WORKSHOPS

The following STOA Workshops took place:

97/C12/3 - Drug use: scientific and technological contributions to the assessment of policy options on drug use and related treatments, from the level of individual treatment to the national and European policy level

Date/place: 23-24 April 1998, Brussels

Main outcomes:

This Workshop was organised by STOA following a project request by the Committee on Culture, Youth, Education and the Media under the 1997 Workplan. It was chaired by Mrs HEINISCH, MEP, Vice-Chairperson of STOA, and attended by the Chairman of the STOA Panel, Mr POMPIDOU, MEP.

The aim of the Workshop was to analyse in depth all the facets emerging from the complex issue of drug use.

The use of illegal drugs as well as its personal and social consequences have caused substantial problems in each of the EU Member States and several facts demonstrate that drug use is still on the increase. In such a situation it becomes imperative to pose the question how Europe and its various policy instruments should respond to the challenge of effectively avoiding this scourge. An effective response to drug use implies that the complexity and dimensions of the problem are recognised and that one has the relevant knowledge and understanding of the numerous relationships involved in the issue.

During the Workshop specific scientific information was presented by high-level scientific experts on:

- 1. The epidemiology of drug use
- 2. Risks of the use of drugs and dependency
- 3. Why do people take drugs?
- 4. Primary prevention
- 5. Treatment for drug users
- 6. Social services for drug users
- 7. Drug policies
- 8. Social, economic and other consequences
- 9. Supply of drugs (production, trafficking)
- 10. Detection of drugs and drug profiling

The Workshop was organised in cooperation with the European Centre for Social Welfare Policy and Research, Vienna, Austria. It brought together, amongst others, officials from the European Monitoring Centre for Drugs and Drug Addiction (EMCDDA), based in Lisbon, including its Director, as well as a representative of Europol, the European police coordination office from The Hague. A Workshop Study is expected to be available in 1-2 months.

97/C17/2 - Aquaculture: Deployment of an open-sea marine park with self-restocking by behaviourally conditioned fish with the objective of exploitation by traditional fishing methods

Date/place: 27-28 April 1998, Brussels

Main outcomes:

This Workshop was organised by STOA following a project request by the Committee on Fisheries. It was chaired by Mr d'ABOVILLE, MEP, and Member of this Committee.

The aim of the Workshop was to examine in its multiple technical and economic dimension the new trend towards 'sea ranching'.

Free Fish Farms at Sea (FFFS) is a concept (sometimes called 'Aquacapture') which integrates many of the contemporary techniques used in fisheries and aquaculture and addresses the need for creative collaboration between these two sectors. The concept relies on conditioning fish in association with feeding. The fish are kept in an enhanced habitat in open sea area and remain within the local area by transmitting an acoustic signal at feeding times. Once mature, the fish are then recaptured by traditional fishing methods.

The Workshop discussed topics such as:

- FFFS and 'sea ranching' French developments
- . Hatching, restocking of appropriate species
- . Japanese experience
- . Artificial reefs, aggregation and enhancement
- Acoustic barriers and recall mechanisms
- . Economics macro/micro
- Legal aspects global/local
- Environmental aspects
- . Recapture of marine fish
- . Consumer/Market aspects

The Workshop involved parliamentarians, EC officials, and invited specialists with experience in the field. The discussion generated at the Workshop will be used as the basis for a study which will be made available later.

The Workshop was organised in cooperation with the Stirling Institute of Aquaculture, University of Stirling, UK.
