

Introductory words of Graham CHAMBERS to the STOA Panel at the meeting on 13 April in Strasbourg

Mr Chairman, Vice-Chairmen and Members of the STOA Panel.

It is an honour to address you in my new capacity as head of STOA.

Owing to my previous experience as a scientist with the British Ministry of Defence, followed by experience as Head of Meteorology and Upper Air Physics research on a research base in Antarctica, and then as a geology and geophysics analyst with the oil exploration industry, I am very pleased to have been appointed to this post

STOA was set up to provide information, where possible, in the form of concise studies and briefings on scientific and technological policy options, where the European Parliament needs a counterbalance to the often highly technical information provided by the Commission and by various lobby and special interest groups. The interface between science and technology and the political decision-making process is often a minefield where gems of truth lie intermingled with unexploded myths - not to mention the corpses of unwary scientists and decision-makers.

STOA is also the classical Greek for portico and calls to mind the Renaissance painting by Raphael of the classical Greek philosophers - Aristotle, Socrates, Pythagoras, discoursing on the steps of the entrance to the Athenian Acropolis. It is an appropriate image and yet I think it very important to reinforce the substance behind this portico. After all it is the thoughts and words of the philosophers depicted by Raphael which will survive long after the portico itself is reduced to dust.

Reinforcing the substance behind STOA requires what I shall call the seven virtues:

- 1) responsibility in deciding what projects STOA should and should not undertake.
- 2) relevance to the work of Parliament and its Committees.
- 3) rapidity of execution for a late study is of use only to historians.
- 4) rigour both scientific and linguistic ensure both accuracy and comprehension.
- 5) **rectitude** in budgetary matters, to ensure value for money and to avoid needless duplication and waste.
- 6) respect for collegiality and cooperation with the other services of the Directorate-General, and finally.
- 7) relationships good ones, both within STOA, within the DG for Research and between STOA and science and technology organs and academia within and outside the EU.

My responsibility is to ensure that the STOA Workplan, once adopted by the Panel, is carried out in the most efficient way possible with the emphasis on speed consistent with quality. I shall try my best to reinforce the identity and spirit of STOA, while at the same time ensuring a greater degree of collaboration between STOA and the other Research Divisions of DGIV.

I would like here to pay tribute to Mr Dick Holdsworth, who held the post I now occupy

since the beginning of STOA. He has created in STOA a formidable "esprit de corps" and identity which is a considerable asset to any organisation and which contributes greatly to STOA's work. It is in no small measure due to his persistence and single-minded determination that STOA both survived and thrived:

I would like to pay tribute to the staff of STOA - the STOA Scholars whose job it is to oversee, coordinate and contribute to particular studies, Karin Sercu, Jackie Weiwers and Frans Schaerlaeken, the permanent staff who organise the meetings of the Panel and see through the preparation, editing, printing and publication of the STOA studies, Mr Overstall whose job is to keep us on the narrow path of fiscal rectitude, the Steering Groups and academic referees who keep us on the path of academic rectitude and ensure that our publications are of high quality. I would like also to mention Mr Karapiperis, the new and highly-qualified deputy, based in Brussels and to his secretary and assistant Marianne Martinsson.

Finally, I wish to pay tribute to the hierarchy of the Directorate-General for Research - the Head of Division Mr Van der Perre (who has now retired after long and distinguished service), and last, but certainly not least, the Director Mr Silvestro and the Director General, Mr Cioffi who, as the highest officials, are responsible for relations with you, the members and office-holders of the STOA Panel and the highest political organs of the Parliament.

I wish to thank you Mr Chairman, the Vice-Chairmen and Members of the STOA Panel for your indulgence in listening to this introduction and for your continued support and enthusiasm for STOA.


