

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE MR. A. SHONFIELD.

Andrew Shonfield is Director of Studies at the Royal Institute of International Affairs in London. He was formerly Economic Editor of The Observer and before that (from 1949 to 1957) Foreign Editor of The Financial Times. He is the author of a survey of the post-war British economy, "British Economic Policy since the War" (1958); "The Attack on World Poverty" (1960), a study of the problems of the under-developed countries; "A Man Beside Himself" (a novel, 1964); and of "Modern Capitalism: The Changing Balance of Public and Private Power" (1965).

Shonfield was educated at St. Paul's School, London and at Magdalen College, Oxford. After service in the Army from 1940-46 he went into journalism and at the same time established himself as a radio and television commentator on current political and economic affairs. In the course of his work he has travelled widely, in Asia and Latin America, as well as in Russia and Soviet Europe. In 1965 he was appointed a member of the Royal Commission on Trade Unions and Employers' Associations. He lives in London with his wife, who is an economist and collaborates in his work, and two children.

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
