

THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA AND THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY

The following memorandum outlines relations between the Community and the People's Republic of China.

It is published on the occasion of the EEC-China Business Week (30 March to 10 April 1981 at Brussels).

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March 1981

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INTRODUCTION

On 3 April 1978 the Trade agreement between the People's Republic of China and the European Community was signed, marking an important stage in the rapprochement between Europe and China.

During the meetings of the Joint Committee to supervise the implementation of the agreement, delegations on both sides found it was being satisfactorily implemented.

The textile agreemen initialled on 18 July 1979 covers an important sector of the trade

The programme for training Chinese executives in various Commission departments and the numerous visits by personalities in both directions have multiplied fruitful contacts.

The EEC-China Business Week, an event on an unusually large scale, is designed to examine new opportunities in relation both to Chinese exports to the Community in areas of real demand as well as EEC exports of machinery and equipment to China.

BACKGROUND

The interest China has shown in the development of the European Community goes back to the early 1970s.

Apart from strictly political aspects, matters connected with the common trade policy have also prompted a strengthening of contacts between the People's Republic of China and the Community. Bilateral trade agreements between Member States and China were due to expire at the end of 1974, in accordance with decisions taken by the Community institutions regarding introduction of a joint trade policy. Thus, in November 1974, the Community sent a memorandum to the People's Republic of China (as also to other State-trading countries) together with an outline agreement, indicating its readiness to conclude a trade agreement.

Sir Christopher Soames, then Vice-President of the Commission with responsibility for external relations, visited China in May 1975. During the talks that he had with the late Premier Zhou Enlai, the Chinese Government announced its decision to establish official relations with the Community as such and to appoint an ambassador to it. At the same time the Chinese authorities expressed their intention of studying sympathetically the Commission's proposal that a suitable trade agreement be negotiated between the two parties to replace the bilateral agreements that had expired.

On 15 September 1975, Ambassador Li Lianbi presented his credentials to the President of the Council of Ministers and the President of the Commission of the European Community as Head of the mission of the Chinese People's Republic with the European Community. The exploratory talks with a view to negotiating the agreement started in July 1975.

A Commission delegation visited China from 4 to 13 July 1977 to continue these exploratory talks. The Commission delegation was received by the Minister of Trade, Mr. Li Qiang.

Negotiations held in Brussels led to the initialling of a trade agreement on 3 February 1978.

THE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA AND THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY

The official signing ceremony took place on 3 April 1978 when Minister Li Qiang was visiting Brussels. The Agreement was signed on the Community's behalf by Mr. K.B. Andersen, President of the Council, and Mr. Wilhelm Haferkamp, Vice-President of the Commission. It came into force on 1 June 1978.

Concluded for a period of five years with tacit renewal every year, the Agreement is of a non-preferential nature and sets out a number of rules aimed at promoting development of trade.

The two parties will apply most-favoured-nation treatment as far as tariffs are concerned.

An equilibrium clause (Article 3) makes provision for both parties to contribute (each according to its means) towards achieving balance in their trade, and in the event of obvious imbalance, for the Joint Committee to study ways of remedying the situation.

China undertakes to consider Community imports in a favourable light and the Community will institute an increasing degree of liberalization for imports of Chinese origin. This is the first time such a clause has been agreed upon in a trade agreement (Article 4).

Whilst reaffirming the principle of recourse to amicable consultations in the event of difficulties concerning trade, both parties agreed that "each party may take unilateral measures in exceptional cases where the situation will not permit any delay".

Provisions are aimed at promoting visits by individuals, groups and delegations from the economic, commercial and industrial spheres, facilitating exchanges and contacts and encouraging the organization of fairs and exhibitions.

The Agreement contains a price clause specifying that trade in goods and services will be effected at market-related prices.

The Agreement is managed by a Joint Committee which normally meets once a year.

After the signature of the Agreement, the Council of Ministers of the Community, at a meeting on 19 September 1978, gave its approval to a special regulation on the common arrangements applicable from 1 January 1979 to imports from the People's Republic of China. These arrangements had previously been governed by the provisions of the regulation applicable to State-trading countries in general, as adopted on 19 December 1969, but under the new regulation trade liberalization is extended to a further twenty products.

IMPLEMENTATION OF THE AGREEMENT

Meeting of the first Joint Committee at Beijing from 17 to 19 July 1979.

The first aim of its work was to permit a general appreciation of the agreement and of the development of trade relations.

Generally speaking, the delegations considered that the agreement had been implemented in a harmonious manner.

The Community delegation, led by Sir Roy Denman, in application of the provisions of article 4 of the agreement, put forward the new import possibilities it was prepared to grant for 1979 in the form of increased quotas and fresh liberalizations. On this occasion, a regulation of 23 November 1979 relating to the joint system applicable to imports from the People's Republic of China added sixteen extra products to those included in the joint liberalization list for China.

It also announced that the Community would grant China the benefit of the S.P.G. (1) with certain exceptions.

The Chinese delegation explained how it was implementing the principle of "considering in a favourable light" provided by the agreement for exporters from the Community, by seeing that they had the possibility of full participation in opportunities of trading with China.

Meeting of the second Joint Committee at Brussels on 3 and 4 November 1980

It outlined the progress achieved since its inaugural meeting in July 1979. This revealed that trade in both directions had increased by 41% during 1979. Total trade had reached 3,400 million ECU (2). During the first half of 1980, Chinese exports to the Community have continued to increase, whilst Community exports to China are decreasing.

According to the Chinese delegation, the slowing-down of Community exports to China results from policies of economic readjustment, the reduction of important investments and fewer imports of steel (which accounted for half the Community's exports to China in 1979). However, according to the Chinese delegation, a certain number of contracts with Community firms are being discussed, and imports from the Community should pick up in the near future.

The Community delegation mentioned the increase of quotas which would be proposed as part of the autonomous system for 1981. The Chinese stated that they were satisfied with these increased possibilities of access to the Community market in spite of the very difficult economic situation.

The problem of visits and training periods in the Community for Chinese officials; was mentioned.

Promotion of personal visits, exchanges and contacts

During the official visits to the People's Republic of China by Vice-President Haferkamp in September-October 1978 and President Jenkins in February 1979, the Commission agreed to institute a training programme.

In March 1979 the Commission offered <u>ten two-year university scholarships</u> as part of the programme of scholarships for non-associated developing countries.

The People's Republic of China decided to use these scholsarhips for post-graduate <u>students</u> to allow them to continue to specialise in different sectors in Europe.

Information and study programme for officials

In answer to the Commission's offer, the Chinese Government proposed three candidates in April 1979.

Three officials, belonging respectively to the Foreign Ministry, the Ministry of External Trade and the Institute for Research in International Affairs visited Institutions in Brussels, Luxembourg, the Federal Republic of Germany, the United Kingdom and the Netherlands.

Reception of teachers

The Community Directorate for Conference Interpretation received successively three teachers from the Beijing Institute of Foreign languages to make them aware of the problems of simultaneous interpretation.

Training visits for statisticians

At the conclusion of a visit by senior Chinese customs officials to the Statistical Office of the Community in July 1979, the SOEC(1) agreed to receive for three months three experts from the central customs administration of the People's Republic of China so that they might become familiar with the Community's customs problems. These contacts will be renewed.

THE TEXTILE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COMMUNITY AND THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA,

fits into the general framework of trade relations between China and the Community for whom it constitutes an important and concrete application of the EEC-China trade agreement.

It was initialled on 18 July 1979 and transitionally implemented during 1979 by an increase of the textile quotas in the unilateral Community system governing textile imports from China. The agreement was fully implemented from 1 January 1980 and is valid till 31 December 1983.

The agreement defines a framework applicable for five years for imports into the Community of Chinese textiles and garments of cotton, wool or synthetic and artificial fibres. Although it guarantees significantly increased access for these products to the Community market, the agreement takes full account of the considerable difficulties faced at the present time by the clothing and textile industries of the "Ten", and of the interests of other suppliers who have concluded agreements with the Community.

Thus Chinese textile products enjoy considerably increased access to the European market. The Chinese negotiators accepted a strengthening of the safeguard clause for the products not subject to quota. This will allow the Community, should the case arise, to keep textile and clothing exports from China to a level not exceeding the highest thresholds guaranteed to the Community's suppliers by the "multifibres" agreement. Thus while establishing a protection which is fundamental for Community industries, the safeguard mechanism will at the same time guarantee Chinese exporters security of access to the Community market. (Note that a system of double administrative control - control of imports and of exports - applies to all products and not merely to those products subject to limitations).

In addition, the Chinese authorities undertook to maintain the present balance of trading in textiles between the two parties; to supply minimum guaranteed quantities of certain textile raw materials necessary for the European processing industry (pure silk, angora, cashmir) and to respect an effective price clause.

This agreement represents one of the cornerstones in the development of economic relations between China and the Community on the basis of mutual advantage.

THE GENERALIZED SYSTEM OF PREFERENCES (G.S.P.)

On the occasion of his trip to China in February 1979, President Jenkins had informed the Chinese authorities that the Commission was giving its favourable attention to including the People's Republic of China among those benefiting from the G.S.P. This system consists in total exemption from customs duties, within the limits of certain quantities, for all industrial products and, in general, partial exemption for certain processed agricultural products.

China was permitted to benefit from the G.S.P. from 1 January 1980 for most of its exports of industrial products, with the exception of certain sensitive products, and for agricultural products not subject to quota. Under the 1981 system, the list has been extended to cover other agricultural products.

From 20 to 30 January 1980, the Commission organised at Beijing, Tianjin, Shanghai and Canton seminars to provide Chinese officials, merchants and traders with all the explanations they needed about the G.S.P.

EXCHANGE OF VISITS

Vice-Premier Gu Mu, and Mr. Li Qiang, Minister for External Trade, were received at the Commission in the Spring of 1978. Mr. Bu Ming at that time Vice-President of the Bank of China also visited the Commission in July of that year.

At the invitation of the Chinese Government, Mr. W. Haferkamp, Vice-president of the Commission in charge of external relations, headed a Community delegation to China from 24 September to 2 October 1978. This visit took place at an extremely important moment in China's political and economic development. Mr. Haferkamp held talks with Mr. Li Xian-nian and other Chinese leaders.

The original character of this mission was shown by the presence of representatives from the Economic and Social Committee, the Union of Industries of the European Community, the European Confederation of Trade Unions and eminent industrialists and businessmen from the different Member States.

At the beginning of 1979, President Jenkins paid an official visit to China and held talks with Premier Hua Guofeng, Vice-Premier Deng Xiaoping and Vice-Premier Gu Mu. Mr. Colombo, then President of the European Parliament, also paid an official visit to China at this time.

Mr. Wang Renzhong, Deputy Prime Minister and President of the State Commission for Agriculture of the People's Republic of China, visited the Commission on 11 October 1979.
Mr. Wang Zigang, Minister or Posts and Telecommunications, was also received at the Commission during the same period.

A mission of senior Commission officials led by the Director General for the internal market and industrial affairs, Mr. Fernand Braun, went to China from 31 March to 9 April 1980. There it had talks with senior Chinese officials about the development of industrial and economic relations between China and the Community. It examined the development prospects for Chinese exports to the Community and, more particularly, the organisation of the EEC-China trade week in the Spring of 1981.

In response to an invitation from the President of the European Parliament at that time, Mr. Colombo, a delegation from the National People's Assembly, led by Mme Deng Yingchao, Vice-President of the Assembly, was received by Mme. S. Weil at Strasbourg where it also met President Jenkins. The Commission's contribution to European unity was stressed. The importance of the EEC-China Business Week was explained as a stimulus for Chinese exports to the Community.

At the end of June and beginning of July 1980, a delegation led by Mr. Zou Siyi, Director of the Export Department of the Chinese External Trade Ministry, came to Brussels to prepare the EEC-China Business Week with the responsible officials of the Commission.

CONCLUSION

Total trade in both directions has doubled between 1975 and 1979. The tempo of growth recently slowed down as a result of China's readjustment policy. Contacts made during the EEC-China Business Week will allow traders on both sides to take advantage of the possibilities offered under China's new policies for stimulating foreign trade.

As Mme. Deng Yingchao, Vice-President of the National People's Assembly, pointed out to the European Parliament on 16 June 1980, the "EEC-China Business Week represents an important step in the development of our present relations".

This event (from 30 March to 10 April 1981) is the first of its kind organised by the Commission with a third country and represents a milestone in EEC-China relations. The idea was launched during the visit to China of Vice-President Haferkamp.

The Chinese delegation, led by Vice-Premier Gu Mu, is the most important economic delegation ever to come to Europe.

This Business Week constitutes the first manifestation by Community economic circles towards a trading partner as important as China.

Trade Agreement between the European Economic Community and the People's Republic of China

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(Acts whose publication is obligatory)

COUNCIL REGULATION (EEC) No 946/78

of 2 May 1978

concerning the conclusion of the Trade Agreement between the European Economic Community and the People's Republic of China

THE COUNCIL OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES,

Having regard to the Treaty establishing the European Economic Community, and in particular Article 113 thereof,

Having regard to the recommendation from the Commission,

Whereas the Trade Agreement between the European Economic Community and the People's Republic of China, signed in Brussels on 3 April 1978 should be concluded,

HAS ADOPTED THIS REGULATION:

Article 1

The Trade Agreement between the European Economic Community and the People's Republic of China is hereby approved on behalf of the Community.

The text of the Agreement is annexed to this Regulation.

Article 2

The President of the Council shall give the notification provided for in Article 11 of the Agreement 1.

Article 3

The Community shall be represented on the Joint Committee provided for in Article 9 of the Agreement, by the Commission, assisted by representatives of the Member States.

Article 4

This Regulation shall enter into force on the third day following its publication in the Official Journal of the European Communities.

This Regulation shall be binding in its entirety and directly applicable in all Member States.

TRADE AGREEMENT

between the European Economic Community and the People's Republic of China

THE COUNCIL OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES

and

THE GOVERNMENT OF THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA,

DESIRING to develop economic relations and trade between the European Economic Community and the People's Republic of China on the basis of equality and the mutual advantage of the two Contracting Parties and to give a new impetus to their relations,

HAVE DECIDED TO CONCLUDE THIS AGREEMENT THE TERMS OF WHICH ARE AS FOLLOWS:

Article 1

The two Contracting Parties will endeavour, within the framework of their respective existing laws and regulations, to promote and intensify trade between them.

To this end they confirm their determination:

- (a) to take all appropriate measures to create favourable conditions for trade between them;
- (b) to do all they can to improve the structure of their trade in order to diversify it further; and
- (c) to examine, each for its own part and in a spirit of goodwill, any suggestions made by the other Party, in particular in the Joint Committee, for the purpose of facilitating trade between them.

Article 2

- 1. In their trade relations the two Contracting Parties shall accord each other most-favoured-nation treatment in all matters regarding:
- (a) customs duties and charges of all kinds applied to the import, export, re-export or transit of products, including the procedures for the collection of such duties or charges;
- (b) regulations, procedures and formalities concerning customs clearance, transit, warehousing and transhipment of products imported or exported;
- (c) taxes and other internal charges levied directly or indirectly on products or services imported or exported;
- (d) administrative formalities for the issue of import or export licences.

- 2. Paragraph 1 of this Article shall not apply in the case of:
- (a) advantages accorded by either Contracting Party to States which together with it are members of a customs union or free trade area;
- (b) advantages accorded by either Contracting Party to neighbouring countries for the purpose of facilitating border trade;
- (c) measures which either Contracting Party may take in order to meet its obligations under international commodity agreements.

Article 3

The two Contracting Parties will make every effort to foster the harmonious expansion of their reciprocal trade and to help, each by its own means, to attain a balance in such trade.

Should an obvious imbalance arise, the matter must be examined within the Joint Committee so that measures can be recommended in order to improve the situation.

Article 4

- 1. The People's Republic of China will give favourable consideration to imports from the European Economic Community. To this end the competent Chinese authorities will ensure that Community exporters have the possibility of participating fully in opportunities for trade with China.
- 2. The European Economic Community will strive for an increasing liberalization of imports from the People's Republic of China. To this end it will endeavour progressively to introduce measures extending

the list of products for which imports from China have been liberalized and to increase the amounts of quotas. The procedure for implementation will be examined within the framework of the Joint Committee.

Article 5

- 1. The two Contracting Parties shall exchange information on any problems that may arise with regard to their trade and shall open friendly consultations, with the intention of promoting trade, for the purpose of seeking mutually satisfactory solutions to those problems. Each of the two Contracting Parties will ensure that no action is taken before consultations are held.
- 2. In an exceptional case, however, where the situation does not admit any delay, either Contracting Party may take measures, but must endeavour as far as possible to hold friendly consultations before doing so.
- 3. Each Contracting Party will ensure that, when taking the measures referred to in paragraph 2, the general objectives of this Agreement are not prejudiced.

Article 6

The two Contracting Parties undertake to promote visits by persons, groups and delegations from economic, trade and industrial circles, to facilitate industrial and technical exchanges and contacts connected with trade and to foster the organization of fairs and exhibitions by both sides and the relevant provision of services. As far as possible they must grant each other the facilities concerning the above activities.

Article 7

Trade in goods and the provision of services between the two Contracting Parties shall be effected at market-related prices and rates.

Article 8

The Contracting Parties agree that payments for transactions shall be made, in accordance with their respective existing laws and regulations, in currencies of the Member States of the Community, Renminbi or any convertible currency accepted by the two parties concerned in the transactions.

Article 9

- 1. An EEC-China Joint Committee for Trade shall be set up, comprising representatives of the European Economic Community on the one hand and representatives of the People's Republic of China on the other.
- 2. The tasks of the Joint Committee shall be as follows:
- to monitor and examine the functioning of this Agreement,
- to examine any questions that may arise in the implementation of this Agreement,
- to examine problems that could hinder the development of trade between the Contracting Parties,
- to examine means and new opportunities of developing trade between the Contracting Parties and other problems relating to their trade,

and

- to make recommendations that may help to attain the objectives of this Agreement.
- 3. The Joint Committee shall meet once a year, in Brussels and Peking alternately. Extraordinary meetings may be convened by mutual agreement, at the request of either Contracting Party. The office of chairman of the Joint Committee shall be held by each of the two Contracting Parties in turn. Where both Parties consider it necessary, the Joint Committee may set up working parties to assist it in its work.

Article 10

As far as the European Economic Community is concerned, this Agreement shall apply to the territories in which the Treaty establishing the European Economic Community is applied, and under the conditions laid down in that Treaty.

Article 11

This Agreement shall enter into force on the first day of the month following the date on which the Contracting Parties have notified each other of the completion of the legal procedures necessary for this purpose. It is concluded for a period of five years. The Agreement shall be tacitly renewed from year to year provided that neither Contracting Party notifies the other Party in writing of its denunciation of the Agreement six months before the date of expiry:

However, the Agreement may be amended by mutual consent of the two Contracting Parties in order to take account of new situations
