DRAFT GENERAL BUDGET FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR 1983 AND DRAFT SUPPLEMENTARY AND AMENDING BUDGET No 1 FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR 1982

The Council discussed the draft general budget for 1983 in the light of the second reading by the European Parliament's Committee on Budgets and also draft supplementary and amending budget No 1 for the financial year 1982 as it stood after the European Parliament's first reading and in the light inter alia of Parliament's Resolution ("Barbarella") adopted on 14 December.

The Council held several meetings on the matter with a European Parliament delegation led by Mr DANKERT, President of the European Parliament. The delegation also included the following persons:
Mr LANGE, Chairman of the Committee on Budgets, Mr NOTENBOOM,
1st Vice-Chairman of the Committee on Budgets, Mrs BARBARELLA,
2nd Vice-Chairman of the Committee on Budgets and Rapporteur on supplementary and amending budget No 1/82, Mr Robert JACKSON,
Rapporteur on Section III of the 1983 Budget, Mr SABY, Rapporteur on other sections of the 1983 Budget, Mr AIGNER, Chairman of the Committee on Budgetary Control, Mr ANSQUER, Mr BONDE and
Mrs SCRIVENER, Members of the Committee on Budgets.

The problems raised by the European Parliament in the Barbarella Resolution were discussed in depth at these meetings.

At the last meeting the Council offered the Parliament delegation an overall compromise involving essentially the following:

With respect to the supplementary and amending budget for 1982:

- in reply to point 7 of the Barbarella Resolution, the Council would make the following statement:

"The Council shares the view of the European Parliament as to the importance and urgency of finding, in the context of the development of common policies, a lasting solution to the Community's internal imbalances, which will enable subsequent recourse to ad hoc budgetary measures to be avoided in line with the Parliament's wishes.

In this connection, the Commission has furthermore announced that it will be submitting proposals to the Council and to the European Parliament on a system of financing suited to an enlarged Community."

- With respect to the European Parliament's request for the special measures to be restored to the context of existing common policies, the Council stated its readiness, within the framework of an overall agreement, to accept the amendment (No 9) concerning Community energy development programmes (21 MECU).
- As regards Parliament's insistance on effective monitoring of expenditure under the special measures, the United Kingdom stated its willingness to provide Parliament with six-monthly reports on the utilization of the amounts received under the special measures and to arrange for on-the-spot checks by the European Parliament's Committee on Budgetary Control.
- The Council was unable to accept Parliament's other amendments concerning the draft supplementary and amending budget for 1982. The Council asked the European Parliament to give its Opinion at this part-session on the two Regulations needed to implement the special measures concerned.

As far as the 1983 budget was concerned, the Council was prepared to agree to 70% of the amounts resulting from the proposals for amendments submitted to Parliament by the Committee on Budgets for the final vote on the 1983 budget.

The European Parliament delegation reacted negatively to the Council's offer. The Council expressed its disappointment at the position adopted by the European Parliament delegation.

BUDGET COUNCIL; STRASBOURG: 15 DECEMBER 1982

THE BUDGET COUNCIL DULY MET UNDER ITS CHAIRMAIN OTTO MOELLER FOR THO HOURS THIS MORNING AFTER WHICH COUNCIL AND PARLIAMENT HELD A CONCILIATION MEETING LASTING ANOTHER THO HOURS. LATER IN THE AFTERNOON COUNCIL CONTINUED ITS OWN SITTING TO CONSIDER WHAT IS TO B DONE.

GULF BETHEEN THE THO SIDES IS ONE OF PRINCIPLE WITH PARLIAMENT CLAIMING THE RIGHT TO BE FULLY CONSULTED ON COMMUNITY ARRANGEMENTS AND NOT TREATED TO FAIT ACCOMPLI. HUCHPLAY WAS MADE FROM THE COUNCIL'S SIDE WITH THE FACT THAT THE ARRANGEMENTS ON COMPENSATION FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM AND RELIEF FOR THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY WERE ARRIVED AT OILY AFTER LENGTHY AND DIFFICULT NEGOTIATION BETHEEN GOVERNMENTS. AS THE GERMAN DELEGATE FOR IT TOACTA SUND SERVANDET. MR TUGENDARY NADE THE POINT THAT EVERYMOLY AGREED THAT THESE AD HOC ARRANGEMENTS WERE NOT THE MOSE DESTINABLE. IT WOULD BE MUCH BETTER FO FIND A BROADER BASIS FOR A PERMANENT SSOLUTION SO THE NEED FOR SPECIAL ARRANGEMENTS WOULD NOT EXIST. THE COUNCIL NOW HAS TO SEE WHAT IF ANY DECLARATION IT CAN MAKE IN

THIS DIRECTION AND WHETHER IT WILL BE ACCEPTABLE TO THE PARLIAMENT.

BUDGET COUNCIL (THURSDAY EARLY MORNING)

THE COUNCI SAT MORE OR LESS CONTINUOUSLY FROM 11 WEDNESDAY MORNING UNTIL JUST BEFORE FOUR OCLOCK THIS (THURSDAY) MORNING SEEKING A COMPROMISE ACCEPTABLE TO THE PARLIAMENT. THE SESSION WAS FREQUENTLY BROKEN UP BY MEETINGS WITH A PARLIAMENTARY DELEGAATION LED BY PRESIDENT DANKERT BUT ALL WAS TO NO AVAIL.

THE COUNCIL'S FINAL OFFER WAS OF A DECLARATION THAT COUNCIL SHARED PARLIAMENTS CONCERN FOR A LASTING SOLUTION TO THE BUDGET PROBLEM.

THIS WAS REJECTED AS BEING INADEQUATE AND NOT THE 'POLITICAL

GUARANTEE' SOUGHT BY THE PARLIAMENT IN THEIR RESOLUTION ON THE 1782.

SUPPLEMENTARY BUDGET. THIS IS THE VEHICLE BY WHICH THE COMMUNI...

TRYING TO FULFIL THE AGREEMENT ARRIVED AT BY THE COUNCIL LAST OCTOBER

GIVING EFFECT TO THE AGREEMENT ON THE THIRD TRANCHE OF REPAYMENTS TO

THE UNITED KINGDOM AS WELL AS SPECIAL PAYMENTS TO THE FEDERAL

REPUBLIC.

COUNCIL ALSO OFFERED TO AGREE TO 70 PERCENT OF WHAT THE PARLIAMENT WISHED TO ADD TO THE 1982 BUDGET - PARLIAMENTS SUMS ARE 177

ADDITIONAL ON COMMITMENTS AND 137 ADDITIONAL ON PAYMENTS, WITHIN THEIR MARGIN AS THEY CALCULATE IT. IN ADDITION COUNCIL OFFERED TO ACCEPT AN AMENDMENT TO THE 1982 SUPPLEMENTARY ADDING 21 MILLION ECUS FOR ENERGY DEMONSTRATION PROJECTS IN LESS PROSPEROUS MEMBER COUNTRIES. OTHER AMENDMENTS WERE ALL REJECTED HOWEVER THE UK DELEGATION OFFERED TO HELP PARLIAMENT ON THEIR DEMAND FOR GREATER POWERS OF CONTROLE OF EXPENDITURE UNDER THE SPECIAL MEASURES. THEY SUGGESTED SIX MONTHLY REPORTS AND PERMISSION FOR CONTROL BODIES TO TRAVEL IN UK.

NONE OF THIS WAS SUFFICIENT HOWEVER AND AT 0345 PRESIDENT DANKERT CALLED OF FURTHER NEGOTIATIONS.

THE STAGE IS NOW SET FOR THE VOTING IN PARLIAMENT WHERE THE PROSPECTS ARE FOR PASSAGE OF THE 1983 BUDGET WITH ADDITIONS UP TO PARLIAMENTS OWN MARGIN AND FOR REJECTION OF THE 1982 SUPPLEMENTARY UNLESS THERE ARE LAST MINUTE CHANGES OF TACTICS.

DEBATE ON BUDGET IN THE PARLIAMENT

BEFORE THE VOTING BEGAN, MR MOELLER EEXPLAINED THE COUNCIL'S POSITION AND MR TUGENDHAT MADE A STATEMENT AS FOLLOWS:

MR TUGENDHAT SAID HE UNDERSTOOD AND SYMPATHISED WITH PARLIAMENT'S
FEELINGS OF FRUSTRATION AND DISCONTENT AT THE WAY IT HAD BEEN TREATED
BY THE COUNCIL OVER THE UNITED KINGDOM SUPPLEMENTARY MEASURES AND
THE GERMAN ENERGY MEASURES. THE PARLIAMENT HAD BEEN PLACED IN A
DIFFICULT POSITION. THE COMMISSION ATTACHED THE GREATEST IMPORTANCE
TO THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE POLITICAL AGREEMENT AND TO WHICH THIS
SUPPLEMENTARY BUDGET WAS DESIGNED TO GIVE EFFECT. IT WAS A AMTTER FOR

REGRET AND DEEP DISAPPOINTMENT THAT THE POINT HAD BEEN REACHED W
A RESOLUTION TO REJECT THIS AGREEMENT HAD BEEN TABLED BEFORE

PARLIAMENT. ITS ADOPTION WOULD CAUSE A SERIOUS NEW CRISIS IN THE

COMMUNITY OF A KIND WHICH WAS IN NOBODY'S INTEREST. IT WOULD NOT BE A

VICTORY FOR COMMUNITY POLICY BUT A VICTORY FOR INTRANSIGENCE - FOR

INTRANSIGENCE OF INSTITUTIONS WITHIN OUR COMMUNITY.

MR TUGENDHAT SAID THAT WHILE HE UNDERSTOOD THEIR FRUSTRATIONS HE HOPED MEMBERS WOULD LOOK INTO THEIR HEARTS TO SEE IF PARLIAMENT ITSELF HAD SHOWN ALL THE UNDERSTANDING, WHICH IT MIGHT HAVE, PARLIAMENT WOULD OF COURSE TAKE ITS OWN DECISIONS. BUT HE COULD ONLY HOPE THAT IF THE SUPPLEMENTARY BUDGET WERE TO BE REJECTED, NEGOTIATIONS COULD SOON BEGIN TO FIND SOME OTHER WAY OF SOLVING THE ROBLEM. THIS WOULD NOT BE EASY, BUT THE COMMISSION WOULD DO ITS BEST TO BRING ABOUT A SATISFACTORY SOLUTION.

SESSION DU P.E. - SEANCE DU JEUDI MATIN

SUITE DU DEBAT SUR LE VOTE DU BUDGET

IN THE VOTING, PARLIAMENT ELECTED TO REJECT THE 1982 SUPPLEMENTARY BUDGET IN ITS ENTIRETY. VOTING WAS 258 IN FAVOUR OF REJECTION WITH 79 AGAINST AND ZERO ABSTENTIONS.

IMMEDIATELY AFTERWARDS, PARLIAMENT VOTED THE FOLLOWING COMPLEMENTARY RESOLUTION BY 305 VOTES IN FAVOUR TO 24 AGAINST AND TWO ABSTENTIONS.

HERE IS THE TEXT IF THE COMPLEMENTARY RESOLUTION :

"LE PARLEMENT EUROPEEN, DEMANDE A LA COMMISSION ET AU CONSEIL DE PRESENTER AU PLUS VITE DE NOUVELLES PROPOSITIONS FINANCIÈRES ET BUDGETAIRES QUI DONNENT UNE SUITE CONCRTE AU MANDAT DU 30 MAI ET JETTENT LES BASES D'UNE SOLUTION DURABLE ET COMMUNAUTAIRE A DES SITUATIONS "INACCEPTABLES" QUI SONT APPARUES POUR CERTAINS ETATS MEMBRES".

COUNCIL PRESIDENT MR MOELLER SAID PARLIAMENT'S DECISION HAD CREATED A VERY DIFFICULT SITUATION FOR THE COMMUNITY. IT IMPLIED CONSEQUENCES THAT NOBODY COULD FULLY GRASP TODAY. IT HAD ENGINEERED A CRISES BETWEEN COUNTRIES AND INSTITUTIONS AT A TIME WHEN THE ECONOMIC SITUATION SHOWED HOW MUCH WE NEEDED COOPERATION.

PARLIAMENT THEN BEGAN THE LENGHY PROCESS OF VOTING ON THE 1982 DRAFT BUDGET.

BUDGET-PARLIAMENT

VOTING ON THE 1983 BUDGET RAN SWIFT AND SMOOTH ALL AMENDMENTS

PUT FORWARD BY THE BUDGET COMMITTEE WERE ACCEPTED WITH THE RESULT

THAT SOME 177 MECUS WERE ADDED TO THE DRAFT IN COMMITMENTS AND SOME

137 MECUS INPAYMENTS.

IMMEDIATELY AFTERWARDS MR. MOELLER, SPEAKING ON BEHALF OF THE

COUNCIL, SAID HE DID NOT REPT NOT BELIEVE THE BUDGET PROCESS WAS YET COMPLETE AND THERE OUGHT TO BE FURTHER CONSULTATION.

THIS PROVOKED NO IMMEDIATE RESPONSE FROM MR. DANKERT. HOWEVER THE PARLIAMENT'S PRESIDENT HAS MADE IT CLEAR OVER THE PAST FEW DAYS THAT PARLIAMENT HAD STAYED WITHIN ITS OWN CALCULATION OF ITS MARGIN AND IF THE BUDGET AS AMENDED WERE TO BE ACCEPTABLE TO THE PARLIAMENT, HE WOULD SIGN IT. TIM/NG FOR HIS SIGNATURE WAS NOT CLEAR AT TIME OF
