## BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

JAMES W. CONROW  
DEPUTY ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY  
FOR DEVELOPING NATIONS

James Conrow was appointed Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Treasury for Developing Nations in March 1984. In this position he has responsibility for economic and financial relations with developing nations, development assistance, practices and policies of international financial institutions, and bilateral assistance policies.

Prior to becoming Deputy Assistant Secretary, Mr. Conrow served, since 1981, as the Director of the Office of Multilateral Development Banks, Department of the Treasury. His responsibilities included supervision over all U.S. Government activity with the Multilateral Development Banks (World Bank, Inter-American Development Bank, Asian Development Bank and African Development Bank).

Before joining the Treasury Department, Mr. Conrow served in President-Elect Ronald Reagan's Transition Team. Mr. Conrow served on Transition Teams responsible for both bilateral and multilateral foreign assistance programs. He also served on the Transition's Budget Task Force.

From 1977 to 1981, Mr. Conrow was a professional staff member of the House Appropriations Committee, U.S. House of Representatives with primary responsibility for foreign assistance appropriations. Other Committee responsibilities included the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee and HUD and Independent Agencies Subcommittee.

From 1975 to 1977, Mr. Conrow was a Legislative Assistant to Congressman Bill Young of Florida.

Mr. Conrow earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Wisconsin - Eau Claire. He attended Harvard University's 1983 Senior Executive Program in National and International Security. In 1974, he studied in Geneva, Switzerland under a program sponsored by Kent State University concerning international organizations and economic development.
