EUROPEAN COMMUNITY MEETS ON FARM PRICES THIS MONTH

The European Communities Council of Agricultural Ministers meets twice this month, on February 16-17 and 23-24, in the hope of agreeing on 1976 farm prices, one of the Community's chief supply regulating devices and the main guarantee of farm income.

The EC Commission sent the Council price proposals in December 1975. same time, the Commission proposed related agri-monetary measures and adjustments in the unbalanced markets for milk, beef and veal, cereals, and fruit and vegetables. In June 1975, the Commission had made proposals for changing the wine regulations to relieve pressures on France from Italian table wines.

Price Proposals

Overall farm prices should be allowed to rise by 7.5 per cent, according to the Commission. (See Annex for details.) Modern farms' income needs weighed heavily in the Commission's calculations.

Farm prices are set in units of account (UA) equivalent to \$1.20635, and national currencies are related to it in fixed amounts. However, recent world monetary fluctuations disturbed the relationships of the nine currencies to each other. The Commission therefore proposed adjustments in some member countries' "representative rates of exchange." This action would allow

 the removal of "compensatory monetary amounts" in Benelux. Since Denmark, France, and Italy will not apply compensatory monetary amounts, a single market between these six countries would result. For the past few years, agricultural sales between member countries have been subject to compensatory monetary amounts which adjusted prices according to changes in the relative values of member countries' currencies.

a reduction in the compensatory amounts from 10 per cent to 6.5 per cent in Germany, the member country with the hardest currency.

As part of their terms of membership, the United Kingdom and Ireland will temporarily retain accession compensatory amounts.

Related Measures

To cope with imbalances between supply and demand for some products, the Commission proposed the following action on prices, market organizations, and structural adaptation.

Milk

Commission proposals include

- setting prices twice a year instead of once (see Annex)
- special marketing measures -- free or cheap milk for disadvantaged consumers, schools, and the army, for instance, and a consumer subsidy on butter. Aid for these measures would be increased from the European Agricultural Guidance and Guarantee Fund (EAGGF), the Community's price support and farm modernization financing body.
- a subsidy of UA 15 per 100 kg on powdered whole milk production
- mandatory addition of 600,000 tons of powdered skim milk to animal feeds
- aid to liquid skim milk used as animal feed, between UA 30 and UA 40per 100 kg.
- donation of 200,000 tons of powdered skim milk as food aid in 1976, up

from 55,000 tons

• aid to producers who restrict their milk deliveries.

Beef and Veal

For beef and veal, the Commission's proposals try to relieve the burden on the Community's intervention system. The Commission also proposed phasing out cattle slaughter premiums by March 1976.

Cereals

The prices of various cereals should be based on their nutritive value, according to the Commission. To help channel high yield common wheat into feedingstuffs without having to pay a denaturing premium, the Commission proposed narrowing of the price differential with other feed grains, such as barley and corn. To encourage the production of high quality bread wheat, the Commission would set a higher price than for high yield wheat and end intervention buying of high yield wheat.

Fruit and Vegetables

The Community has been producing too many apples and pears. The Commission thus proposed a grubbing premium of UA 1,100 per hectare (2.47 acres) on the types of fruit most often taken off the market: Golden Delicious apples and Passe Crassane pears. The EAGGF Guidance Section would bear half the cost of this operation, member states the other half.

With regard to fishing, different prices for each product covered by Council Regulation 2142/70. In November 1975 (guide) price proposals for products in Annex I, A and C of this Regulation, (guide) prices for products in Annex II of this Regulation, intervention prices and Community production prices for the 1976 marketing year. Intervention prices for sardines and anchovies are automatically calculated at the rate of 45% of guide prices.
