: 1 696 in 2007 compared to 1 329 in 2006. The value of the order forms issued in 2007 also showed a notable increase (50.7%) over the previous year: 24 275 546 euro compared to 16 108 415 euro.

The flagship titles published in 2007 were:

- the 2006 General Report on the activities of the European Union published in 22 linguistic versions;
- the Annual Report of the Court of Justice published in 20 languages;
- Reports of Cases before the Court of Justice and the Court of First Instance;
- The European Commission, 1958-72 History and reminiscences published in German, English, French and Italian on behalf of the Secretariat-General of the Commission to mark the 50th anniversary of the signing of the Treaty of Rome in March 2007. The Dutch edition is foreseen to be published in early 2008;
- The second edition of the *European Forum of Legal Gazettes*: *Guide to the publication of legislation in Europe* was published in English in September 2007.

The Office continued to support author services in their migration process towards the Commission's common web content management tool Documentum.

Office representatives also participated in the Europa Forum of webmasters and contributed, amongst others, to the design and adoption of the new corporate banner.

In 2007 the Office produced two own-imprint publications. These were:

- 25 Years of European Law Online the Event;
- *Directory of legal gazettes, 2007.*

The production of the Official Journal of the Office for Harmonisation in the Internal Market (Spain, Alicante) and of the Official Bulletin of the Community Plant Variety Office (France, Angers) was coordinated by the Office. Paper editions of the former title ceased production during the first half of 2007. For the latter Bulletin, 6 issues and 2 supplements were produced to a total of 1 094 pages.

6. Fulfilment and storage

6.1. Physical distribution

The figures below show a general decrease for paper distribution, the trend being particularly noticeable for general publications. The OJ paper edition distribution decreased by 15% as in previous years, while the OJ CD-ROM distribution fell by 7.4%. For individual orders, a decrease of 15% has been observed.

6.2.1. Orders from staff of the EU institutions and other official bodies

The number of order lines dealt with by the 'European Union staff orders' service amounted to 5 256 in 2007, which corresponds to 21.63 orders per working day. That represents an increase of 5% with respect to 2006 data.

A further 2 521 replies (approximately 10.38 per working day) were given to requests for publications (i.e. an increase of around 22%).

6.2.2. Free-of-charge distribution of the Official Journal

The table below gives the figures concerning the distribution of the physical edition of the Official Journal inside the institutions: OJ L&C on paper (daily), OJ L&C on CD-ROM (monthly), OJ S on CD-ROM (2 editions per week).

6.3. Storage

Although the trend in distribution shows a decrease over the recent years, the number of copies produced and received in 2007 decreased by only 14.7%, thus leading to an overall stock increase of 8.8%. The efforts made in 2007 to limit the print-runs, by aiming for an initial distribution of 80% of the print-run, and encouraging authors to reduce their stocks, did not produce the hopeful results. More drastic measures are required.

6.4. Mailing list management

The evolution of the activities of the mailing list management section shows a reduction in the creation of subscriptions, manually and automatically (see Annex III, Table 10). This can be explained, on the one hand, by the discontinuation of certain publications and, on the other hand, by the decision of several DGs to use electronic media (internet, mass e-mails) for the dissemination of their information and publications.

The success of the new electronic survey service installed in 2006 was confirmed in 2007. This service has been developed for online registering of subscriptions and online registering of the quantities of publications and brochures requested by information relays.

The number of electronic surveys requested increases constantly and confirms the need for developing new electronic methods of dissemination.

7. Digital printshop

In 2007, the number of pages produced by the digital printshop was 9.8 million (10.8 million in 2006), 72% of which were in black and white and 28% in colour.

To rationalise the operational workflow concerning printing and shipment, the digital printshop was attached to the fulfilment section and transferred to the Distribution Centre in Gasperich on 1 November 2007.

The Publications Office is seeking to enhance its print-on-demand service in line with the needs resulting from increased usage of the EU Bookshop ordering service, and with the aim of reducing print-runs and surplus stock.

The colour digital printing equipment was renewed in November 2007.

8. Promotion and information

8.1. Information for the public and customer assistance

Information on official publications for the public and customers, and assistance to the users of electronic products distributed by the Publications Office are provided by an external online helpdesk.

The helpdesk is promoted on the Office's internet site and on other online services offered by the Publications Office. 2007 showed a further increase (+30.82%) in the number of requests (65 912, compared to 50 384 in 2006).

In 2007, the number of requests for assistance with TED and SIMAP remained high due to technical problems and questions related to the standard forms for the publication of procurement notices in the *Supplement to the Official Journal*. The assistance for EU Bookshop increased while the assistance for EUR-Lex and the OJ L&C CD-ROM decreased slightly. Overall, the requests for information covered the following main themes:

A list of the 10 topics most frequently raised in 2007 can be found in Annex III (Table 20).

The Info Point Europe managed by the Publications Office is located in the entrance hall of its premises. The number of requests, covering visitors, telephone calls and e-mails remained at about the same level, i.e. 2 500 in 2007 and 2 600 in 2006.

The Info Point being also a distribution point, 38 500 copies of free publications and 9 700 copies of Competition OJs were handed out in 2007. In 2006, these numbers were 41 400 and 10 700 respectively.

8.2. The Publications Office on the internet

The Publications Office's website (publications.europa.eu) provides general information about the Publications Office, its services and events. The vast majority of the contents, the static pages, is available in the 23 official languages, whereas selected information such as news and press releases usually exists only in English, French and German.

A new website was launched in early 2007 and the development of new features continued over the year including *inter alia* the online registration for the Publishers' Forum. Further development is still ongoing: for example, the Office's own tenders will be displayed on the site and subscriptions for the Newsletter and sales catalogue will be possible online.

8.3. Promotional activities

In 2007 the number of promotional activities organised by the Office continued to increase and diversify. In addition to its participation at the two main traditional exhibitions,

Frankfurt Book Fair (10-14 October) and London Online Information (4-6 December), the Office was also present at the Book Fair in Prague (3-6 May) and the Brussels Book Fair, in cooperation with the Council of the EU (28 February-4 March).

Overall promotion of the Office's publications and online services carried on in 2007, with particular emphasis on the promotion of TED (5 awareness-raising events with information multipliers). Information stands were also organised at various other events such as student fairs in Belgium, Bulgaria, Germany and Romania. Furthermore, the Publications Office was present at the 50th anniversary of Treaty of Rome Forum in Luxembourg, general public European Festivals, Institutions Open Doors Days, and the European Day of Languages on 26 September.

Promotion of CORDIS included 42 events and 10 new promotional handouts. In 2007, a new monthly Newsletter was issued, and promotion of RSS feeds amongst ministries, universities and research centres was launched.

A particular effort was invested in promoting the 'Together since 1957' theme throughout the year. In addition to the use of the 'Together' logo, the Publications Office developed a 'Celebrating Europe! 50th anniversary of the Treaty of Rome' visual to be showcased in various ways.

In 2007 development and production of promotional print products such as fact sheets, leaflets and posters were high on the agenda. Sixteen promotional tools were produced combining flyers and posters in a multitude of languages and online services. In total 720 000 copies and the annual catalogue *Key publications of the European Union 2007* with a print-run of 70 900 copies in English, German and French were disseminated through the commercial distributors network, mailings and fairs.

Furthermore, the commercial distributors network was kept up-to-date on new publications with a monthly promotional Bulletin (12 issues). This electronic tool in English, French and German lists the latest EU publications on sale — current and forthcoming books — and related promotional material (leaflets, fact sheets, posters, etc.). All 2007 issues are available on the website of the Publications Office.

To further improve the timeliness of the information, a 'pre-information fact sheet' was developed. Sent by e-mail and containing details about the product, it enables commercial partners to plan their promotional activities, approximately eight weeks before the publication is put on the market.

The *newsletter*, press service and presentations to visitor groups and in various meetings and events continued as before.

A call for tender for promotion and marketing activities was published in 2007. A contract is anticipated to be in place in early 2008.

A call for tender for the organisation and management of the participation of European Union departments at events (fairs, exhibitions, conferences) was published in August 2007. The framework contract was signed in December 2007.

Sales

9.1. Sales results

In 2007, 263 new titles were put on sale by the Publications Office (including single issues of the Official Journal and other periodicals). In total 5 361 priced titles could be ordered through EU Bookshop.

The Publications Office issued in 2007 2 025 invoices (which also includes 67 credit notes) for a total amount of 4 449 815 euro, i.e. a decrease of circa 16% in the number of invoices and a decrease of 14% in commercial invoicing compared to 2006. It is, however, worthwhile noting an increase of around 37% in the sales of monographs (books) in comparison with the 2006 data. This 37% improvement in the 2007 figures should mark the start of a bounceback in sales and thus facilitate the information strategy of various author services by fully exploiting all dissemination channels, including commercial ones such as bookshops, both physical and via the internet.

The general downward trend in sales is mainly due to the decrease in sales of subscriptions to the Official Journal (–21% compared to 2006) following the decision to make the electronic version freely available and to the drop of subscriptions to periodicals other than the Official Journal (decrease of 22%) with respect to 2006. Sales of subscriptions still represent the bulk (94%) of publication sales. A detailed overview of 2007 sales results is given in Annex III, Tables 17 and 18.

9.1.1. Periodicals

Globally, the total number of subscriptions (all types of subscriptions included) sold decreased by 21% between 2007 and 2006.

The steady decrease in the number of paying subscribers to the different editions of the Official Journal (L&C paper, L&C CD-ROM, S CD-ROM) continued in 2007.

The availability of the Official Journal free-of-charge on the web continued to show its impact as many clients cancelled their subscription.

Details of the subscriptions, by language, for the L&C series of the Official Journal (paper and CD-ROM editions) and for the OJ S CD-ROM can be found in Annex III (Tables 11 and 12).

In 2007, the number of different types of priced subscriptions to periodicals other than the Official Journal was 11 compared to 14 in 2006. This reduction is the result of a decision by author services to discontinue some types of subscriptions.

Detailed figures for subscriptions to periodicals other than the Official Journal are presented in Annex III (Table 13).

No periodical other than the Official Journal had more than 1 500 paying subscribers. In fact, only two periodicals had a number of subscribers exceeding 1 000, and for most of the remaining titles, subscription numbers were much lower.

Publications on CD-ROM

The following table lists the sales of CD-ROMs for 2007, by quantities sold. None of these priced CD-ROMs achieved the figure of 50 copies (all linguistic versions together).

The general downward trend in sales of individual CD-ROMs observed over the last few years continued in 2007. There is an apparent limited interest by the market for priced CD-ROMs, which provide quite often quantitative data. This situation demonstrates the success of the dissemination policy implemented by the European institutions which promotes access to direct, updated and free information via the internet sites of the institutions, agencies and other bodies of the European Union.

9.2. Licensing

TED and EUR-Lex online licences enable the exploitation and commercial re-dissemination by professionals of the information contained in these databases. In December 2007, the number of TED licence holders was 117. This represents an increase of 3.5% with respect to the 113 licences managed in 2006.

At the end of 2007, the number of EUR-Lex licences was 25, compared to 23 in 2006. The total amount invoiced in 2007 for EUR-Lex and TED was 633 767 euro. Prices for 2007 licences were kept the same as in 2006. Licences are invoiced once a year and, in case of renewal, the invoice is issued two months before the current licence expires. A detailed review is given in Annex III, Table 15.

9.3. Assessment and prospects

The year 2007 was mainly used for the consolidation and enhancement of the contractual framework and rules between the Publications Office and the members of its commercial distribution network. Furthermore, to expand and update the network of commercial distributors worldwide (in particular to interested organisations outside Europe) a call for expressions of interest was published in the *Supplement to the Official Journal of the*

European Union of 10 October 2007 (Information notice No 2007/S 195-236481). In order to increase the awareness and interest of professional distributors, an information seminar was organised on 12 October 2007 at the Frankfurt Book Fair.

The current network of commercial distributors was carefully monitored to facilitate the offer of competitive conditions by the Office.

The views and opinions of these professional distributors were also solicited through selected face-to-face meetings and a general questionnaire. The results of this initiative were presented and discussed at the meeting with Directors of the Office's commercial distributors held in Luxembourg on 23 November 2007. The main issues raised were as follows:

- The distributors highlighted that for subscriptions, the drop is attributed to the fact that the majority of products are now given away for free via the Internet. However, there is still a continuing market demand for the paper version of EU subscriptions, in particular to the various products relating to the Official Journal.
- With respect to monographs, it was noted there is a real market need for official publications issued by authoritative sources addressing broad European Union issues with analyses for a wide public.
- Regarding languages, most of the replies also point out that the trend to publish in the English language creates a language barrier for the commercial dissemination of publications. Availability of other linguistic versions would facilitate broader distribution, in particular of flagship publications.

These comments will be instrumental in helping the various author services review their information and communication strategies.

The sale of EU publications was handled in conformity with the rules and procedures governing this activity. During 2007 enhanced emphasis was given to addressing outstanding invoices, as well as management of a 'single customer file'. The performance of the current network of commercial distributors (which include 44 European bodies and 7 from outside Europe) was periodically assessed.

10. EU Bookshop

10.1. Content

In 2007, 1 970 titles were added to the EU Bookshop database (now updated daily instead of weekly as was the practice since its opening). Among these 1 100 were new titles and the remainder older titles uploaded in line with specific projects. These projects feed the main Digital Library Project of the Publications Office which was launched in September 2007. Its final aim is to offer a complete online archive of all official European Union publications. The scope of the project is very wide as it concerns the digitisation of some 130 000 publications, corresponding to 14 million pages, from the Publications Office's physical archives. Alongside this will be the extension of the EU Bookshop content to cover an estimated 49 000 publications currently physically available in the Office's archives but not referenced with bibliographical notices on EU Bookshop.

Overall, EU Bookshop contained 25 817 titles published since 1952 by the end of 2007; of these, 7 958 concerned research titles. This represents an increase of 8.3% for the overall figure and of 11.1% for the research titles compared to 2006. 502 826 PDFs were downloaded (+44% compared to 2006).

The 'bulk order' catalogue which was created in 2006 for privileged users such as the information relays managed by DG Communication (Europe Direct network members), contained at the end of 2007 more than 100 titles. Whereas in the beginning, this specific catalogue only contained titles of DG Communication, an increasing number of author services have realised the advantages of the bulk orders (large quantities of free publications for local dissemination in the Member States) and have asked for their publications to be included.

With an average availability of the website of 99.36%, an almost permanent access to EU Bookshop was offered throughout the year.

10.2. Awareness

Having reached more than 1 million visits within a year, the EU Bookshop website seems to become increasingly known. Compared to 2006, the total number of visits increased significantly to 1 114 096 (+70.9%).

In addition to general promotion at the Budapest and Frankfurt book fairs and other events, the Publications Office has started to promote the website in a more targeted way, especially towards university students, teachers and librarians — target groups towards which promotion will be strengthened even more in 2008 — as well as the Europe Direct networks, who, having ordered 85% of the free copies, contribute significantly to EU Bookshop's success. The number of free copies ordered by the privileged users went from 46 066 to 467 236 (+914%) whereas the copies ordered by private users decreased from 84 146 to 77 118 (-8.4%).

A turning point in the promotion of the website has been to emphasise that people can actually get free publications, i.e. free access to the electronic version (PDF) if no free physical copy is available.

10.3. Scanning workshop

The 'PDF on request' feature offered by EU Bookshop since mid-2006 registered an outstanding success. In 2007, the number of PDFs of old publications requested by the users through the website has increased enormously (+140 % compared to 2006), with an average of around 70 requests per month compared to a monthly average of some 30 in 2006.

In view of the level of requests, the interest for old EUR reports and the upcoming Digital Library Project, contracts were also signed with an external service provider to complement the in-house capabilities and as a test-case for the treatment of huge volumes.

Scanning resulted in the availability and consecutive uploading in EU Bookshop of more than 1 100 PDFs of old publications.

In order to cope with the increasing demand, the purchase of a professional book scanner was launched in 2007 with delivery of the equipment in January 2008.

III. CORDIS — the Community Research & Development Information Service

The CORDIS team, its operation and financial management are fully integrated within the Publications Office. CORDIS promotional activities are regrouped together with other promotional activities conducted by the Publications Office.

The CORDIS service was highly visited: an average 6.2 million pages per month were viewed (an increase of 15.7% versus 2006) without any significant impact on availability or performance, while the number of CORDIS users remained stable.

With the aim of improving the governance, synergy and complementarity of activities conducted by the Publications Office and Research DGs, a Service Level Agreement (SLA) was signed on 27 September 2007. This SLA covers communication, publications, promotional and information activities; in particular the Office wishes to see joint editorial committees in cooperation with DG Research and the other DGs concerned with research. The first CORDIS Service Management Board was held on 21 November 2007.

Consideration has been given to hosting CORDIS at the Commission's Informatics DG (DIGIT) or a similar generic Internet Service Provider. Initial contacts were established with DIGIT, and such a migration is estimated to last at least 18 months. An SLA will be prepared and signed for this purpose.

The decision was taken to move the CORDIS helpdesk level 1 (first contact between the users and the helpdesk) to the central helpdesk offered by the Publications Office for all the other online services. Preparatory work was conducted in 2007, so that this migration could be operational in February 2008.

The Administrative Arrangement with the Joint Research Centre/Institute for Prospective Technological Studies was renewed for conducting the development and hosting of the ERAWATCH project as part of CORDIS.

All CORDIS contracts have been extended for 24 months maximum to ensure continuity of service and allow better market consultation during the tendering procedure. An exante study will be conducted in early 2008 to recommend sourcing (insourcing versus outsourcing) scenarios; the recommendations will be validated with representatives from the CORDIS Service Management Board.

Throughout the year, the CORDIS service was regularly updated so as to improve usability, visibility and presentation of information, in particular on the FP7 programme where all the core pages are now available in six languages. All FP7 calls for proposals were published on time in CORDIS, in particular the second large wave of calls in November 2007. A study has been launched to improve CORDIS search, to make recommendations for the integration with the Europa website search facility and to increase visibility in Internet search engines. The results are expected in 2008.

The presidency services for Germany and Portugal were launched, and that for Slovenia prepared. Furthermore, several national and regional services have been revamped and better integrated with Europa and ERAWATCH.

Several new services were opened in CORDIS, such as FP7 thematic pages. A study aimed at revising the CORDIS homepage and navigation of the whole site is now in its

final phase. This will provide a more user-friendly experience in 2008. In addition, the foundations were put in place for revamping the pages for European Researchers Abroad (ERA-link).

A content management system based upon open source software has been introduced to facilitate the updating and the management of content by information providers. The usage of this tool will be promoted in 2008. The decision to use the Project Information Dissemination Service (PIDS), a tool developed by CORDIS to collect information and results on projects directly from project officers and project coordinators, was finally taken in 2007. PIDS will now be used for FP6 projects. Such a decision was vital to ensure that results from projects could be made available to the research community and the citizens via CORDIS and as printed material (see *research*eu* — *results supplement*).

The CORDIS focus Newsletter was produced on a monthly basis in six language versions (Spanish, German, English, French, Italian and Polish) and disseminated to more than 33 000 subscribers. Its print-run attains 49 050 copies. Preparatory work was launched in 2007 to arrange for the integration of CORDIS focus in the research*eu magazine to offer readers a comprehensive view on R&D activities. Changes in editorial responsibilities have been agreed with DG Research to be in place as of January 2008. News published in CORDIS will be authored by DG Research. The CORDIS focus Newsletter ceased at the end of 2007. CORDIS focus thematic supplements and CORDIS focus RTD results supplement will be published respectively under the titles research*eu — focus and research*eu — results supplement.

CORDIS was presented at 42 events in 18 countries, in particular those linked to the launching of the FP7 framework programme, large initiatives such as the International Thermonuclear Experimental Reactor project (ITER) or those organised in partnership with Member States and associated countries (see also under Promotional activities).

A user satisfaction survey was conducted in the second half of 2007 targeting stakeholders, information providers and CORDIS registered users. Encouragingly, the results show a high level of satisfaction, with News and FP7 pages being the best rated services. Users have quoted that CORDIS has significantly improved in usability and clarity. Full reports will be available early in 2008.



Human resources

Personnel

1.1. **Officials**

The total number of statutory posts increased to 655 (from 635 in 2006) to absorb the new tasks resulting from the enlargement to Bulgaria and Romania on 1 January 2007 and the increased number of official languages to process (see Annex III, Table 30 and Graph 1). In addition six posts were used as compensation for part-time work.

In 2007, 29 successful candidates were nominated probationary officials (compared to 50 in 2006 and 112 in 2005). Most of them were recruited to fill some of the 20 new posts that the Budgetary Authority had approved for 2007 further to the 2007 enlargement. 8 Bulgarian and 9 Romanian officials were appointed to permanent posts.

10 officials joined the Office by transfer. During the year, 20 officials left the Office to continue their career in other services of the European institutions and 15 left to retire or for other personal reasons.

Although 2007 did not entail the same recruitment activity as previous years, many posts remained difficult to fill due to various constraints. Lack of appropriate reserve lists and the need for balanced geographical and gender representation among officials left a considerable number of posts vacant for too long a period. Furthermore, the high cost of living in Luxembourg and surroundings was given as a reason by many laureates to turn down offers of employment or interviews for vacant posts.

The new Director-General and three new heads of unit took up duty during 2007, of which two are women.

Within the Office, 2 officials successfully passed competitions for appointment to a higher category (from AST to AD). 9 former C* category officials, authorised by a new procedure to apply for vacant posts in the assistant function, were appointed in this category. 6 officials (compared to 4 during 2006) participated in a training programme preparing for functions in the administrator function group.

Given that an important part of the Office's permanent staff has been recruited during the last few years, there was reason to believe that some of them had not yet found a post perfectly matching their background, their experience or their interests. A structure dealing with requests for mobility was thus set up at the beginning of 2007. As a consequence, 44 officials (compared to 15 the year before) were able to move to a new post within the Office during 2007 (promotions not included).

1.2. Temporary agents

Five temporary agent contracts were granted in 2007 for jobs for which no reserve list existed or for which competitions were in progress.

1.3. Contract staff

During 2007, 17 persons were engaged as contract staff. On 31 December 2007, a total of 25 contractual agents were working at the Office. However, this type of contract has not proven to be a solution to reinforce teams quickly due to the time-consuming recruitment process.

As permanent staff for proofreading in the Bulgarian and Romanian languages was becoming only gradually available, 23 persons from these Member States were engaged as contract staff for part of the year, mainly working on preparation of the secondary legislation in those languages.

1.4. Gender balance

On 31 December 2007, 52% of all officials in the Office were women. Women occupied 50% of senior management posts, whereas 31% among AD category officials were women (compared to 28% in 2006); in the AST category, 56% were women (see table below). Pre-selection committees for vacant posts are composed of both women and men.

1.6. Selection of personnel

In 2007, in cooperation with EPSO, the Publications Office organised competitions for proofreaders in three languages: Irish, Maltese, and French. There were no successful candidates for the competition in Irish. The reserve list of the competition in Maltese will be published in the Official Journal at the beginning of 2008. The oral tests of the competition in French are foreseen to take place in April 2008.

2. Training

2.1. Strategic training plan

The training plan was ready at the beginning of the year. The priorities defined were the development of skills in electronic publication, in marketing and editorial techniques, and adequate training to accompany the grouping together of certain activities.

In total, the training section organised 206 courses.

2.2. Participation in training actions

In 2007, the Office staff took part in 5 921 training days. The year-average per staff member is 9.75 days distributed as follows:

■ General domain 3.54 days

■ Linguistic domain 5.33 days

■ IT domain 0.88 days

These figures do not include on-the-spot training. In other terms, the Office exceeded the Commission targets.

The Office organised locally 39% of the training in the general domain and around 53% of the training in the IT domain.

The Office committed a total of 289 098 euro for training.

The main training courses organised locally were:

- PLAN-JO application for testers and end-users (174 participants)
- EU Bookshop (82 participants)
- Team building (105 participants) for EUR-Lex, IT Projects and Cross-media Publishing Units
- Electronic publishing of the Official Journal (23 participants)
- GescomX and SagapX (23 participants)
- Telephone training (28 participants)
- Multimedia production training (62 participants)

II. Budget

1. Budgetary accounts

1.1. Overall budgetary implementation 2007

In 2007, the overall budget managed (totals committed on all types of appropriations, except where otherwise stated) by the Publications Office amounted to a total of 172.88 million euro (2006: 183.38 million euro), of which 131.79 million euro (2006: 154.16 million euro) came from the budget items formally delegated to the Office, 7.00 million euro came from budget items subdelegated to the Office (in 2007 for the first time) and 34.09 million euro (2006: 29.21 million euro) from appropriations from the institutions' budgets. The difference is mainly due to lower commitments on the CORDIS, Consolidation, OJ L&C and OJ S budget items.

Totals may show divergences due to round-offs.

2. Commercial accounts

2.1. Operating results

Tables 28 and 29 in Annex III list the detail of the commercial activity to 31 December 2007 and of the operating accounts for the financial year 2007.

It should be noted that the amount included to provide for doubtful debts stands at 490 868.95 on 31 December 2007. The Commission and the institutions have been informed accordingly and they will include the respective amounts in their Financial Statements.

2.2. Sales revenue

In 2007, net sales revenue amounted to 4 449 816 euro, compared to 5 179 660 euro in 2006. Net sales invoiced stood at 4 536 239 euro in 2007, compared to 6 506 865 euro in 2006. The breakdown by institution is given in Annex III, Table 17. For details on invoiced sales by type of product, see Annex III, Table 18.

IV. Infrastructure

Facilities management and supporting resources

1.1. Buildings

A proposal for the acquisition of the Mercier building was discussed with Commission's DG Budget.

The call for tenders published at the end of 2007 for conversion into offices of the space formerly occupied the Office's print-shop was closed without awarding a contract, failing eligible offers. New offers are expected early in 2008.

The move of the in-house production system for print on demand (POD) from the Mercier building to the Gasperich site was successfully completed.

1.2. Safety and health

Two evacuation exercises took place in 2007 for each building. A call for expressions of interest was addressed to the staff to complete the ranks of the fire-pickets (EPI).

A new cleaning services contract for the buildings of the Office was signed in the autumn.

1.3. Supporting resources

The number of installed workstations remained stable (945 at the end of 2007 compared to 950 at the end of 2006). In the same period, the number of calls related to IT or General Services received by the helpdesk decreased compared to previous years (2007: 11 027, 2006: 13 314, 2005: 14 132).

With a view to the preparation of the works on the ground floor and in order to regroup certain teams after the 2006 reorganisation, 140 internal moves were made.

2. Document management

2.1. Archives and Centre d'administration des documents (CAD)

Following the adoption by the Commission of the Common Conservation List ('Liste commune de conservation'), steps to apply these instructions in the Office have been taken.

3. Information technology

Throughout 2007 the IT and telecoms facilities were operated with a global availability of over 99.96% for the network and 99% for the applications in production.

The call for tender procedure for the new IT framework contract covering the main activities of the data centre, the telecommunications network and IT security was completed; four new contracts were awarded and started. For two lots no acceptable offer was received; a new procedure was prepared and published.

The strategy for storage was revised, and the first parts of the required systems ordered.

The final phase of the migration towards the new Top Level Domain (TLD) .eu was successfully completed.

The Plan-JO application has been put into production, which required the configuring of four new servers and the putting into service of servers for the OJ-Format application (parsing of Word documents before injection into Plan-JO).

A terminal server for supporting remote access for teleworking has been configured and put into production.

A detailed analysis for the possible take-over of CORDIS hosting was launched.

4. IT security

The new contract covering this domain started in September.

No serious security incidents required reporting to the Security Directorate in 2007.

Tokens providing teleworkers remote access to their work space were attributed. Security conventions for contractors were processed throughout the year.

V. IT projects

1. Project management

The IT Projects Unit focused its overall attention in 2007 on managerial and organisational aspects of IT project management resulting in a considerable reduction of the number of IT projects and in improved procedures. Several major IT development projects were successfully implemented. The most important ones are mentioned below.

EU Bookshop: the internet service was improved with additional functionalities; work on an improved user interface and migration to an Oracle database was launched.

EUDOR, the EUropean DOcument Repository for all publications, was upgraded in order to meet the need for additional capacity.

A major project to manage the workflow for producing the Official Journal — Plan-JO—went into production successfully in 2007.

The delivered software for the Plan-JOS project did not meet the requirements; therefore an alternative solution had to be provisionally developed to ensure continuity of operations.

The 'Starter kit' for websites using Documentum was improved significantly during 2007, in cooperation with the Commission's DGs COMM and DIGIT, to respond to users' needs.

Wiki, one of the tools in the Flexible Platform for Internet Services (FPIS), has been successfully tested and made ready to be used as an internal collaborative and communication tool.

EU WhoisWho, the online edition of the official directory of the European Union, is now updated daily since the end of 2007.

The SIMAP portal which provides access to important information on public procurement in the European Union, has been improved with a better 'look & feel'.

VI. Internal control environment

1. Risk management and business continuity

The principal activity of the Office is the production and distribution of publications. For this, the Office uses human resources, infrastructure (mainly IT) and outsourcing. Therefore the main risks and risk-management activities (including internal control) of the Office are also concentrated on these areas.

There are no residual risks with both high impact and high likelihood.

The risk register of the Office was reviewed through interviews. The risks of most critical procedures were reviewed with the process owners.

Main areas which require special attention, particularly due to the interinstitutional nature of the Office's work, are satisfaction of author services, production procedures, and in the financial area management of contracts, monitoring progress of commitments and payments, invoicing and collection of receivables.

The risk assessment and the follow-up of risks identified in previous years confirm that risks within the Office are adequately managed. The annual risk analysis exercises are progressively becoming more in-depth.

A risk analysis and the Business Continuity Plan for the Office were established. Work on updating existing contingency plans continued. In this context and following the full implementation of a back-up site for the Data Centre (Data Recovery Plan — DRP) in November 2006, disaster-proofing of further applications was implemented.

2. Internal audit capability

The internal audit capability operates in accordance with the Institute of Internal Auditors' attribute and performance standards and code of ethics, and EU regulations and standards.

Four audit tasks were carried out in 2007:

- Testing the effectiveness and adequacy of the internal control in the area of general services, building management and IT infrastructure.
- Audit of the management of contracts in the following outsourced activities of the Office: Series S of the Official Journal and Multimedia production.
- Audit of the follow-up of audit recommendations.
- Audit of the implementation of ICS 19, continuity of operations.

The internal audit capability advises on and monitors the follow-up of all audit recommendations and ensures coordination with external auditors. The internal audit capability provided its opinion according to the regulations. This opinion was taken into account when assessing main risks.

3. Financial circuits and control

The financial resources managed by the Office fall into three types.

- Administrative expenditure (salaries, rent, etc.) managed through the Office's own administrative budget, which is annexed to that of the Commission.
- Operational expenditure: work contracted out. This includes financing from within the Office's own budget and other budget lines delegated to the Director of the Office by the Commission. This includes CORDIS, which is part of the 7th framework programme on research and technological development coordinated by the Commission.
- Other financial responsibilities which fall into three categories:
 - orders and payments related to the Official Journal L&C on behalf of all
 institutions. Payments are regularised between the Commission and the other
 institutions using the official liaison accounts;
 - validating as 'certified correct' invoices for publications financed by other institutions, agencies or Commission services and ordered through the Office;
 - sales of publications, from issuing invoices to transferring the payments received to the institutions and services concerned.

Within the Office, decentralised financial circuits have been in place since 2002. In 2006, budget cells were regrouped under the three directorates and additional resources were allocated to the Central Management Services Unit.

The internal control coordinator is responsible for co-ordinating internal control activities, managing financial control and evaluation, assessing ICS implementation and risk management and data protection.

Compliance with internal control baseline requirements was assessed based on information available from audit reports, results of financial controls and the interviews and a desk review conducted by the internal control coordinator.

Payments were subject to ex-post controls on a sampling basis (of the amount of invoices).

5 ex-post exercises were conducted:

- 4 on payments covering the period from 23 September 2006 to 31 October 2007 (732 files examined/5 042 transactions (14.52%) representing 22 665 147.67 euro/ 123 069 485.70 euro (18.42%).
- 1 ex-post on commitments introduced by units exempted from ex-ante control between 1 June 2007 and 30 November 2007, covering 69 files on 199 transactions (34.67%) corresponding to 57.7% of the global amount concerned.

On request of the authorising officer by delegation, commitments, recovery orders, commercial invoices, licences and decommitments are subject to a second level of verification.

Based on error rates, second level ex-ante control needs are regularly reviewed.

Daily ex-ante controls based on MUS-DICE sampling process and statistic follow-up for commitments and recovery orders were conducted: 38% (1 022 files examined from 2 693 transactions) integrating the exemption for 5 units since end of May 2007.

Financial Control has also carried out ex-ante checks on 8 de-recognition files (317 items being removed from the inventory).

All transactions with critical errors were examined in detail and recommendations were formulated.

On the basis of the findings of ex-post controls on author accounts other than the Commission, updated rules were prepared to be implemented by the relevant services and followed up jointly by the Financial Control section and the Directorates concerned.

The improving trend of financial control results shows that these are fulfilling their role in continuously improving operational and first level financial controls.

4. Evaluation

The evaluation of the framework contract related to the provision of publishing services for the Official Journal was carried out in 2007. The objective was to rationalise the structure of the contract, simplify the price list and optimise the risk management clauses. Recommendations from this evaluation proposed changes to the framework contract concerned to ensure that the future contractual arrangements facilitate the efficient and effective delivery of the Official Journal of the European Union.

The evaluation project aimed at analysing risk and streamlining the documentation of the selected critical procedures was completed.

The evaluation of the Key Performance Indicators (KPI) reported to the Management Committee was launched (to be completed in 2008) in order to further align the content and structure of the KPI with the objectives and activities of the Office, to ensure coherence between the KPI and other reports prepared at the Office and to streamline the process of preparing and presenting the KPI.

VII. Internal environmental management

1. Energy

In 2003, the Mercier building's heating system switched from boilers using fossil fuel to a central cogeneration system. This resulted in a reduction of 40% of the carbon dioxide emissions related to the heating of the building (figure provided by the City of Luxembourg).

The Gasperich and Fischer buildings are equipped with gas boilers.

The Publications Office's fleet of official cars generates 15.76 tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions per year.

Further information on electricity and water consumption can be found in Annex III, Table 31.

2. Waste management

In March 2006, the Publications Office signed a convention with the organisation SuperDrecksKëscht for its three buildings and thus undertook to comply with the Luxembourg regulatory provisions in the field of recycling. The Publications Office set up selective waste collection. The quality label 'SuperDrecksKëscht fir Betriber' was awarded to the Publications Office on 3 July 2007.

3. Paper consumption

Paper consumption covers mainly the administrative needs (photocopying machines/laser printers).

Consumption was 33.8 tonnes in 2007, which represents a decrease of 7.5% compared to 2006.



I. Social dialogue

Throughout 2007, the Office pursued its cooperation with the Local Staff Committee and held regular joint meetings in the presence of the Office's Director and Resources Director. These meetings allowed the exchange of information as well as discussion on measures which may affect the Office's staff.

In particular, the following points were addressed:

- the Office's budget and the evolution of the Office's structure, in particular the follow-up concerning staff affected by organisational measures, the major reorganisation which took effect on 1 September 2006 as well as subsequent adjustments to the new structure;
- recruitment in general and, in particular, the difficulties of recruiting new officials in Luxembourg especially at the basic recruitment grades. The situation of AST1 with secretarial profile was also discussed on several occasions;
- major administrative procedures such as the career development review, promotion as well as attestation and certification. The Office management informed the Local Staff Committee of its problem in 'absorbing' certified colleagues because of the Office's large population of ASTs compared to AD;
- the content of the staff survey launched in June 2007.

The Local Staff Committee representatives had the opportunity to exchange views on the Office's budget, structure, human resources management, buildings with the members of the Management Committee during the meeting of March 2007.

The Publications Office took part in an interinstitutional round-table discussion on human resources management organised by the Local Staff Committee in Luxembourg. The main points addressed concerned: recruitment (lack of reserve lists, specific difficulties in Luxembourg), training, mobility, certification, work-life balance (flexitime, part-time, etc.), social infrastructures, buildings. This meeting proved to be a very useful opportunity to exchange views and best practices at interinstitutional level.

II. Health and well-being

In the summer of 2007 a comprehensive Staff Satisfaction Survey was carried out. As a result, many suggestions related to well-being (ventilation, temperature, staff restaurant meals, gym, etc.) were submitted. They will be addressed in an action plan.

One of the factors considered very positive is the presence of a nurse on the Office's premises. Apart from providing daily help on a case-by-case basis and dealing with medical certificates, the nurse has organised various health-promoting actions and campaigns, such as anti-flu vaccinations, eye tests, diabetes awareness and antismoking campaigns. The nurse has also set up a self-help antismoking group and a weight monitoring group which she will continue to support in 2008.








Graph 1 Evolution of the staff (1969-2007)






Graph 3 TED consultation figures




Graph 4 EUR-Lex consultation figures




Graph 5 CORDIS consultation figures

Explanatory notes

The annual accounts of the Publications Office have been prepared according to the accounting rules adopted by the European Commission which are in line with the International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) based on accrual accounting principles.

The annual accounts are directly extracted from ABAC-SAP, the centralised accrual accounting system of the Commission. The presentation used here is a customised layout for ease of reading.

Assets and Liabilities do not match because the Office's balance sheet forms part of the Commission's balance sheet, where the assets and liabilities do balance.

These accounts form part of the 2007 provisional annual accounts of both the Commission and the European Communities.

Balance sheet

Intangible fixed assets

Applying the transitional period of accounting rule No 6, the Office has not included in this category the charges related to large-scale customised software projects, such as Plan-Publi, Gescom, Plan-JO, etc. These projects have been developed over several years and have an acquisition value of some millions of euro. Until 2009 these purchases will be booked as charges. Thus the assets value shown under this category only represents the expenses of software bought on the market.

2 Tangible fixed assets

This represents the net value of tangible fixed assets such as plant, machinery, equipment, furniture, computer hardware.

The Publications Office handles assets concerning the Official Journal L&C series that are financed by budget lines from different institutions.

As in the previous years the Office includes the total value of these assets in its balance sheet, and not just the Commission's share.

Table 1 shows the 2007 movements related to tangible and intangible fixed assets.

3 Stock

The gross value of all free and priced publications in stock, held and declared by the Office on behalf of all Commission DGs and institutions, is 18 320 202 euro.

As the accounting rule No 9 states, it is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The net realisable value as of 31 December 2007, lower than the cost, is estimated to be equal to the amount of stock 2006 sold in 2007: 75 753 euro.

The stock of materials and supplies consumed in the production process (printing and distribution) has a gross value at 31 December 2007 of 451 509 euro. For this type of stock an impairment value due to specific obsolescence or damage has been calculated. The impairment value is 100 641 euro. The net value is therefore 350 868 euro.

4 Short-term pre-financing

The net value of pre-financing still open as of 31 December 2007 is 2 315 080 euro and relates entirely to CORDIS contracts. According to the new accounting rules pre-financing is no longer considered as an expense, but as an asset. The whole amount is expected to be cleared during 2008.

5 Receivables

The main values included in this section are the receivables from other institutions and Commission DGs related to recovery orders for storage and dissemination costs.

6 Active accruals and deferrals

This category includes the amounts related to the following cut-off adjustments: receivables related to recovery orders to issue in 2008 related to services performed in 2007, charges paid in 2007 for services to be rendered in 2008 (i.e. rents).

This category does not include inter-Commission transactions since they are excluded from the cut-off calculations.

7 Receivables of commercial activity

This section indicates the gross amount of receivables related to the sales of publications (911 607 euro) from which is deducted a provision of 490 868 euro for doubtful debtors.

8 Cash of commercial activity

This section includes the balances of both deposit and current bank accounts managed by the Office for its sales activity. According to the procedures in place, the Office announces and pays back the revenue of publications collected on behalf of other Commission DGs and institutions in January, July and October.

O Capital

This account is used to reflect each DG's adjustments of the opening balances for fixed assets, stocks, accruals and deferrals.

The section shows an anomalous debit balance due to the fact that DG Budget reversed the 2005 opening balance cut-off figures for the amount of 17 663 324 euro.

Non current liabilities

This is a provision of 3 152 326 euro which concerns the amounts of performance guarantees deducted when paying invoices of CORDIS contractors. The Office will pay this amount to the relevant contractors at the end of the contract, provided certain conditions are met.

Payables

This represents the amount of supplier invoices received and to be paid as of 31 December 2007. It includes the share to be paid on behalf of other institutions.

Passive accruals and deferrals

This section reports:

- payables for services and goods rendered in 2007 but not yet invoiced by the suppliers (11 607 367 euro). This amount includes the amount of invoices to be received for services rendered in 2007 and to be cleared against a previous prefinancing payment (1 159 389 euro);
- deferred income for 2008 subscriptions invoiced during 2007: 466 424 euro (mainly TED licences).

13 Payables of commercial activity

This concerns amounts related to the commercial activity payable to institutions and agencies.

Economic outturn

14 Revenue

This section includes:

- the yearly sales of publications for which the Office is the beneficiary (2 697 137 euro), including the Commission's share of the Official Journal L&C series;
- the amount of inter-Commission and inter-institutional revenue: 8 142 550 euro (mainly revenue for storage and dissemination costs). Since the cut-off scope does not include inter-Commission transactions, as far as these transactions are concerned, the amount shown in the accounts is not the accrual amount, but simply relates to the total value of recovery orders issued during the year;
- other miscellaneous revenue which includes the share of assets bought during the year and paid by other institutions (235 778 euro), and the value of recovery orders for storage, dissemination and printing costs issued in 2007 to bodies outside the consolidation scope (332 794 euro).

Expenses

According to the accrual accounting principles the economic outturn includes not only the expenses incurred and paid in 2007 but also expenses for goods and services delivered during the year not yet paid or invoiced. In order to compute the expenses incurred in 2007 but not yet invoiced, the Office, according to the instructions issued by DG Budget, analysed the amounts of outstanding commitments (RAL) as of 31 December 2007. Around 90% of the outstanding amounts have been analysed in detail. As far as the remaining 10% is concerned, a statistical method has been used.

The economic outturn also includes expenses for which the Office has received a sub/co-delegation. It does not include expenses for which a delegation has been given by the Office to Commission Services (PMO and DG DIGIT).

15 Operational expenses

For the Office this represents expenses on operational budget-lines: CORDIS, OJ S and the charges for publications on co/sub-delegations on operational budget-lines. The accrued amount of the performance guarantee retained by the Office and not yet paid to the CORDIS contractor has also been included in this section.

16 Movements on stock

The section includes the impact on the economic outturn of the movements and impairments of stock of publications made at year-end.

Staff expenses

The largest cost of staff (salaries) is not included in the Office's economic outturn as reporting on this falls to the responsibility of the PMO, which has a sub-delegation for payments. This explains the low value shown.

18 Buildings expenses

The biggest amounts in this section are the yearly rents for 2007 (6 465 377 euro) and the building maintenance expenses (2 318 351 euro).

19 Publications expenses

This account includes the following types of expenses, not included under the operational expenses: storage and dissemination, proofreading expenses, printing (including expenses under administrative co-delegated lines), CD-ROM production, archiving of electronic documents, IT expenses directly related to internet publishing (i.e. TED, EUR-Lex, EU Bookshop, etc.)

Other administrative expenses

The biggest amounts in this section are:

- 78% (8 957 345 euro) concerns the cost of IT maintenance, the development of large customised software projects, and the purchase of office supplies whose unitary cost is below 420 euro;
- 13% (1 549 225 euro) concerns external proofreading and other goods and services expenses.

21 Fixed assets related expenses

This represents the amount of the annual depreciation of tangible and intangible fixed assets. It also includes loss/gain on the disposal of assets.

22 Financial expenses

This category includes interest paid to suppliers relating to late payments.

23 Internal Commission expenses

This section (1 751 495 euro) includes the expenses which other Commission DGs charged to the Office during the year. The main value included in this section concerns the storage and cost for CORDIS (1 213 266 euro) which was booked both as internal Commission expense and as internal Commission revenue.

As per DG Budget instructions, this type of transaction is not included in the cut-off scope and so it does not represent the accrued amount but rather the total value of recovery orders received during the year.

Off balance

24 Contingent assets: guarantees received

The value of guarantees received comprises performance guarantees (6 825 726 euro) and pre-financing guarantees (4 134 082 euro).

25 Other contingent assets

This section includes the value of assets (mainly computer software and hardware) held by the CORDIS contractors to perform their duties, which will be transferred to the Office at the end of the contract.

26 Contingent liabilities: commitments

The amount shown in the balance sheet represents the share of the RAL (the outstanding commitments) as of 31 December 2007. The impact of cut-off and invoices at step 2 has been neutralised.

27 Contingent liabilities: long-term leases

It represents the amount of outstanding legal commitments related to operational leases (Table 2).
