Crispin Tickell was born in 1930 and educated at Westminster School and Christ Church College, Oxford, where he received a 1st Class Honors Degree in Modern History in 1952.

From 1952 he served as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Coldstream Guards until 1954 when he joined the British Foreign Service, working initially in the London office until 1955 when he was transferred to the British Embassy in the Hague and later to the Embassy in Mexico in 1958.

In 1961 Mr. Tickell was a member of the Planning Staff in the Foreign Office, London, and retained this position until 1964, when he was again transferred abroad, this time to the British Embassy in Paris.

After serving four years in the Paris office, Mr. Tickell became Private Secretary to successive Chancellors of the Duchy of Lancaster (the Rt. Hon. George Thomson, the Rt. Hon. Anthony Barber and the Rt. Hon. Geoffrey Rippon), Ministers responsible for the negotiations for British entry to the European Community, at the British Foreign and Commonwealth Office.

In 1972 he became Head of Western Organizations Department and was responsible for NATO matters, European security problems including the CSCE and MBFR, and politico-military affairs generally.
