BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

ANTHONY HARTLEY, EDITORIAL ADVISER TO THE SUNDAY TELEGRAPH AND
EUROPEAN CONTRIBUTION EDITOR TO THE NATIONAL INTEREST

Anthony Hartley was born on July 29, 1925. From 1943-46, he studied at Exeter College (Oxford University) and received an Honours Degree in English Language and Literature. From 1947-51, he studied at the University of Paris and received a B.A. in Letters and Research.

Mr. Hartley started his career in journalism in 1953. From 1953-57, he was a journalist for the British publication "Spectator". From 1957-59, he was a Lead Writer for the "Guardian". From 1959-61, he was a Writer for the "Encounter". From 1964-67, he was Lead Writer for the "Economist". From 1967-71, he was Editor of the "interplay Magazine". From 1971-73, he was Director of the Javits Committee of the North Atlantic Assembly for the production of their report on European/American relations.

He joined the European Community in 1973 and from 1973-86, he was the Deputy Head of the London Office of the European Community Commission.

Mr. Hartley undertook a U.S. speaking tour on behalf of the Washington EC Delegation in 1976.

On retirement from the EC Commission in 1986, Mr. Hartley became an Editorial Adviser to the Sunday Telegraph and a European contributing Editor to the "National Interest", a quarterly publication in Washington, DC.

Mr. Hartley has published a few books, among them a pamphlet on Nixon's Foreign Policy for the Institute of Strategic Studies in 1974. He has published recently a new booklet on US/EC relations for the Institute for European Defense and Strategic Studies in London.

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
